CROPS, CATTLE THREATENED

Ice Storm Caused Concern To Area

Farmers and ranchers in the Friona area had cause for concern the first part of the week, when an early ice storm caught the area in a wintry grip, once again delaying harvest activities, and posing a threat to cattle as well.

Maize farmers, who have been getting all sorts of bad breaks from the weather in recent weeks, were beginning to harvest in some sections on Saturday and Sunday, but a wet cold front pushed into the area

early Monday and ended the harvest again.

Monday was cold and misty, with the temperature hovering just above freezing. Then Tuesday found the mercury dipping to 26 degrees, and the moisture which had been deposited was suddenly turned to ice.

Sleet and snow fell intermittently beginning before dawn on Tuesday and continuing throughout the day. Little additional moisture was received, but it posed a tremendous threat to crops and cattle being affected by the weather.

Particularly ominous was the prediction Tuesday night of a possible new accumulation of snow during the night.

This did not occur, however, as clearing began during the night and Wednesday started out with a bright sun shining.

The extent of damage to the maize was hard to gauge. "If we had received the big snow Tuesday night, or a hard wind, it would have all been flat,"

predicted Arthur Drake of Friona Wheat Growers.

"And if the snow had come, and then melted, the fields would have been too muddy to get into for some time, even if the maize was dry enough," he pointed out.

Drake, longtime manager of the Farmers Elevator, said this was one of the worst ice storms for this early in the season that he could remember.

"We usually always have some bad weather that catches part of the crop in the field, but I don't remember ever having this much of the crop left," he said.

Drake said that "maybe" 10 per cent of the 1972 maize crop had been harvested. Many farmers haven't harvested a bit; some have just started, while a select few are "over the hump."

For all of the bad breaks farmers have had in recent days, they were extremely thankful to see the sun on Wednesday.

Voters Poised For General Election

Next Tuesday, Friona area residents will join those across the nation in exercising their right to vote, as General Election time rolls around once again.

Contested races will appear on the ballot, all the way from the office of President down to the race for Commissioner of Precinct 1, which includes the Friona, Black and Lakeview voting boxes.

Perhaps the top race on the ballot will be the race for U.S. Senator, where incumbent John Tower, Republican who has held the position the last ten years, is challenged by conservative Democrat Barefoot Sanders.

The gubernatorial race, although on the surface not generating the interest of two years ago when Republican Paul Eggers ran Preston Smith a respectable race, might be surprising, depending upon how the Republican candidate, Hank Grover, does in the large metropolitan centers. Dolph Briscoe wrested the Democratic nomination away from Smith, who had served three terms. Briscoe is generally popular in the state's agricultural circles, being a cattle raiser himself.

The other statewide race that has generated more than passing interest is the race for state treasurer, in which the Republican candidate, Maurice

Angley, is waging an all-out battle against the longtime office-holder, 80-year old Jesse James.

The commissioner's race, generally low-key in nature, at least is giving local voters more than the usual reason for going to the polls.

Incumbent Tom Lewellen is opposed by his brother-in-law, Forrest Osborn, who held the office as a Democrat some 16 years ago.

Osborn says he believes he can return Friona and Precinct 1 to "a place of prominence in county government."

Osborn has made several charges concerning the operation of the county government, hinting some things could be changed for the better.

Lewellen says he has always cast his vote as a commissioner with the best interests of Precinct 1 and Parmer County in mind. "I stand on my record. It is open for anyone to look at," the present commissioner says.

Osborn opposed Lewellen in the Democratic primary of 1964, but was defeated. This time he chose to run on the Republican ticket.

Other county officials up for re-election are unopposed. These include Sheriff Charles Lovelace, county attorney Hershel Harding and tax assessor-collector Hugh Moseley. District Attorney Jack Young of Muleshoe is also unopposed in his bid for re-election.

In addition to the political races, voters are being asked to vote on 14 proposed constitutional amendments.

The gist of the proposed amendments can be found on the sample ballot which is presented on an inside page of this issue.

