and an unusual pattern of hardy flowers against a high fence at the rear of the property.

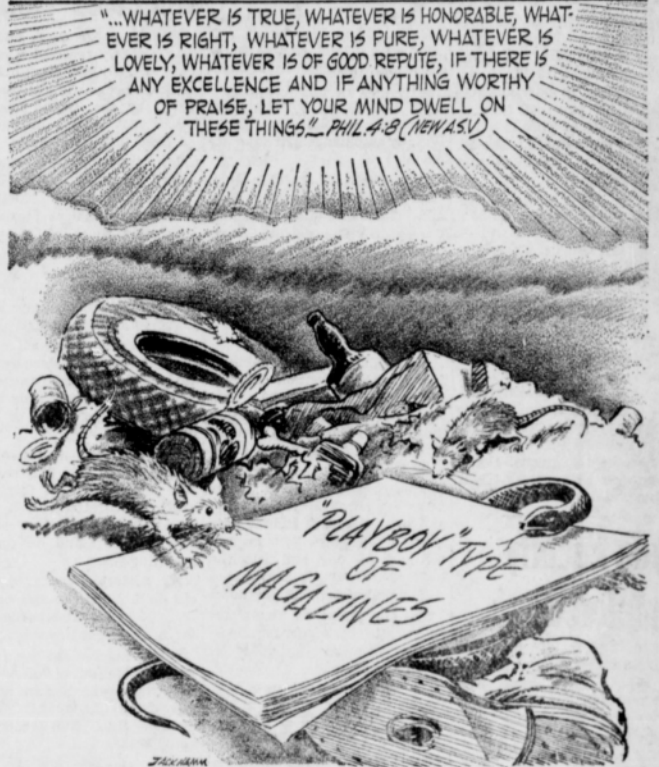

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 22)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for consolidating governmental offices and functions and allowing political subdivisions to contract for performance of governmental functions in any county."

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (SJR32)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 51. The homestead, not in a town or city, shall consist of not more than two hundred acres of land, which may be in one or more parcels, with the improvements thereon; the homestead in a city, town or village, shall consist of lot, or lots, not to exceed in value Ten Thousand Dollars, at the time of their designation as the homestead, without reference to the value of any improvements thereon; provided, that the same shall be used for the purposes of a home, or as a place to exercise the calling or business of the head of a family; provided also, that any temporary renting of the homestead shall not change the character of the same, when no other homestead has been acquired."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment increasing the value of the homestead which is exempt from forced sale."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR28)
General Election Nov. 3, 1970

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 52, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 52. (a) Except as otherwise provided by this section, the Legislature shall have no power to authorize any county, city, town or other political corporation or subdivision of the State to lend its credit or to grant public money or thing of value in aid of, or to any individual, association or corporation whatsoever, or to become a stockholder in such corporation, association or company."

(b) Under Legislative provision, any county, any political subdivision of a county, any number of adjoining counties, or any political subdivision of the State, or any defined district now or hereafter to be described and defined within the State of Texas, and which may or may not include, towns, villages or municipal corporations, upon a vote of two-thirds majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of such district or territory to be affected thereby, in addition to all other debts, may issue bonds or otherwise lend its credit in any amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property of such district or territory, except that the total bonded indebtedness of any city or town shall never exceed the limits imposed by other provisions of this Constitution, and levy and collect taxes to pay the interest thereon and provide a sinking fund for the redemption thereof, as the Legislature may authorize, and in such manner as it may authorize the same, for the following purposes to wit:

(1) The improvement of rivers, creeks, and streams to prevent overflows, and to permit of navigation thereof, or irrigation thereof, or in aid of such purposes.

(2) The construction and maintenance of canals, lakes, reservoirs, dams, pools, and waterways for the purposes of irrigation, drainage or navigation, or in aid thereof.

(3) The construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of Subsection (b) of this Section, bonds may be issued by any county in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county, for the construction, maintenance, and operation of macadamized, graveled, or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of the county, and without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation. The county may levy and collect taxes to pay the interest on the bonds as it becomes due and to provide a sinking fund for redemption of the bonds."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1970, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment authorizing any county, on the vote of a majority of its qualified property taxing electors, to issue road bonds in an amount not to exceed one-fourth of the assessed valuation of the real property in the county."

Too Dry To Plant and Too Hot To Hoe At Rowden

Since dry, hot weather seems to be here to stay, we may have to start thinking up things to do to stay busy out here on the farm.

It's too dry to plow and too hot to hoe. The cattle are all under the shade trees, so the fences won't need mending for a while.

It would be perfect weather for that "used to be" chore of drying fruit and threshing dry beans.

Peach drying started out with a bushel or two of fruit and in one way was good, when you could sneak a few bites of a good juicy peach.

What wasn't so good was when you ended up with peach juice nearly to your elbows. After the peaches were cut off then came the job of getting them to the roof top of the house to dry.

This usually ended up with the kids climbing a ladder ten feet tall and if you were afraid of high places, the top of that house looked fifty feet from the ground and standing up was

impossible. Somehow the peaches were spread out in neat little rows to dry.

