Gonzales Center Seeks Financial Assistance

An urgent appeal for willing workers from Cross Plains to give a single evening of effort to an emergency state-wide "Citizens' March" for the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation (now the Texas Rehabilitation Center) is being made by R. I. Payne of Dallas, Foundation president.

Unless financial help is forthcoming in the very near future, the famous Texas rehabilitation center is faced with the probability of having to close its doors.

"We earnestly hope there is a civic, church, women's, Scout or school group in Cross Plains which would like to volunteer for this one evening's Citizens' March," Payne said. If so, its officers are urged to contact the Foundation's executive director, Walter H. Richter, P. O. Box 58, Gonzales, Texas, as soon as possible.

"It would be a tragedy," Payne observed, "if these remarkable fa-

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cities, built by and for all Texans, were lost to the thousands of citizens crippled in car wrecks and other accidents, and by strokes, arthritis, cerebral palsy and many other handicapping conditions."

Only about 30 per cent of the patients at the center are still polio victims, and there are few agencies, such as polio's March of Dimes, which can help finance the non-polio patients. Of the non-polio patients, more than 90 per cent must have some, if not total, financial assistance from the Foundation's welfare program.

The Citizens' March will be scheduled some night in September and will follow an intensive public information campaign designed to tell the people of Texas about the Foundation's new program.

"We believe a lot of Texans who want to keep this fine work going will turn on their porch lights when the signal is given," Payne said.

