Kiplinger Predicts Business Boom In The 1960s; Inflation Too, And Higher Wages

Washington, D. C.—Dec. 29—Business will boom in the 60s, according to a year-end report from Kiplinger organization on changes and growth during the next decade.

The business boom will flow from population growth, plus rising productivity which will increase the output per man-hour, plus higher incomes, plus the pull of people who want more and better things for themselves, plus the nimble shifting of business patterns, Kiplinger says.

Companies will expand, despite painful and expensive growth. They must add capacity, products, diversity and new outlets as a hedge against the rapid changes that would drive them down and possibly out.

More chains, larger stores and many stores taking on additional lines is the revolutionary picture for merchandising in the 60s. The food store will become a general store, with other things than groceries. The end of the trend is not yet for the super-supermarket.

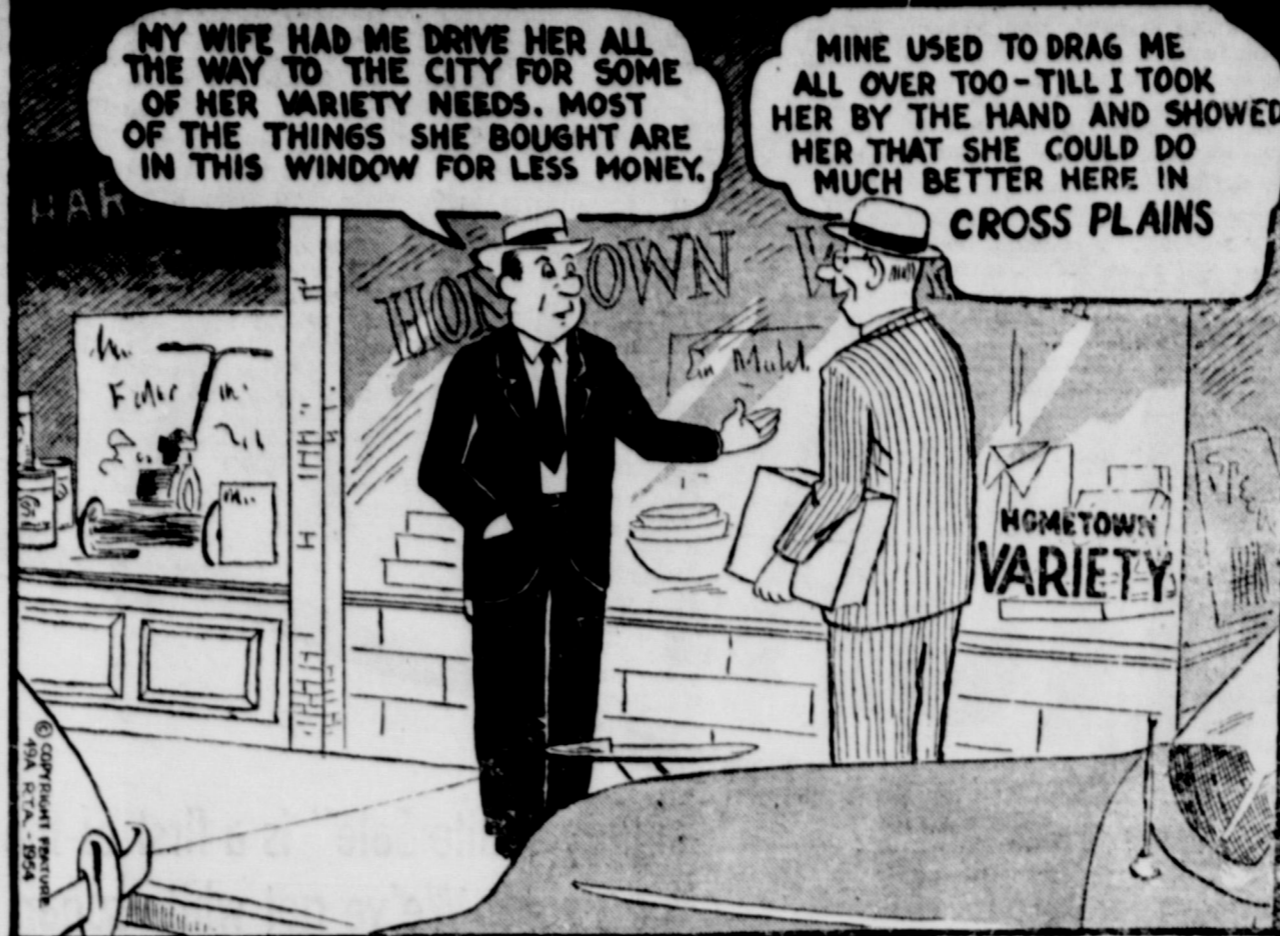

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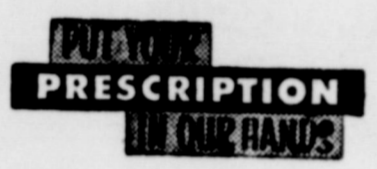

OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

Last year's harvest of wildlife resources in Texas was the greatest in the memory of many old-timers. Thanks to good wildlife management, areas that were "shot out" 25 years ago had top hunting in 1958. The woods were full of deer. Quail were more numerous perhaps than ever before in Texas. And the duck and goose population from Canada was very good. This all gets back to management. Naturally it had to start with control. Limits had to be put on the bag, and seasons had to