Bean threshing is quite different from peach drying, since it starts with the back-breaking job of bending over to the ground to pick them into a cast-off cotton sack. Dry, hot weather is ideal for bean threshing - you wield a long stick if you are mad over having to work, take in out on that sack of beans. The harder you hit it, the quicker the beans are out of the hulls.

Who can remember holding that tub of beans high in the wind and pouring them from one tub to the other. If you are lucky, you end with with only beans, no hulls.

It is nice to go in the grocery store today and pick up that package of dried fruit or beans even if you do have to pick a few rocks out of the beans.

AUSTIN — Soaring state budget requests led the Legislative Budget Board to urge all agencies to hold spending in 1972-73 to essentials.

Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes, Board chairman, sounded the warning that a "critical financial condition" looms which demands "economy-minded" government.

In a letter directed to state agencies, Board advises that they submit suggestions at an early date on where fat can be trimmed from their appropriations requests.

"Reluctant" fat trimmers should be invited back for a second hearing before the Board, Barnes said.

Requests already submitted reportedly exceed the expected income for the 1972-73 biennium by more than \$1 billion.

Estimates of the amount of the 1971 tax bill which will be needed to support adequate services for state agencies in the face of expanding demands still range from \$350 to \$700 million.

Some range legislators fear a revenue bill of that magnitude will be virtually impossible to pass in view of the fact that lawmakers voted \$350 million in new taxes only last year.

Budget Board's recommendations on spending usually are more conservative than those finally adopted by Legislature. However, they serve as take-off points for the House Appropriations Committee and Senate Finance Committee deliberations.

AUTO INSURANCE DELAY — Texas motorists got a hint of good news: they may escape a raise in auto insurance premiums altogether this year. Charles D. Mathews, a member of the State Board of Insurance, raised hopes of that in testimony before the interim Senate committee studying rates.

Mathews also predicted the Insurance Board will come up with a rate formula that includes company income from investments, a longstanding point of debate.

"I think the companies may be sorely disappointed in the Board," said Mathews. "We may not get around to an auto rate adjustment in 1970. There are just some many hours in a day."

Company spokesmen earlier indicated they were hoping for 15 to 20 per cent rate hike this year. A delay in Insurance Board hearing dates made postponement of any increase until after November 1 virtually inevitable. A 9.9 per cent hike was granted last year.

Critics of a further increase told the Senate Committee that rates went up twice as high as the general cost of living in the last decade. Some recommended group coverage on auto insurance.

WELFARE OVERHAUL PROPOSED — Senate Welfare Reform Committee has recommended a sweeping overhaul of the system, including placing responsibility for Public Welfare Department administration in the hands of the governor.

At the same time, Committee endorsed a proposal that Welfare Department electronic data processing equipment be totally updated under a private contract to save manpower, time and money.

Study panel proposed abolishing the Texas State Board of Public Welfare and substituting an advisory panel to the governor. Also the name of the agency would be changed to Department of Human Resources under Committee recommendations to be submitted to the Legislature next January.

Computer experts estimated new electric data processing equipment could save the state an addition of 2,600 people in the Welfare Department at a cost of \$8.5 million a year.

In the second day of hearings, Committee was told that administrative costs alone of the Medicaid Program were \$11.6 million in Texas during less than three years. Committee recommended an "experienced execu-

tive having an insurance background" be employed to coordinate Medicaid functions now scattered among several branches of the Welfare agency.

SPECIAL OIL MEETING ORDERED — World oil crisis and Hurricane Celia prompted a special meeting of the Railroad Commission this week to reassess August oil allowable.

Commission earlier had set the market demand factor at 62.9 per cent for August, which would produce about 3,220,518 barrels of oil daily.

Since that action, Commission Chairman Ben Ramsey said, some companies indicated a desire to buy additional Texas crude. On the other hand, said Ramsey, Hurricane Celia complicated movements of crude from South Texas and some West Texas fields to tidewater.

Commission invited crude purchasers and transportation executives to its Monday meeting "to assess effects of Hurricane Celia on the movement of crude, as well as the logistical problems of moving crude from other Texas areas to Gulf Coast and to markets elsewhere."

LAND RECOVERY SOUGHT — School Land Board requested Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin to see if a lawsuit is feasible to recover state land from Calhoun County Navigation District.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler estimated that the district bought for \$1 an acre as much as 20,000 acres in state land it doesn't need for its functions as a navigation district.

Some of the land was resold to private developers, including the Key Allegro subdivision near Rockport, and is valued at \$33,098 an acre now.

Land Board also agreed to re-

comment that the law be changed to limit the amount of state land available to navigation districts at \$1 an acre. Legislature in 1969 voted a temporary stop in transactions pending a study. About 6 districts have purchased 130,000 acres of school land in bays for \$1 an acre. A lot of that went to the Calhoun District.

TEXAS CHALLENGES 18-YEAR-OLD VOTE — Though Texas will begin registering 18 year olds in October, Attorney General Martin is challenging the constitutionality of the congressional act which extends the vote to youngsters.

Texas became the second state to challenge the new federal law. Oregon was first (decided by the flip of a coin in the court clerk's office.)