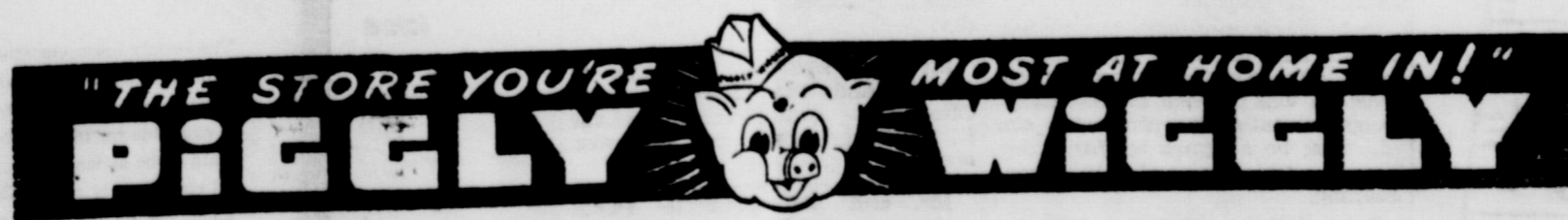

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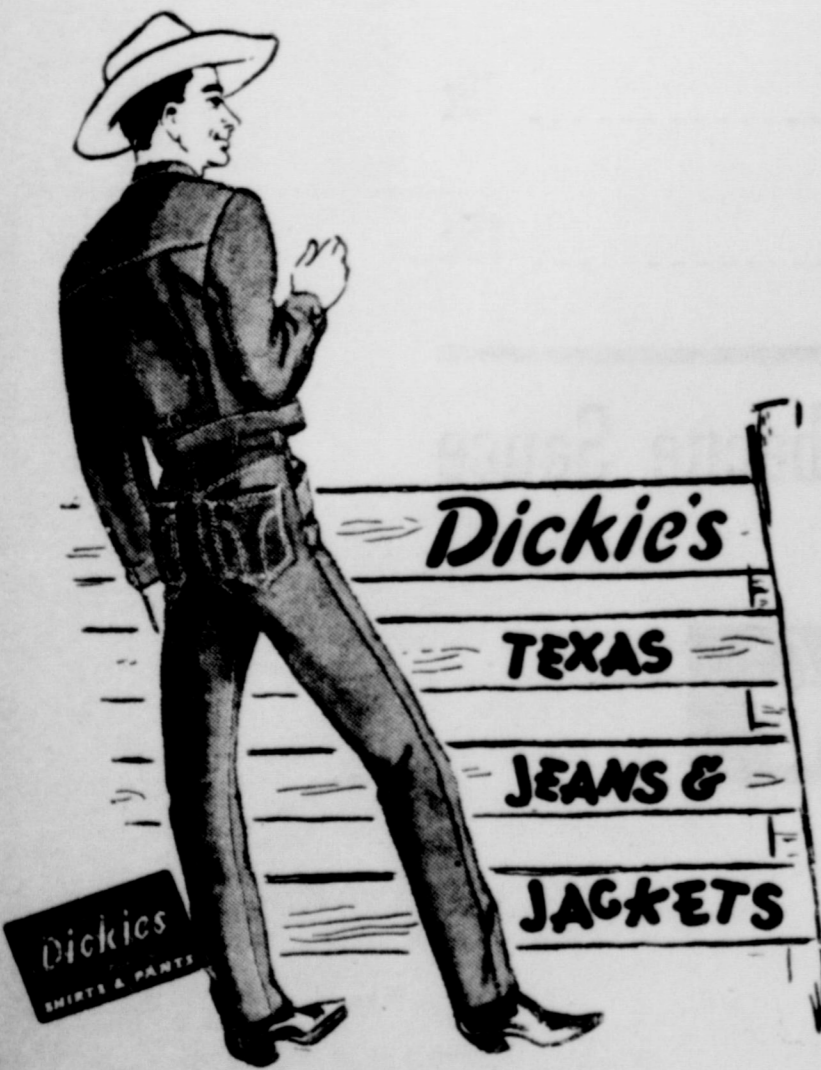

The U. S. Army today announced a special enlistment option for the 1st Battle Group, 16th Infantry, which has been designated for transfer to Europe.