be set. All of this, however, would have been to no avail without land management. We have in Texas a rather paradoxical situation. The game belongs to the people—you and me and everyone else. The land on which it lives, for the most part, belongs to the individual land owner. There is very little public domain in Texas, and it also falls under controls. Every Texas landowner is interested in having some wildlife resources on his land. Most landowners like to hunt and fish a little. But it doesn't take too much to

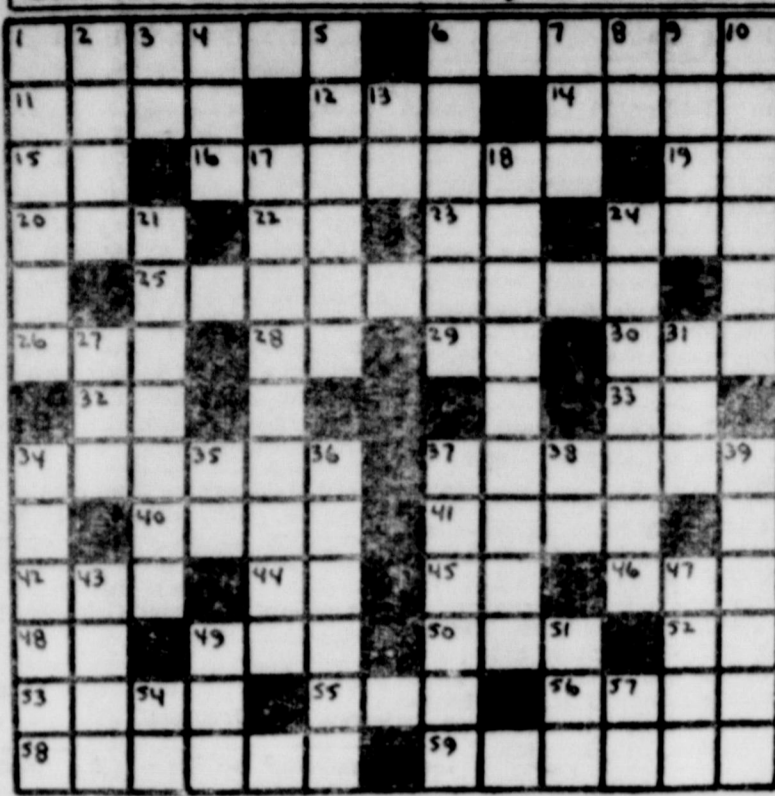

satisfy them. Hunters must remember that farmers and ranchers have to grow crops or raise cattle to make a living. They build fences to keep their livestock in . . . and to keep people out. Occasionally someone poaches and kills game that belongs to one landowner, but has taken up residence on another man's private property. As a result the poacher finds him-

self confronted with the justice of the peace, who slaps a fine on him, usually amounting to forty some odd dollars.

With population growing it became the problem of those who placed controls on wildlife to find a way for every man to hunt. First the sportsman got together. They didn't have all the answers, so they began to look to science. Biologists were brought into the picture.

They looked around and saw that much of the cover was being destroyed from the land. There wasn't ample food and wildlife was starving to death, or moving to some other place that was more inviting.

