AG ECONOMIST TAKES A LOOK AT THE EGG SITUATION

Egg producers are much concerned about the current low prices being paid for their product and future improvement.

Extension Economist John G. McHaney says that at least eight basic factors are involved in the present situation, both from the price standpoint and future improvement. He lists them as total production, number of layers in the nation, rate of lay, hatchery production, weather conditions, numter of flock replacements bought, storage stocks and long range changes that develop in the production and marketing of eggs.

Egg production for the 1959 January-March period in the nation was six per cent over the same 1958 period. In Texas, the increase was 14 per cent. Egg prices in Texas for the first quarter of 1959 averaged about 11 per cent below a year ago. April prices dropped 24 per cent below those for the same month in 1958. The rate of lay in the nation is up four per cent and number of layers three per cent.

McHaney said that production of at Cisco Monday afternoon. egg-type chicks in the nation for the first quarter of 1959 was only slightly higher than for the same period in 1958 but smaller hatches were in prospect for May. The large hatch during the last half of 1958 is largely responsible for the present eg supply and will help maintain the large number of layers in late 1959, he said.

The long-time outlook for eggs believes McHaney, will most likely be influenced by the steady growth and widespread use of risk sharing plans by poultry producers. Many commercial firms guarantee poultry producer profits emounting to four to six cents per dozen. The degree to which these vertical integrated practices spread -and they are spreading, says Mc-Haney, will influence what happens in the next few years to the production and marketing practices presently used by the egg

McHaney sees little chance in the near future for any improvement in egg prices. If hatchings and placements continue large, egg prices for the remainder of 1959 are likely to be below those for the same months in 1958.

"You must have social security credits for a certain length of time in order to qualify for benefits," reminded R. R. Tuley Jr., of the Abilene Social Security office.

"Because at one time only six quarters of coverage were required, many persons erroneously believe that only six quarters of coverage are required to insure anyone now and in the future," Tulley said.

Usually, a person will be fully insured at the time of retirement age, total disability, or death if at that time he has a quarter of coverage (earned at any time after 1936) for each two full calendar quarters after 1950. A person can than 40 quarters of coverage to dren.

Social Security News Notes be fully insured. A quarter of coverage corresponds generally with a calendar quarter of a year.

A special provision applies to persons who reach retirement agree or die before October 1, 1960. In these cases a person is fully insured if he has quarters of coverage in all but four of the quarters after 1954.

Suppose he had latched onto a Technically, there is no such gaspergou. Well-the gaspergou is hing as a perch in Texas . . . white not really a gaspergou at all. He is a fresh water drum, sometimes called a rockfish or river perch (alplodinatus grunniens), a kinsman of the saltwater drum.

Speaking of salt water - the flounder, captured along the Gulf Coast, also is called a sole, a summer flounder and a flatfish. No use to go into all those Latin names.

The speckled trout is properly a spotted weakfish, also known as trout, yellowmouth, sow trout and speck.

The redfish, properly the channel bass, is a red drum, a rat red, or a bull red. The black drum is a drummer, butterfly drum, or hogfish. The pike, properly robalo, is a snook or striped trout.

You probably have heard many of these fish by other names, in addition to those I have mention-The crappie alone has about 60 different applellations over the country, and some of the names crappie, erroneously, are the right names for other fish. So it's a wonder any angler ever knows what another angler is talking

There's Latin, as well as English confusion, too. As indicattd above, the white bass is sometimes the

marone chrysops. Possibly we can take heart in the fact that the Romans agreed on his last name.

A largemouth bass is a largemouth bass. If you call one a bronzeback, you are using one of his nicknames. The smallmouth bass is something else. So is the spotted, and so is the white bass. But those are the accepted names.

A carp is a carp. He's not a bugle-mouth bass.

Fresh water catfish are blue catfish, channel catfish, and flathead catfish, the latter being what you have been calling a yellow catfish. Crappies are rightly two and two only-black and white. By any other name, they fry delectably,

too. But we are trying to get their names straight. In the bream category there are Rouse. bluegill sunfish, pumpkinseed sunfish, redbreast sunfish, redear sun-

fish, and spotted sunfish. If you know them all apart, you are an aquatic biologist.