Poll Sites Are Given

Polling places for the General Election will be as follows: Friona voters will cast their ballots in the hallway between the Friona Junior High School Gymnasium and the auditorium. Rosella Landrum is election judge.

At Black, the election will be held at the Tri-County Elevator. Mrs. Ethel Bengler is election judge.

At Lakeview, the polling place is Otho Whitefield's residence. Whitefield is election judge.

Rhea voters will cast their ballots at the Parish Hall, Immanuel Lutheran Church. Raymond Schueler is election judge.

Lazbuddie voters will vote at Lazbuddie High School. The polls will be open from 8 a.m. until 7 p.m.

Chiefs Seeking To Rebound On Friday

The Friona Chieftains will attempt to rebound from their heart-breaking 21-14 loss to Littlefield when they host the Dimmitt Bobcats in the final home game for 1972 on Friday.

The Chiefs, still hanging to a thread of hope for a share of the District 3-AA championship, needs wins over Dimmitt and Morton in order to maintain these hopes.

Dimmitt is 2-5 for the season, and is 0-1 in district play. The Bobcats' only district outing was their 21-2 loss to Littlefield in the opening week of district play. The team has had two weeks to rest up from that loss.

The loss to Littlefield was bound to have been a big let-down to the Friona team, but just how much will be seen on Friday.

The team also was prevented

from working out the first part of the week, due to the cold, icy weather.

"We went out for a short time Monday, but we couldn't do much," Owen said. As Wednesday dawned clear, there was hopes for at least one good workout for the week.

The Chieftain coach said he was "real proud" of the attitude displayed by the players, after their heartbreaking loss at Littlefield last Friday.

"I was real concerned after that game, as to how the players would react. I think they'll give a good effort against Dimmitt," he said.

Owen said that Dimmitt's tough defense has been his chief source of worry in preparing for the Bobcat game. "Although Dimmitt has lost five of their seven games, no one has really blasted them," he pointed out.

In addition, the Chieftain gridmaster points out that Dimmitt is beginning to get some backfield men back on the roster who have been out, and their offense will no doubt be improved for Friday's game.

Bobcat fullback Pete Davilla and halfback Albert Ewing have been out with injuries, which has hampered Dimmitt's attack.

Senior Terry Powell directs the Bobcat offense. Other players to watch are back Gary Wise, center Jim Bob Ellis and defensive star Brad Sanders.

The Bobcats and Chiefs have met on the football field a total of 36 times since 1930, with Dimmitt holding a commanding lead of 26 wins against nine for Friona. There has been one tie. However, Friona holds the edge in games played during the past nine years, having won five to four for the Bobcats.

The game marks the 15th consecutive year for the two old rivals to have met on the gridiron. The series dates back into the 1920s, although some of the early scores are not available.

Dimmitt won the 1971 game at Dimmitt, 16-14.

Anndrea's For Real: Still Tops Contest

Anndrea Wilkins is proving that she is no flash in the pan in the Friona Star's football contest.

Miss Wilkins has now led the contest for four weeks out of the current eight-week duration. The contest pace-setter was one of 13 contestants who

correctly picked 14 games on last week's contest slate, to maintain her two-point lead over the rest of the field in the contest.

Fred (Judge) Barker, in first place two weeks ago and second last week, dropped another notch despite a respectable score of 12. Barker is now tied with Winifred Hurst and Benny Pryor with a score of 94.

A total of 27 contestants have scores of 90 or better. Another 52 contestants have scored 85 or better through eight weeks, and another 47 are between 80 and 85.

Winning first prize in the weekly contest was Patrick Pace, who has a good average but has not turned in his entry every week. Pace was one of those scoring 14, and had the closest guess on the Friona-Littlefield game score. He guessed the score at 21-18 favoring Friona, to claim the weekly \$5,000 first prize.

SCS Plugs For State Amendments

The state association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts of which the Parmer County SWCD is a member is encouraging all people voting on November 7 to support amendments nine and twelve.

