



> Young plants will develop more prussic acid after frost or droutgh than those approaching maturity Their leaves will contain from 3 to 25 times more acid than leaves of plants in the boot stage. Also upper younger leaves will contain more acid than lower leaves.

> Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension Veterinarian, cautions against grazing Johnson grass or sorghum before it is completely dry. If Johnson grass or sorghum is ready to cut for hay before a frost, it may be cut the first day after frost, if are is taken pletely cured before bailing.

Other plentifuls in Texas are broilers and fryers, lard, apples, potatoes, sweet potatoes, onions, almonds, filberts, rice, lamb and dried beans.