Biologists approached the landowners, who asked the normal question of "why should we?" It was then up to the biologists and the sportsmen to convince the landowner that wildlife can be harvested the same as any other crop.

Some landowners had known this for years. That didn't stop them from overgrazing their land, however. They'd lease a pasture to some unsuspecting deer hunter for \$50 a gun and there wouldn't be anything but a few old does around. So the hunter was unhappy.

Unfortunately there is no law covering it, but the man who knowingly takes money for a hunting lease, with full knowledge that there isn't sufficient game on the place to give the hunter a fair shake, is just as criminal as the fence crawler.

Convincing the landowner that he should put his holdings under a management program wasn't the easiest thing. In the first place there were conflicting ideas by some of the experts.

For instance one group of government officials told the landowner to knock down all the pesky mesquite and cedar on his land. Another group told him to save some for cover for wildlife.

Also there are examples in Texas where some very large and influential landowners have absolutely destroyed wild game habitat without regard for its future. Now they were sorry.

As a result most owners today are finding more answers before they destroy everything on their holdings.

To show what land management can do, the Game & Fish Commission, with funds from hunting and fishing licenses and from excise tax on equipment, bought a number of areas where wildlife restoration programs were put into effect.

A study was made of the carrying capacity of the land, what would grow well and what wildlife would thrive best. As a result some findings have been revealed that will help hunting and fishing through the remainder of time.

Adjacent landowners, watching the program, now are beginning to adopt many of these management practices. As a result they are providing food and cover. They are balancing their deer herd sex ration by allowing the taking of does.

Other landowners have done the same thing with small game. They have provided cover for birds, and food for them to eat. Their fence rows have multiflora roses. They are leaving cover at the end of the turn rows. And they are careful in harvesting their crops, not to destroy nests.

In addition many of them are planting birds. For example, there is a state bird farm at Tyler that produces several thousand quail each year. These are sold to landowners at a fraction of their cost, for restocking purposes.

Naturally if a farmer spends money for a few birds, he's going to provide adequate food and cover for them. As a result he'll have good shooting. He will be entitled to ask a fee from his friends in town to hunt on his property. After all, when he goes to town he must

Highlights
AND Sidelights

news-making year, 1958 was the id-blowing scandals and headlines that erupted in the Capitol in '56 and '57. It was a momentous year in many ways. Elections. Recession. Treasury bankrupt. Much talk of taxes.

Research reports were made by the State Tax Study Commission, the Texas Research League, Hale-Aikin Committee. Reports came from the Board of Engineers, Higher Education Commission and Legislative Council.

In all, 1958 was a year of surmounting critical self-examination. All the research reports were lengthy stories, little head-lines. Few are complete stories. They will be continued into the next legislative year of 1959. Month by month review of 1958, listing top news events, both good and bad, depending on your viewpoint.

January—Gov. Price Daniel returned to be gloomy about state finances. He said he wasn't convinced the State Treasury would be in the red by 1959, as some said, and the need for new taxes.

State Water Planning Board met with the aim of doubling Texas' water storage capacity.

Land Commissioner Earl Warren resigned to become A&M President. Bill Allcorn of Wood succeeded Rudder.

Groups of optometrists squared a court battle to decide level of price advertising.

Day satellites swirled overhead and a lot of people were worried whether our schools were as good as Russia's.

Hale-Aikin Committee asked for grass-roots action for school improvement.

February—Gov. Daniel proposed precinct convention be abolished and delegates to the county convention be named by direct private vote. It was a surprise countermove to the "code of ethics" sign being conducted by the state as part of its drive to wrest control from the governor.

Comptroller Robert S. Caldwell predicted a \$12,000,000 state deficit and need for \$100,000,000 in new taxes by 1959. Democrats announced bluntly that was a recession.

March—Texas oil allowable yielded to nine producing days. Imports Study Commission had excess stocks on over-production during Suez crisis, competition from foreign oil.

Employment payments hit a double that of a year ago. Many Texas farmers reported "too wet to plow."

April—Oil allowable tumbled to all-time low, eight producing

cities, concentrating graduate work at UT and A&M. Texans debated merits of nine proposed amendments to the state Constitution.

November—State fiscal officials upped their estimates of needed new revenue to nearly \$200,000,000. Industry leaders called the oil industry "sick." Railroad Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson called for mandatory import controls.

