VERA PEARL BUNNELL GETS NATIONAL HONOR AWARD IN CEREMONIES HERE

Mrs. Vera Pearl Bunnell, language arts teacher in the seventh and eighth grades of Cross Plains Schools, the past week received the Valley Forge Classroom Teachers' Medal for her outstanding work to create a better understanding of our American way of life and her "patriotic contribution to notable youth leadership in the highest tradition of our free nation."

Announcement and notice of the award were made by Bob Lawrence, principal speaker at the high school commencement exercises held at the school auditorium here Friday night of the past week. The medal, along with a citation and a certificate, was presented by Paul L. Whitton, superintendent of schools, at morning services of the First Methodist Church here Sunday, May 24.

Dr. Kenneth D. Wells, president of Freedoms Foundation, in notifying Mrs. Bunnell of the award said: "Your exceptional classroom work in behalf of responsible patriotic citizenship and the American way of life has been singled out as an important professional contribution to maintaining our American Constitutional Republic."

A distinguished jury, composed of State Supreme Court Justices and elected representatives of national patriotic, service and veterans organizations, selected the award recipients from among the records of teachers from every corner of the country whose names had been submitted by citizens interested in continuing high levels of citizenship education in American schools.

Nominations are invited from all Americans—either for Teachers' Medal consideration or in the Foundation's general program which honors people in all walks of life for things they have written, said or done to improve knowledge and appreciation of our American way of life.

Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge is a non-profit, non-political, non-sectarian organization. President Dwight D. Eisenhower is honorary chairman. The Foundation's funds come from the widest national sources—individuals, corporations and foundations.

Nineteen other Texans were also named to receive the award. Mrs. Bunnell has taught in the Cross Plains schools for the past 20 years, and before coming here she taught eight years at Burkett and three years in McCulloch County.

She graduated from Burkett High School and attend Weatherford Junior College and received her BS degree from Daniel Baker College, Brownwood. She received her ME degree from McMurry College, Abilene.

Along with teaching school she has been actively engaged in youth work at the First Methodist Church here since 1942, and has also served as church organist for a number of years. Mrs. Bunnell is also a member of the Methodist W.S.C.S. Other civic endeavors include work with the Girl Scouts, Campfire Girls and Ward School Pep Squad. She is a Past Matron of the Order of the Eastern Star and has held many offices in the local Parent-Teacher Association.

Storm winds lashed this area for about an hour after the storm struck and did minor damage to trees and television antennas. Major damage reported here was a plate glass which was blown out of the front of the Clyde Kelley Electric firm's building on West Eighth Street.

The moisture will be of untold benefit to growing crops and pastures and in those communities where the fall was heavy, farmers received some much-needed stock water reserve.

Another thundershower falling early Tuesday morning of this week measured only a trace.

According to record kept by Observer Bond, precipitation to date now totals 5.33 inches.

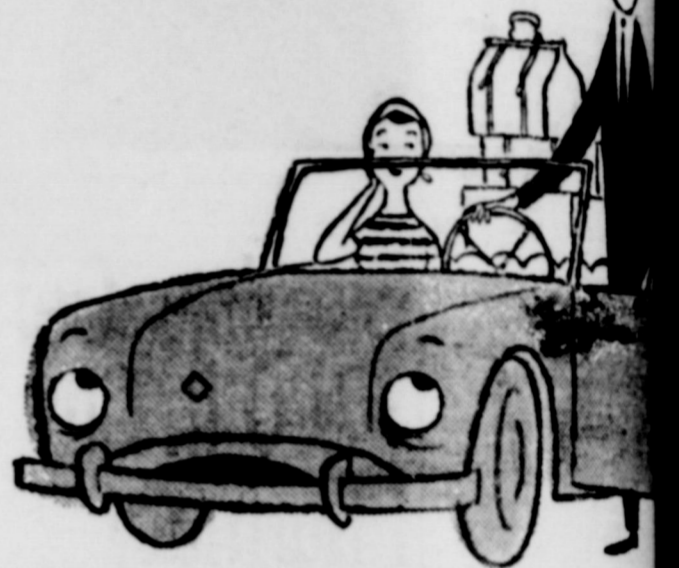

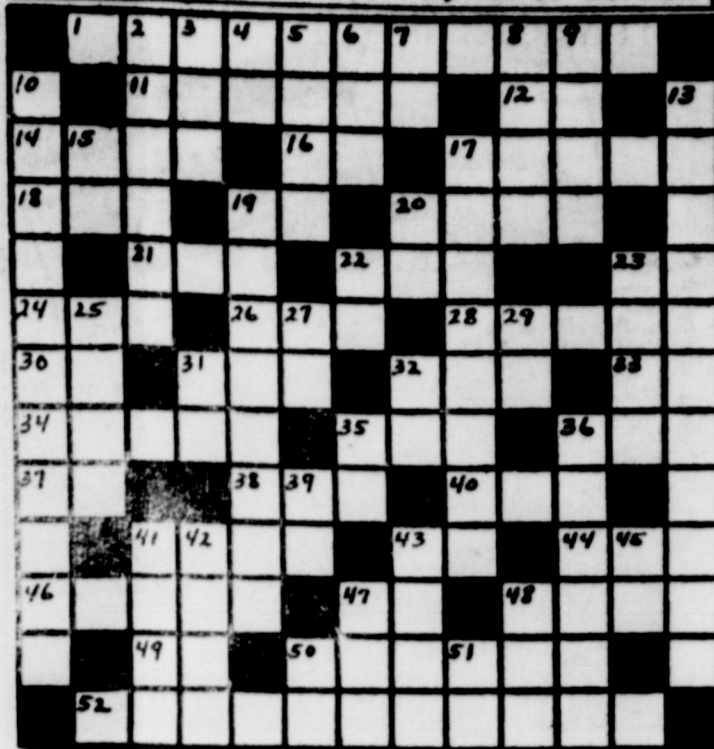

Social Security News Notes

You must have social security credits for a certain length of time in order to qualify for benefits," reminded R. R. Tuley Jr., of the Abilene Social Security office.