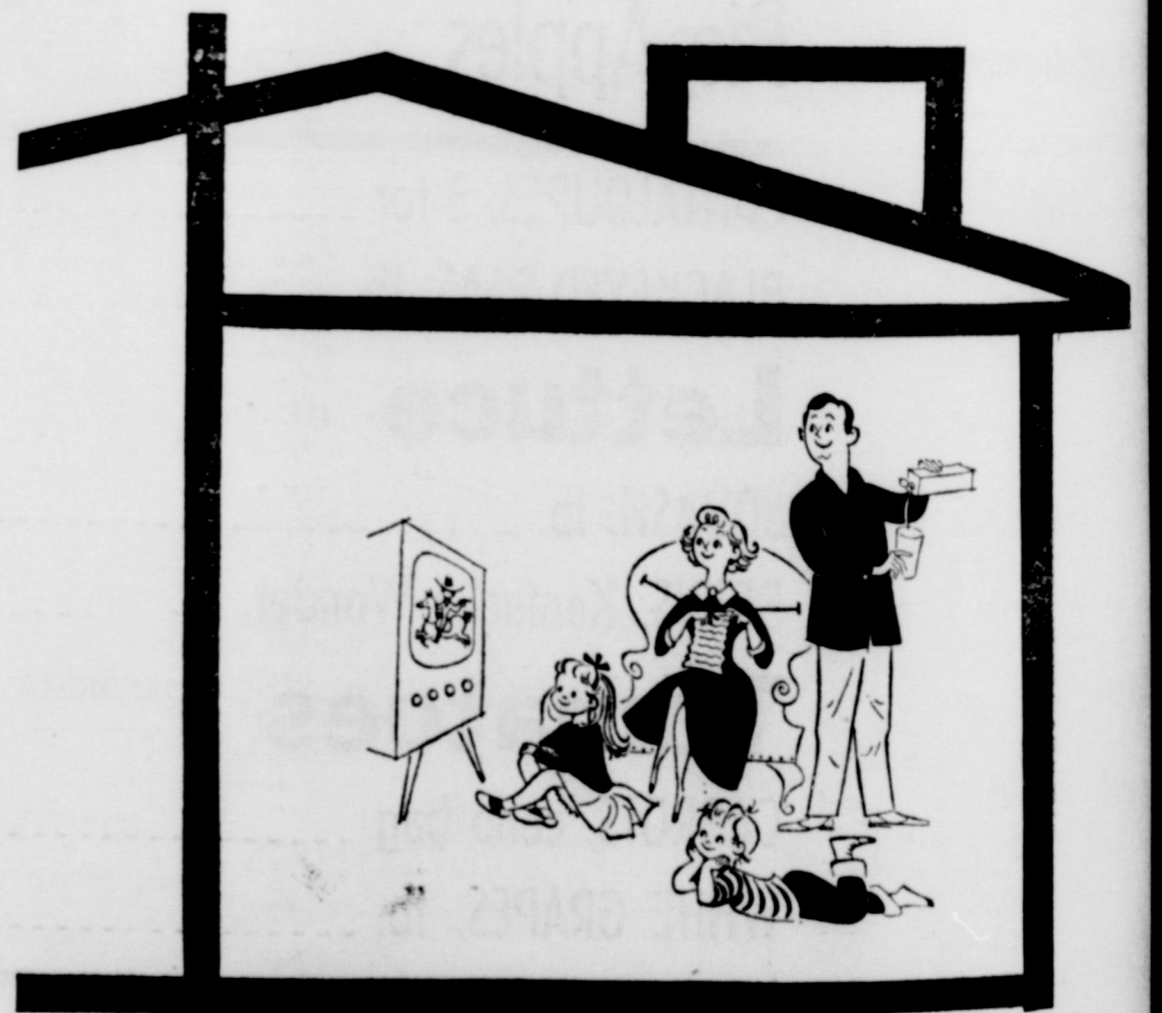

A woman should give her date of birth, all given names, and her surname. If she is married, she should also give her maiden surname and previous married names.

Officers of the Callahan County Pioneer Association estimated that the crowd attending the 20th annual reunion was the largest in the history of the organization. The old-timers met in the City Park here Friday of last week and despite sizzling hot weather thoroughly enjoyed the day of visiting and reminiscing with old friends.

Clyde White of Baird was named president of the organization for the next year. Mrs. L. L. Blackburn of Baird and Oscar Pyeatt of Clyde were re-elected vice presidents and Mrs. B. L. Boydston was re-elected to her 13th term as secretary-treasurer of the association.

White, the reunion speaker, has lived in the county 55 years. After contrasting conditions in pioneer days with those of today, White named six attributes of early-day settlers and dwelt on each. They were:

1. They were God-fearing who trust carried them through privations.
2. They established churches and schools.
3. They possessed determination and courage to brave the wilderness.
4. They had the attitude of self-reliance.
5. They had a spirit of friendship and neighborliness.
6. They were inherently honest, "their word being their bond."

The reunion was dedicated to Noah Smedley, 100, Rowden; Mrs. J. A. Jackson, 98, Baird; and Sam

Gilliland, 93, Coleman. All but Smedley were present at the reunion. Betah Freeland, former Callahan County Judge, who was born at Cottonwood 61 years ago, welcomed the horde of attendants. Among other pioneers who spoke briefly were Bob Norrell of Baird; Joe Steadham of Austin; B. F. Austin, 89, of Abilene; Mrs. L. L. Blackburn of Baird, born in the county in 1878; Mrs. Jackson, in a wheel chair, who came to the county in 1878.

Fred Stacy, Cross Plains, led congregational singing. Invocation was said by Mrs. George Baum, 79, Cross Plains. Mrs. Dorothy Boydston Harbor of Abilene led the crowd in singing "The Eyes of Texas." 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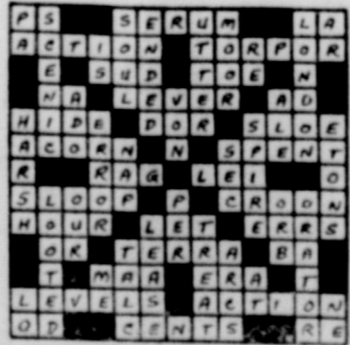