State's complaint notes that the U. S. Constitution gives the states power to set qualifications for voting and that 45 others besides Texas now set 21 as the minimum qualifying age. Present state's limitation is reasonable exercise of constitutionally-granted power, Martin maintains.

APPOINTMENTS — Governor Preston Smith reappointed Carlton Farris of McAllen and A. M. Hervey of San Benito to the Board of Directors of Rio Gran-

de Valley Pollution Control Authority.

Ervin D. Butler of San Angelo is new community action specialist in Texas Office of Economic Opportunity.

Denny F. Pace, former faculty member at Kent State University, Ohio, will serve as a program coordinator of Texas Criminal Justice Council.

SHORT SNORTS — Attorney General Martin is asking district judge to remove a temporary restraining order (or modify it) preventing the Liquor Control Board enforcing tough private club rules while the case testing the regulation is on appeal. Lease sale brought the permanent school fund nearly \$2.5 million, according to Land Commissioner Sadler.

Texas turkey growers voted to assess themselves for a fund for research and promotion of turkeys.

District attorney in counties having separate county attorneys is not designated as a prosecuting attorney, according to a new attorney general opinion.

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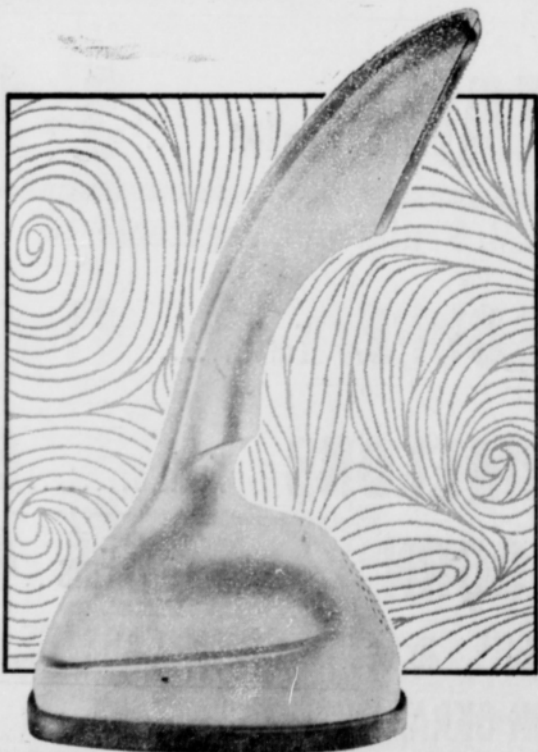

Questions Asked Internal Revenue Service by Taxpayers

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

(Q) I just got my refund. Does that mean my return was OK?

(A) The fact that you have your refund means your return contained all the information required to process it. Later, you may be asked to verify the accuracy of an item on your return, but it is not IRS policy to hold up refunds until a decision on whether to examine a return is made.

As a rule, tax may be assessed anytime within three years from the date the return was due to be filed. For this reason, keep your records on your 1969 tax return for at least three years. Records on stock purchases, property acquisitions and the like should be kept longer.

(Q) Shouldn't my employer reduce my withholding now that I've reached by 65th birthday?

(A) You are entitled to an extra exemption for age which will reduce your tax withholding. To make this change, fill out a new withholding certificate, Form W-4, and give it to your employer.

Even though you became 65 after the start of the tax year, you are entitled to the entire amount of the exemption allowed for age on your next tax return. Exemptions are not prorated.

(Q) Will profits from a sale of stock be taxed higher this year under the new law?

(A) The alternative capital gains tax has been increased. However, up to \$50,000, (\$25,000 for a married person filing a separate return), capital gains will be taxed at the same 25 percent alternative rate as they have in the past. Gains over \$50,000 will be taxed at a 29 1/2 percent rate for 1970. In 1971, the alternative capital gains tax rate will go up to 32 1/2 percent. Capital gains will be taxed at an effective maximum rate of 35 percent in 1972.

(Q) Where can I get a copy of the new withholding rates that are effective July 1, 1970 so that I can adjust my payroll?

(A) The new withholding rates are in Circular E (Rev. June 1970) which is being mailed to employers throughout the country. Extra copies may be obtained at your IRS district office.

(Q) What do you have to prove to deduct moving expenses?

(A) Two basic conditions must be met to qualify for moving expense deductions. First, your new place of employment must be 50 miles farther than your old home than your previous place of employment. To state this another way, you would meet this requirement if it would be 50 miles farther to go from your old home to your new job than it was before you changed jobs.

The other requirement is that you be a full-time employee at your new job for at least 39 weeks of the 12 months following your move.

To meet these requirements it is not necessary to have your job before you move. They can be met by persons moving to look for work as well as those who are either transferred to a new location or accept a new job that requires them to move.

(Q) I greatly increased the value of my property this spring by putting in a number of ornamental, shade and fruit trees. Can I get tax credit for what I spent?

(A) Although these expenses cannot be deducted they can be capitalized and added to the cost basis of your property. Only those costs which increased the value of the property can be added, however. The expense of maintaining your home may not be deducted or capitalized.