"Because at one time only six quarters of coverage were required, many persons erroneously believe that only six quarters of coverage are required to insure anyone now and in the future," Tuley said.

Usually, a person will be fully insured at the time of retirement age, total disability, or death if at that time he has a quarter of coverage (earned at any time after 1936) for each two full calendar quarters after 1950. A person can never become fully insured with less than six quarters of coverage; and no matter what his date of birth, he will never need more than 40 quarters of coverage to be fully insured. A quarter of coverage corresponds generally with a calendar quarter of a year.

A special provision applies to persons who reach retirement age or die before October 1, 1960. In these cases a person is fully insured if he has quarters of coverage in all but four of the quarters after 1954.

"A mechanically unsafe vehicle, a roadway hazardous in design or size, a driver inadequately equipped for his task or a driver whose mental and emotional attitude (often caused by traffic jams, drinking, fatigue, etc.) is such that it causes him to forget his normal safe driving habits."

In Texas, last year, there were 2,342 persons killed and 126,842 injured in 72,362 traffic accidents. Most of these occurred because Someone Could NOT Stop in Time.

Let's say your name is John Smith.

Some people call you John, and some call you Smith, and some call you by your various nicknames, such as Red, or Butch, or Mud-Face.

The same is true of fish—only more so.

Take a yellow cat. Sometimes he is known as an Opelousa, a flathead, a mud-cat, or a Goujon. Actually, he is not a yellow cat by scientific classification. He is a *Pseudocathartes flaviventris*.

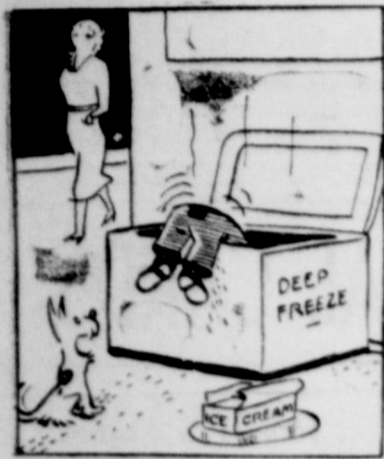
This thing about names gets crazier all along. For example, the bass.

The largemouth, or black bass, is our favorite fish in Texas. But he's not really a bass. He's a member of the sunfish family. So are the bluegill (bream), rock bass, and crappie.

The white bass is a true bass, and the only one we have in Texas' fresh water.

When I was a boy, we went fishing for perch. But we never caught perch. We caught a lot of bream

(bluegills), and we called them perch. They have many, many other popular names.

When a fellow tells me that he caught some white perch, I really don't know whether he means crappie or white bass. But in either event, I know he is employing a misnomer. Actually, the white perch is a sea bass found along the Atlantic coast.

Technically, there is no such thing as a perch in Texas... white or any color.

Okay, so a friend of mine goes fishing. Imagine a conversation between him and me when I see him next.

"Hello, Joe, how's fishing?"
"Pretty good, I guess. Caught three micropterus salmoides, half a dozen marone or roccus' chrysopterus, and a six-pound ictalurus lacustris punctatus."

Well, that's really great. Now all I have to do is look all this stuff up somewhere and find out that he captured three black bass (largemouth), six white bass (sand

bass, sandies, barfish, striped bass), and a channel cat, (spotted cat, blue channel, willow cat, fiddler cat).

Let's say the poor guy caught some crappie. In that case, being technical, he'd call the white crappie a pomoxis nigromaculatus (white perch, calico bass, strawberry bass).

Suppose he had latched onto a gaspergou. Well—the gaspergou is not really a gaspergou at all. He is a fresh water drum, sometimes called a rockfish or river perch (alpinidictus grunniens), a kinsman of the saltwater drum.

Speaking of salt water—the flounder, captured along the Gulf Coast, also is called a sole, a summer flounder and a flatfish. No use to go into all those Latin names.

The speckled trout is properly a spotted weakfish, also known as trout, yellowmouth, sow trout and speck.

The redfish, properly the channel bass, is a red drum, a rat red, or a bull red. The black drum is a drummer, butterfly drum, or hogfish. The pike, properly robalo, is a snook or striped trout.

You probably have heard many of these fish by other names, in addition to those I have mentioned. The crappie alone has about 60 different appellations over the country, and some of the names for crappie, erroneously, are the right names for other fish. So it's a wonder any angler ever knows what another angler is talking about.

There's Latin, as well as English confusion, too. As indicated above, the white bass is sometimes the

rocco chrysopterus and sometimes the marone chrysopterus. Possibly we can take heart in the fact that the Romans agreed on his last name.

A largemouth bass is a largemouth bass. If you call one a bronzeback, you are using one of his nicknames. The smallmouth bass is something else. So is the spotted, and so is the white bass. But those are the accepted names.

A carp is a carp. He's not a bugle-mouth bass.

Fresh water catfish are blue catfish, channel catfish, and flathead catfish, the latter being what you have been calling a yellow catfish.

Crappies are rightly two and two only—black and white. By any other name, they fry delectably, too. But we are trying to get their names straight.

In the bream category there are bluegill sunfish, pumpkinseed sunfish, redbreast sunfish, redear sunfish, and spotted sunfish.

If you know them all apart, you are an aquatic biologist.
