Social Security Tips Given

September 30 may be an important date for you if you were dependent on a working son or daughter who died at some time

Before August, 1958, many parents who inquired about their eligibility for social security survivor's Mrs. L. L. Ritchie of May visited payments were told that they could not qualify because the son or daughter was survived by a widow, widower or child. Now a 1958 change in the law makes benefits payable to dependent parents as well as to other survivors.

If you are at retirement age and if you were being supported by your son or daughter at the time he or she died, you should inquire at your social security office before September 30 to get all of the

September 30 is an important day because if applications are not filed with the social security office by that date, some back payments

may be lost. Surviving parents, who are not yet of retirement age, should also get in touch with their social security offices before too much time has passed. Proof of support must be furnished within two years of August 1958 or within two years of the son or daughter's death, whichever is later.





IT'S THE LAW IN TEXAS

Thousands of school children are trooping back to school throughout Texas. Many of them will be transported by school buses. Most people are careful when approach_ ing a school bus which may be standing beside the road or school to pick up school children or allow them to alight. However, we have already had some very bad accidents this year because a child or a motorist, or both, were careless at that very time .:

Most Texans are aware of the law which requires a driver to come to a complete stop when overtaking from the rear a school bus which has stopped to recieve or discharge school children. After stopping immediately behind the bus, he is then allowed by law to proceed past same at a speed "which is prudent, not exceeding ten miles per hour, and with due caution for the safety of such children."

What may persons do not realize is that the very same rule applies when MEETING a stopped school bus. While everyone is interested in protecting our children, unthink. ing violators of this simple safety rule greatly outnumber those who comply. Failure to follow the law in this case can lead to fines up to \$200 even when no accident occurs. Following an accident in which a child is injured or killed, the penal_ ties are naturally much more ser-

Although the above rule does not always apply when passing a stopped school bus in a business or residental district of a town, the necessity for extreme caution even in those locations is obvious.

When it comes to overtaking and passing moving vehicles, exercise of ordinary common sense will gen. erally keep a driver within the law For instance, when passing a car it is only common sense to proceed on past it a safe distance before cutting back to the right side of the highway. Also, any driver would realize the danger of increasing his speed while another is attempting to pass him.

However, our traffic laws state that even when passing on the right is allowed, it shall be done only under conditions permitting such movement in safety. And, in no event should such passing be accomplished by driving off the pave_ ment or main-traveled portion of the roadway.

Familiar to all are the no passing zones designated by dash lines placed to one side of the center stripe on our highways. Not so well known are the restrictions against crossing the center line when approaching within 100 feet of or

railroad grade crossing.

A driver should never cross the center line of a highway when the left side of the road is not clearly visible and free of oncoming traffic. Generally speaking, when not engaged in passing another vehicle, one should not drive to the left of the roadway.

Mrs. Laura Plummer wa shostess Hints Are Offered on Cotton Defoliation

College Station,-The sucess or failure of mechanical harvesting of cotton dependent upon the defoliation job. Fred C. Elliott, extension cotton work specialist, says a good job of defoliation in favorable weather enables a producer to harvest just as high quality cotton as by hand pulling.

Arsenic acid and penta are the ommonly used defoliants and both have their advantages and limitations. Arsenic acid is applied at the rate of 1% to 2 quarts per acre mix. ed in about 8 gallons of water. This material is toxic to man and ani. mals and is very corrosive. For these reasons, precautions must be taken to protect the applicators and he equipment. Cost of this materiruns about \$1.75 per acre.

The recommended rate for penta is 2 quarts in 7 to 8 gallons of diesel or kerosene per acre. It is nonpoisonous and has no corrosive action. However, Elliott adds, it is caustic and may cause burning around the nose, ears and lips of the operator. Since it is mixed with diesel or kerosene, the cost goes up to about \$3.00 per acre.

The addition of 2,4-D to the defoliation aids in the control of regrowth, and should not be used where the seed will be saved for planting purposes. Those who do use 2.4-D should do so only if they are throughly familar with the material. Once 2,4-D is used in a machine, cautions Elliott, it cannot be washed out.

Amino triazole will also check re_ growth and is recommended in the defoliation leaflet L-145, "Coton Defoliation Guide," which is avail_ able at the county agent's office.
