The association will work to get the highway improved on to Cross Plains and extended on a straight line from here to Cisco.

An extension of Highway 206 from here to Cisco would give motorists from the Ballinger-San Angelo area and all of Southwest Texas a new and more direct route to a connection with Interstate Highway 20, and would provide the Cross Plains area with a first-class highway to the north. At present, motorists in this area are required to travel east or west before gaining entrance to a north-bound state highway.

Interstate Highway 20 is a fastdeveloping freeway across the nation and will give motorists a faster access to the Fort Worth-Dallas area. This proposed extension would also connect with highways out of Cisco to Albany and Breckenridge to the Wichita Falls area.

Association members are certain that the program will meet with success and work is now being done by the three cities on a local level. Another meeting of the group will be held in the near future for the purpose of making reports and mapping further plans, President Rudoiph stated.