Many public officials were disappointed over amendment voting. Salary raises for legislators and pension plans for county officials got thumbs down.

December—Waning weeks of '58 saw a flood of legislative proposals flow into Austin. Hale-Aikin Committee, joined by Texas State Teachers Association, asked more pay for teachers, more courses, longer school year. Other wanted safety legislation, fiscal help for cities, flexible auto insurance rates, small loan company regulation, etc.

State Tax Study Commission made no recommendation beyond its reporting of the fiscal facts of life in Texas. Governor Daniel estimated the state would need \$65,000,000 a year more for future spending plus \$55,000,000 to wipe out the deficit. He said he thought it could be done without general sales or income taxes.

And the safety crusade moved toward an unknown outcome as officials, joined by newsmen and hundreds of billboards, sought to cut the usual holiday highway death toll.

Whatever happens to the piles of data and recommendations in '58, their accumulation made '58 a significant year. It was a year in which many thoughtful people sought to take a grasp on the problems and promise of Texas' future.

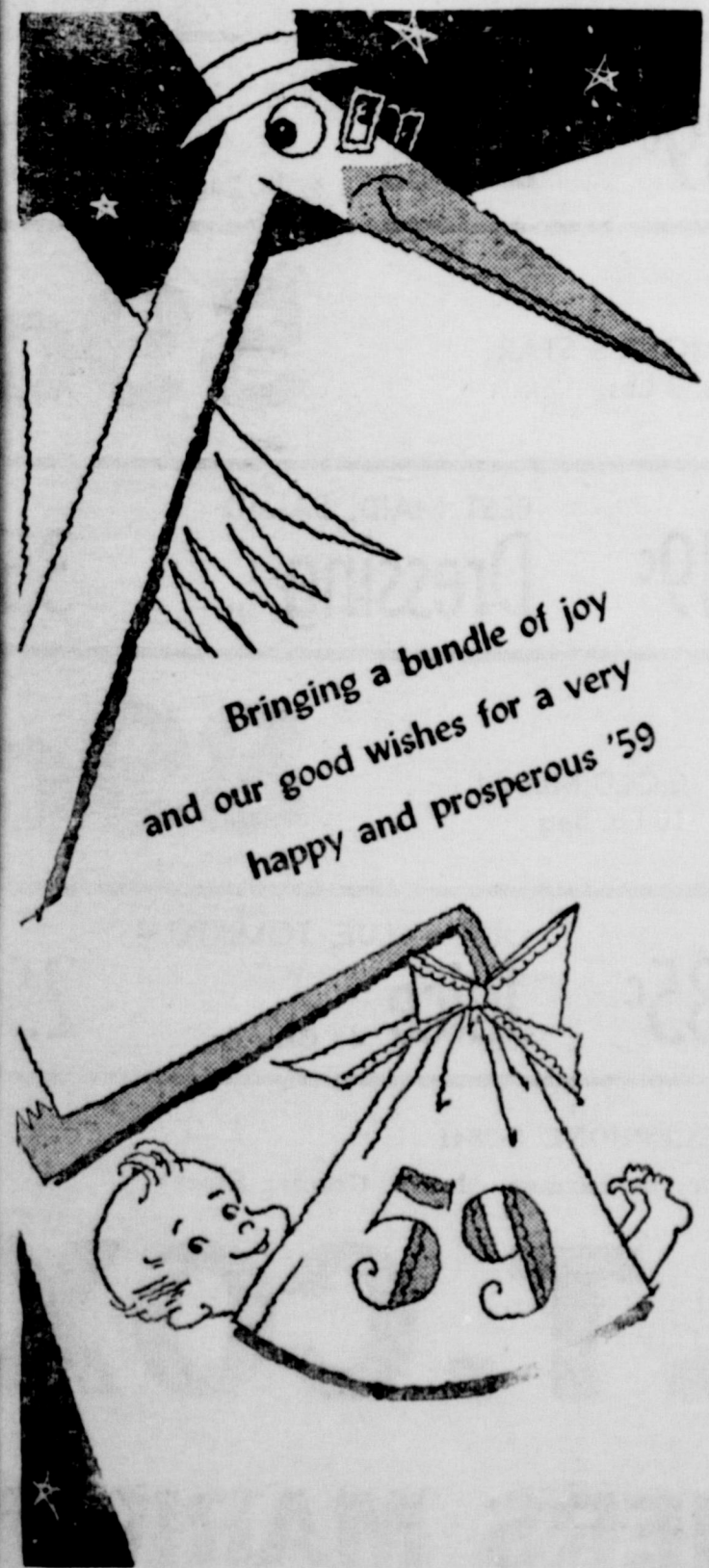

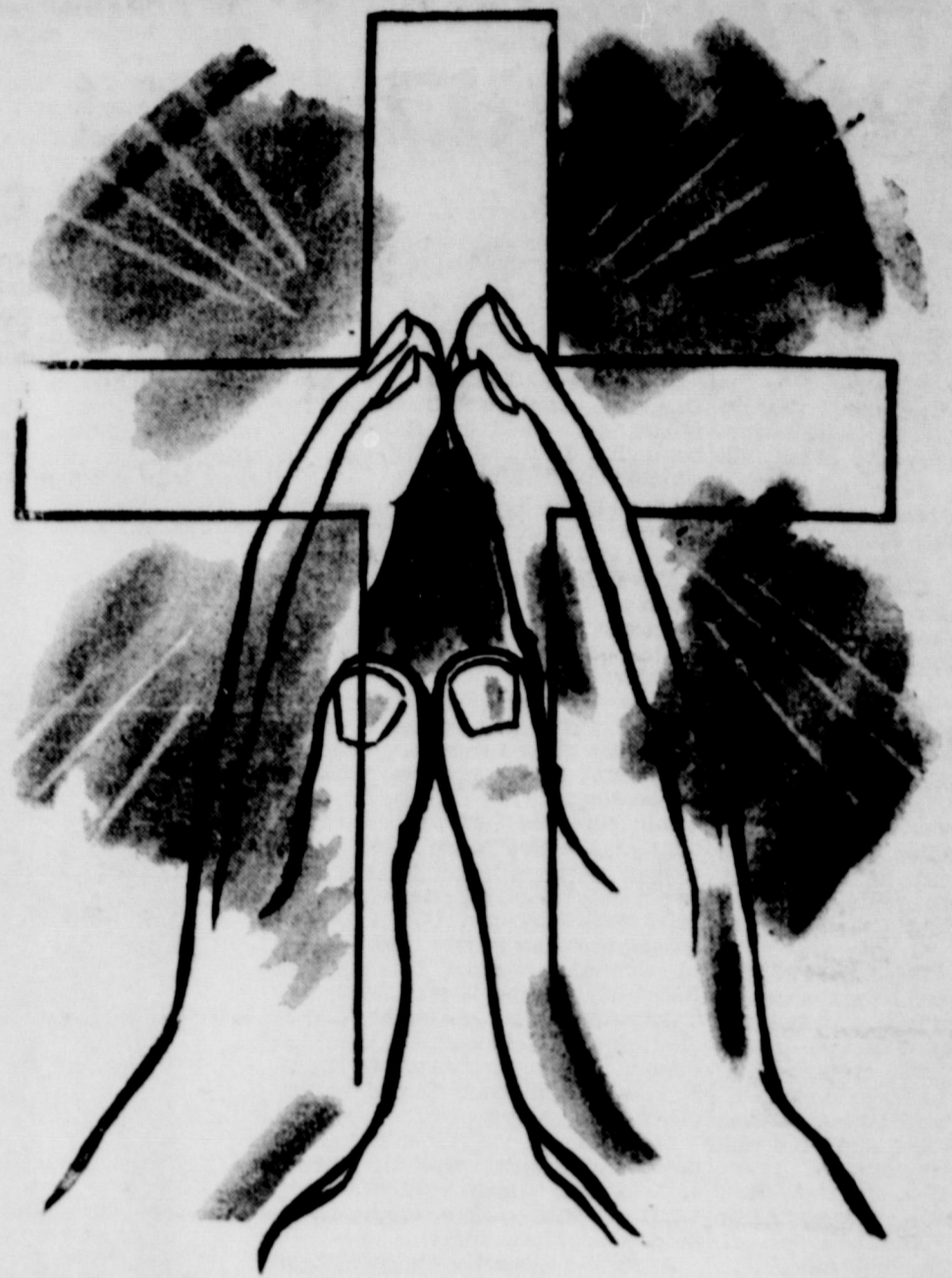