Leon Grissom, chairman of the Parmer County SWCD, said that these constitutional amendments will make it possible for district directors to be elected from well-qualified men who are serving on other boards and committees. This will improve the quality of the soil and water program in Parmer County.

SCS Gives Summary Of State Resolutions

At the state association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts annual meeting on October 18 and 19, several resolutions were passed that are of interest to Parmer County farmers.

One resolution passed was for changing the present state law concerning conservation districts to make it more inclusive of environmental problems.

Another resolution was to request the Governor of Texas to

include at least one farmer and rancher on the Texas Water Quality Board.

The resolution calling for districts to administer any land use planning regulations was passed.

The final resolution passed was to protect agriculture land from excessive taxes caused by inflated valuations.

The resolution concerning use of prime agriculture land for other than agriculture was turned down.

At Home In Parmer County

All of us get information from time to time through the mail on insurance policies, so I thought the following information might be of interest to you:

Most order insurance policies can be worthwhile if the consumer is fully aware of what he is buying. If he isn't, later he may find that his insurance doesn't pay for things he mistakenly thought it did.

Four points are important in studying an insurance policy.

First the buyer should understand what happens if he has any "pre-existing" health conditions.

Second, he should know how much his policy will pay per day.

Third, he should check time limitations on collecting money from the company.

Fourth, he should learn how much he must pay in premiums.

Although many mail order policies don't require a physical examination, they do have some special limitations on benefits

for pre-existing health conditions.

Most policies, for example, have a two-year waiting period before the policy holder can collect on pre-existing conditions—whether he knows about the pre-existing condition or not.

Also, most such policies don't pay out-of-hospital benefits, so how much they pay per day is an important point to know.

In addition to the study of the policy, more steps are advised in considering such insurance.

Littlefield Bursts Chieftains' Bubble

Subtract one or two plays, and the Friona Chieftains would be atop the District 3-AA standings this week, still unbeaten.

But you can't always subtract mistakes, so the Friona Chieftains will have to accept the 21-14 defeat at the hands of Littlefield last Friday, instead of the possible 14-13 victory the team was headed toward.

In one of the most heart-breaking sports losses in recent years for Friona, the Chieftains saw Littlefield block a punt and score an easy third-quarter touchdown for the win, as the Wildcats otherwise were held to only two first downs during the defense-minded second half.

That TD, plus the one in the second quarter when Friona gave Littlefield 30 yards in penalties to assist a 60-yard drive, spelled doom to the Chieftains' hopes for a win, although the team had played brilliantly otherwise, and led the hometown Wildcats throughout most of the game.

Friona was leading, 14-13, midway through the third quarter, when Alan Mackey fired through to block Johnny Bandy's punt, and gave Littlefield first-and-goal on the Frionafive. Pat Henderson scored on the first play, and Littlefield was ahead for the first time, 19-14.

Just to prove that the luck had swung to the Wildcats, they tried a pass for two extra points, and a Friona defender batted the ball right into the arms of Littlefield's General Lewis, for the successful conversion and final margin of 21-14.

The Chieftains came out looking like championship material. Johnny Bandy returned the opening kickoff to the Friona 29, and then proceeded to direct one of Friona's best sustained drives of the entire season.

Clay Bandy's off-tackle stunts, mixed with brother Johnny's keeper plays moved the ball steadily upfield. In fact, the Chiefs didn't need a third down play until they reached the Littlefield 22, when Johnny called a sneak good for a first down at the 19.

He did it again at the 13, and moved the ball five yards to the Wildcat eight, giving Friona first and goal. From there, James Bartlett gained three, Clay Bandy four, and then Clay scored the touchdown on third down from the one.

Kevin Wiseman's kick was perfect, and Friona had taken a 7-0 lead while using up 6:27 of clock time in a perfect drive consuming 15 plays.

The Chiefs appeared to be stopping Littlefield's first series of plays, but Lewis broke on a third and 13 play, gaining 29 yards to the Chieftain 38. A 15-yard penalty was tacked on when Johnny Bandy was called for a personal foul, setting the Wildcats up on the Friona 23.

