Bookmobile Coming Here On March 3

The Tri-County State Bookmobile will make a "get acquainted" run through Callahan County, beginning March 1.

Actual "check out" service of books, however, will not begin until March 15, when the unit makes its second tour of the Callahan, Shackelford and Taylor County areas.

First stop of the library in Callahan County will be at Clyde March 1. It will be at the high school there in the morning, and then go to Eula in the afternoon. The following day the unit will spend the morning at Baird High School, and be at the elementary school in the afternoon.

March 3, the unit will be in Cross Plains all day. It will park on the local school campus. All people of this area are invited to visit the Bookmobile at this time.

On successive visits of the library unit here, it will park in the downtown area, said Mrs. O. B. Edmondson and Mrs. Herbert Freeman, local chairmen of the project. After the initial visit, the mobile library is to be in Cross Plains twice monthly, on alternate Thursdays.

Pre-registration cards are available for those who desire them. They may be picked up at either of the local school buildings, the bank, or either Cross Plains drug store.

The mobile library demonstration is one of five being carried out in Texas under provisions of the national Rural Library Services Act. The program is administered through the Texas State Library and, in turn the commissioners of the demonstration counties and of local Tri-County Library Board.

The mobile library program is planned to demonstrate for a year the value of a cooperative library system in the rural areas of the counties involved. If the program "sells itself," the counties will continue the program with local financing.

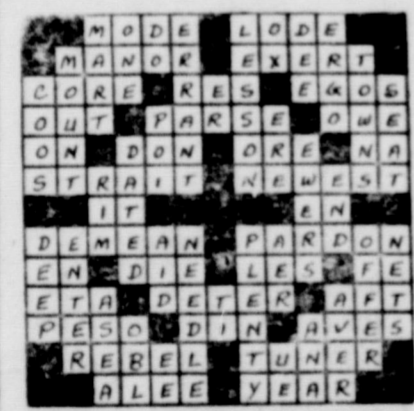

The law provides that the names of all candidates to be placed on the ballot must be filed with Ava Childers, City Secretary, on or before March 5, 1960.

 cal officials and the like.
 With the aid of technical experts, surveys are made of development possibilities — whether in the direction of new industries, new recreational facilities, and the like. A program is developed, then work is started to carry it out.
Typical Development.
 A typical development area is Madison County, Ark. Since its organization in August 1957, the project has brought in small enterprises manufacturing mattresses and sporting goods, and a lime kiln—all providing employment to about 50. In addition, a new furniture frame plant financed locally has started up to provide jobs for 30. A flooring plant has reopened with 30 workers, and a clothing plant has opened with jobs for 100.
 This has been a shot in the arm for a county with almost no industry previously and 1,300 of its 1,900 farms selling less than

\$2,500 worth of farm products annually.
 Gov. Ernest F. Hollings of South Carolina has praised the program highly.
 Concerned over growing rural unemployment in his state, the governor invited Morse to give him and South Carolina officials a briefing on the rural development program. The governor set up a state rural development board. Now projects are being developed throughout the state.
 The rural development program spends pennies where the big crop-aid programs spend hundreds of dollars. Its spending is limited largely to expenses of employing technical help in advising local areas. There are no federal grants of funds. The Small Business Administration is providing loans in some cases to help small firms get established.

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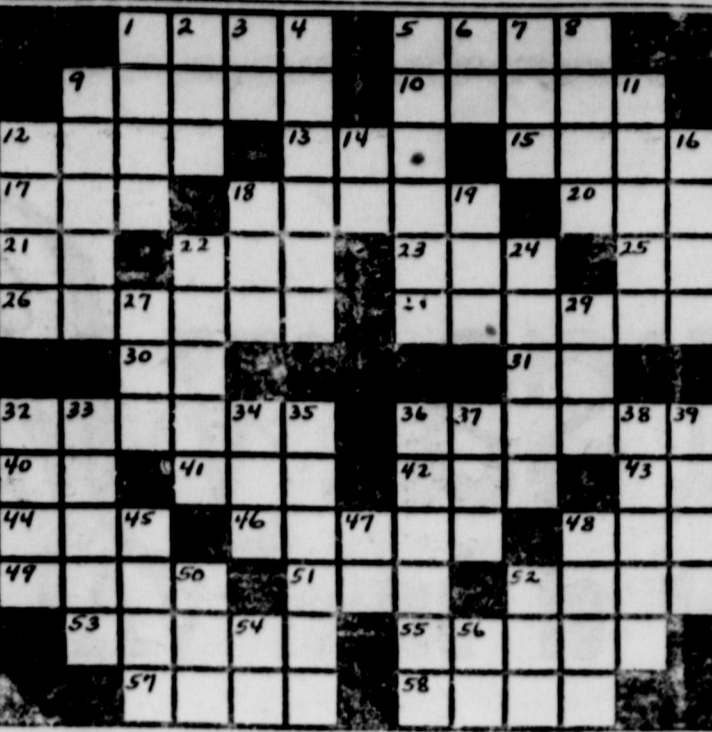

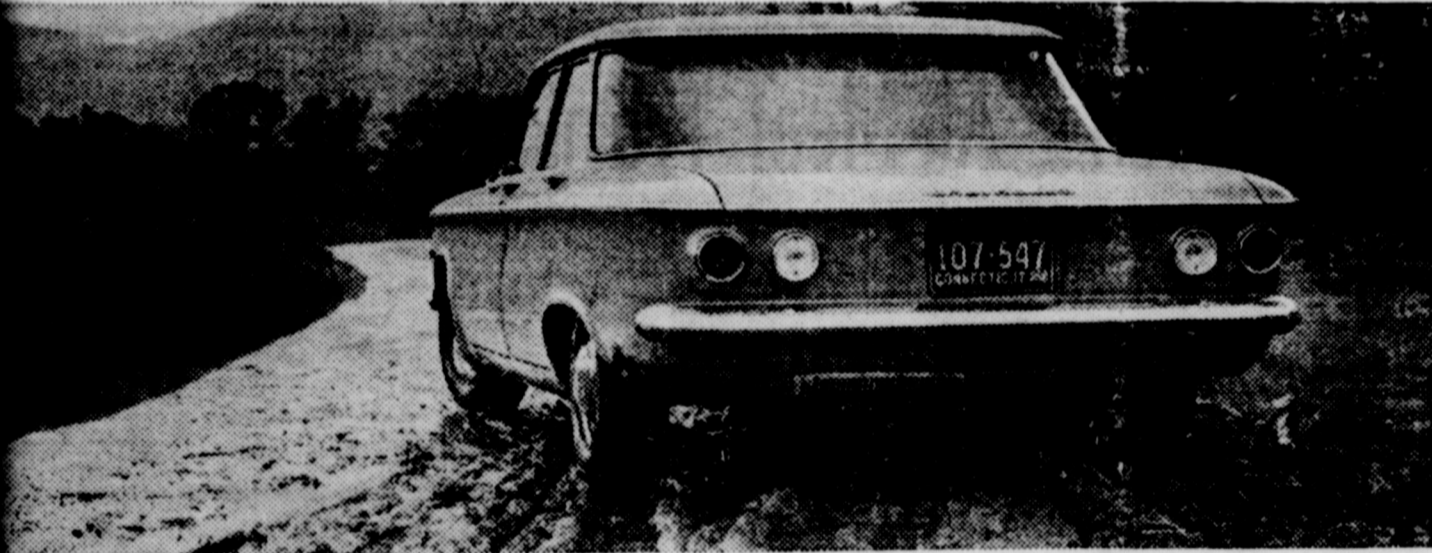
