"And if the snow had come, and then melted, the fields would have been too muddy to get into for some time, even if the maize was dryenough," he pointed out. Drake, longtime manager of the Farmers Elevator, said this was one of the worstice storms

he could remember. "We usually always have some bad weather that catches part of the crop in the field, but I don't remember ever having this much of the crop left," he

Drake said that "maybe" 10 per cent of the 1972 maize crop had been harvested. Many farmers haven't harvested a bit; some have just started, while a select few are "over the hump."

For all of the bad breaks farmers have had in recent days, they were extremely thankful to see the sun on Wednesday.