Littlefield scored in four plays, with Lewis going the final two yards. The extra point kick was good, tying the score with 2:22 left in the opening period.

The clock also went haywire at this point, and as soon as officials were notified, they kept the time on the field for the rest of the game.

Friona couldn't move on its second possession, and had to punt. However, Henderson fumbled on the first down play, and Ricky London recovered at the

Littlefield 35. The Chiefs got another break when a flag cost the 'Cats 15 yards on a personal foul, moving the ball to the 16.

Johnny Bandy's keeper set the team up first and goal at the five, and an offside penalty against Littlefield moved the ball to the two.

After changing ends of the field for the quarter, Friona scored on the second play of the second quarter, with Bartlett sweeping right end on a pitch-out, getting a clearing block from Louis Lee, who wiped out two Wildcat defenders.

Wiseman's second kick made the Friona fans cheer wildly, as the Chiefs now had a 14-7 lead, and they were making it look easy.

Perhaps it made the team a little reckless. Littlefield got a good return from Henderson on their 40. On the first play, Lewis gained five, and was again hit late by a Chieftain defender, for 15 gift yards.

On the very next play, Littlefield quarterback Terry Bryson was hit hard after he had thrown an incomplete pass, and the Wildcats got 15 additional free steps.

This moved the ball to the Friona 25, and the inspired Wildcats scored in five plays, with J.E. Johnson going in from the one.

But Friona got one last break. The snap went over the holder's head on the PAT try, and a desperation pass fell harmlessly incomplete, so Friona held onto a 14-13 lead that seemed shaky

at the time, but loomed larger as time went on.

Littlefield had a last-gasp drive prior to halftime, moving to the Friona 23, where a hurried field goal attempt, from the 30 (a 40-yard try), was barely wide to the left at the halftime gun.

On Friona's first offensive thrust of the second half, the team had a bad break after Johnny Bandy had gained five yards to the Littlefield 38. Already apparently down, Bandy turned to lay the ball down, a Wildcat defender grabbed it, and the officials ruled a fumble and Littlefield took over.

The Chieftain defense stiffened, however, and another field goal try, this one from the 19, was also a shade wide, as Friona maintained its lead.

But the bad field position was to be a factor. Able to gain only seven yards, the Chiefs faced a punting situation from their 27. Bandy didn't see Mackey in time, and this resulted in the blocked punt that made the difference in the game.

Bandy had three scoring chances in the fourth quarter. The team drove from its own 30 to the Littlefield 17, before a fourth down halfback pass from Bartlett was intercepted by the Wildcats.

On the next play, Henderson fumbled for the second time and Friona grabbed it at the 19.

On second down Bandy was tackled all the way back at the 42 on a passing try, and on fourth down he elected to punt.

The punt was a good one, being killed by the Chiefs at the Littlefield five. The 'Cats couldn't get out of the hole, and after a short punt, Friona again had a chance, taking over on the Littlefield 35.

Louis Lee, who apparently had been well-scouted by Littlefield, gave the team a first down on a great second effort burst on a vital third down play, as the game entered its final two minutes.

Bandy tried a quickie pass to Ted King, but King was raked and dropped the ball. After Lee picked up three yards, Bandy overthrew King, as he was being rushed. On the all-important fourth down play, from the 22, Bandy was blitzed for a 10-yard loss, and that was the ball game.

Clay Bandy gained 88 yards on 22 carries. This was seven yards more than the Wildcat star, Lewis gained on 18 tries.

Penetrations were tied at four each; first downs were tied at 15-all, and the yardage was also close. Friona would have had a good lead in total yardage, except for the minus yardage suffered by Bandy on four passing plays, which resulted in deductions totalling 41 yards.

Just for a change, since he had an open date, Brown L. Smith went to a football game. The Dimmitt coach drifted down the road to Littlefield to watch the Wildcats play Friona. And since he happened to be handy, and just happened to bring a pencil, he took a few notes.

Of course, since he has to take his Bobcats to Friona next week, there was more than just coincidence in his presence, as well as his note-taking.

Even a coach has to enjoy watching such a contest as this, and Smith admitted it. "That was some game," he admitted. "That thing could have gone either way."

And both Littlefield's Jerry Blakeley and Friona's Bob Owen would be forced to agree, after the Wildcats pulled out a 21-14 decision between the District 3-AA leaders. Now, Littlefield owns a 2-0 district record with games remaining with Morton this week and Olton. The Wildcats could clinch a tie for the title—but not the playoff—against Morton this week.

Olton, which overcame Morton 13-10 last Friday in the other 3-AA game, now has a 1-1 record—along with Friona—and is in a position to go to the playoffs. And it takes the week off this time to prepare for Littlefield.

Smith knew about Littlefield; he had lost to the Wildcats 21-2 the previous week. But he had not seen Friona, and admitted he did not know "a whole lot about them. But they looked good."

"Littlefield did about the same thing against them as they did us; (J.E.) Johnson and General Lewis (running backs) looked good again. And their quarterback (Terry Bryson) is coming on, too."

"But, that blocked punt had to be the turning point. Until then, Friona's ground game had really looked good."

Friona had led since it scored on the opening drive of the game and held a 14-13 lead midway of the third period, but Alan Mackey flanked the Friona blockers and blocked a punt. Littlefield took over on the five and Pat Henderson scored on the first

play for the winning difference.

The Wildcats relied on defense from that point, and although giving up yardage did not give up points. The win left Littlefield and Friona with 6-2 seasonal records.

Olton also had to come from behind, as Glen Johnson broke for 31 yards with 6:07 left in the game to lift the Mustangs to a win over Morton. Morton had taken a 10-7 lead in the second quarter on Ted Thomas' two-yard run and 33-yard field goal.

The game was closer on statistics than score, as Olton owned a 17-16 lead in first downs and 281-280 edge in yardage.

This week, Dimmitt will be physically stronger as it goes against Friona. The week off gave Smith time to let some injuries mend, and he expects to have running backs Albert Ewing and Pete Davila healthy. Both have been out four weeks with injuries, Davila with a back problem and Ewing with an ankle hurt.

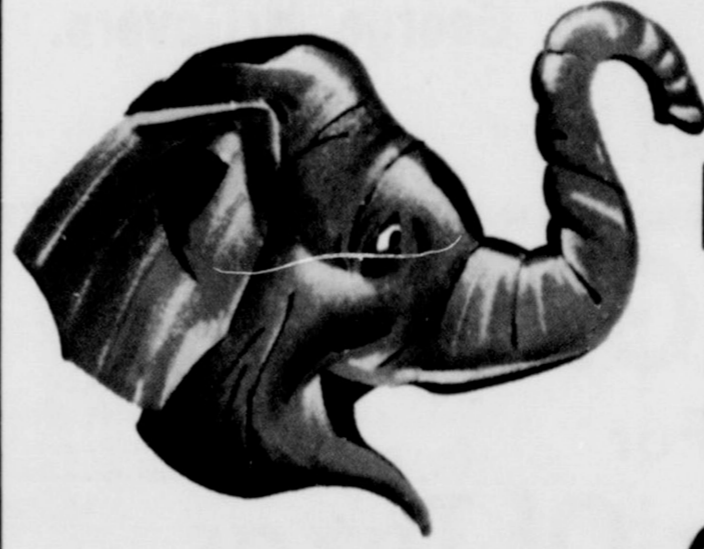

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first nine months of 1972 shows a total of 114 accidents resulting in three persons killed and 66 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety shows a total in September, 1972 of 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 499 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured. This was 62 more accidents, 12 less fatalities and 67 more injured in 1972 at the same period of time.

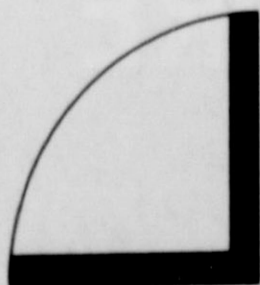

All AAFP members must complete 150 hours of continuing education every three years.
