Wid Harlow Laid To Rest Tuesday

William Franklin Harlow, 73, long-time farmer of the Cross Plains area, died Monday morning in the Hendrick Memorial Hospital at Abilene. He had been gravely ill several days. "Wid", as he was affectionately known here, was a member of one of the pioneer families in the Cross Plains section.

Funeral services were held from Cross Plains Church of Christ Tuesday afternoon at 2:30, with Minister H. McDonald officiating. Burial was in the family plot in Cross Plains Cemetery, under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home here.

Mr. Harlow moved to Rt. 4, Abilene, northwest of that city about three years ago after he had farmed near Cross Plains for a number of years.

He was born May 27, 1886, at Marble Falls and was married to Victoria Thorn in 1908.

Surviving are his wife; one son, C. F. of Abilene; four daughters, Mrs. Jim Ellis of Odessa, Miss Ruth Harlow of the home, Mrs. R. L. Freeman of Abilene and Mrs. A. T. Hamilton of Abilene; and six grandchildren.

Area Animals Imperiled By Hydrophobia Spread

There is danger of hydrophobia among animals of the Cross Plains area.

Rabid foxes and dogs which plagued southern Brown County earlier this year are believed to have spread the disease to the North.

Three sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lowell Newton, who live west of Cross Cut, have just completed taking anti-rabies shots after their pet dog was found to be infected. Another dog which is known to have been with the Newton dog has been missing for more than two weeks, and it is feared that he too, may have been infected.

Then Monday morning a red fox, definite y believed to have been rabid, was killed by Homer Norris.

The fox was first seen by Albert Lovell, who was making his school bus run in the Cross Cut locality. When the fox failed to run from the bus, Lovell decided the animal was not normal. He went to the Norris

home, got Norris and a gun and returned to where the fox had last been seen. It had not moved, and instead of appearing frightened, seemed belligerent. Norris killed the animal and destroyed the carcass.

People of the Burkett area began vaccinating small animals against rabies nearly three weeks ago. Too, farmers and stockmen in that area have been on the alert for foxes, civet cats and skunks, which may be carrying the disease.

Mrs. Ava Childers, Cross Plains city secretary, told The Review Monday afternoon that there is a city ordinance here requiring that dogs and other small animals running loose on streets be vaccinated against rabies once each year, and that evidence of the inoculation be displayed by a tag worn on collars.

Dr. J. E. Mikeska, City Health Officer, said yesterday that cats as well as dogs were vulnerable to hydrophobia, and should be vaccinated.

New Grain Elevator Will Be Built Here

Cross Plains will soon have a grain elevator.

Dale B. Gary has taken in Leo Franke as his associate, and the two went to Cleburne Tuesday to purchase a bucket-type elevator, which will store a half million pounds of grain.

The elevator, to be located on lots just west of the main building at the Gary plant, will be accessible from West 8th Street. It will be completed by June 1, in sufficient time to handle the approaching small-grain harvest.

The firm will henceforth be known as Gary Mill & Elevator Company.

Franke, the new partner in the business, is a life-long resident of Cross Plains, the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. W. Franke. He was graduated from Cross Plains High School with the class of 1947, served in the Armed Forces during the Korean conflict, and since his discharge in 1953 has been employed by an oil well servicing concern. His wife is the former Julene Gary. They live on the Clark place, two miles East of town.

Gary has been a feed mill operator in Cross Plains for more than 20 years. He first opened a place of business here on South Main Street, however, in recent years it has been located at the corner of Avenue D and 8th Street.

Inch Rain Puts '60 Total Now At 6.05

Local people were beginning to wonder if the seasons had gone astray until Tuesday when March really became itself, and sand and wind were reminiscent of other years. Not since February 9 had an exceptional windy day been logged in Cross Plains by S. F. Bond, official observer for the U. S. Weather Bureau.

Bond recorded exactly one inch of rain Thursday night and Friday of last week. The moisture and sunshine which followed were welcomed by small grain farmers.

Last week's rainfall brought the total received here thus far in 1960 to an aggregate of 6.05 inches, most received in the first three months of the calendar in more than 10 years.

Rattlesnakes By Scores Killed By Local Hunters

Despite the fact that hundreds of rattlesnakes have been killed in the Cross Plains area this spring, the deadly reptiles are reported more numerous than at any time in the past 30 years.

Jimmy Baum and J. L. Bonner have slain 74. Baum and R. E. (Hick) Edington have killed 108. Bobby Dillard, Baum and W. P. Baum slew 26. Jimmy Gilmore and Tommy Adams have killed 20, and Bernice Nichols and a Coleman dentist are reported to have destroyed more than 1,000.

Common practice among the hunters is to spray the dens with gas and force the snakes out. Large dens are reported yielding on occasion as many as 70 rattlers.

Some experienced hunters attribute the large snake popula-

tion to the recent infestation of rats and field mice, upon which they feed.

Most snakes have been reported in the area 10 and 12 miles west of Cross Plains. From one den Jimmy Baum and Edington drove out rattlers, bullsnakes and one copperhead.

None of the Cross Plains hunters seek the snakes for commercial reasons. They simply kill the reptiles and leave the carcasses.

Snake hunting is regarded as a hazardous hobby, even by experienced followers of the sport. Nearly all the local men wear protective clothing about the feet and legs.

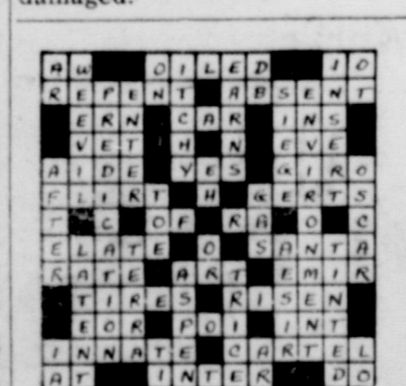
King said his wife had a scalp wound and bruises.

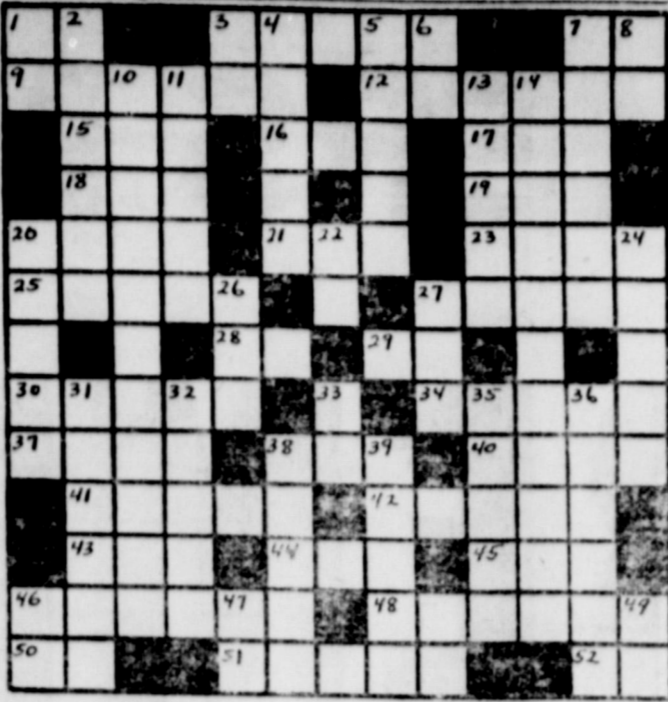

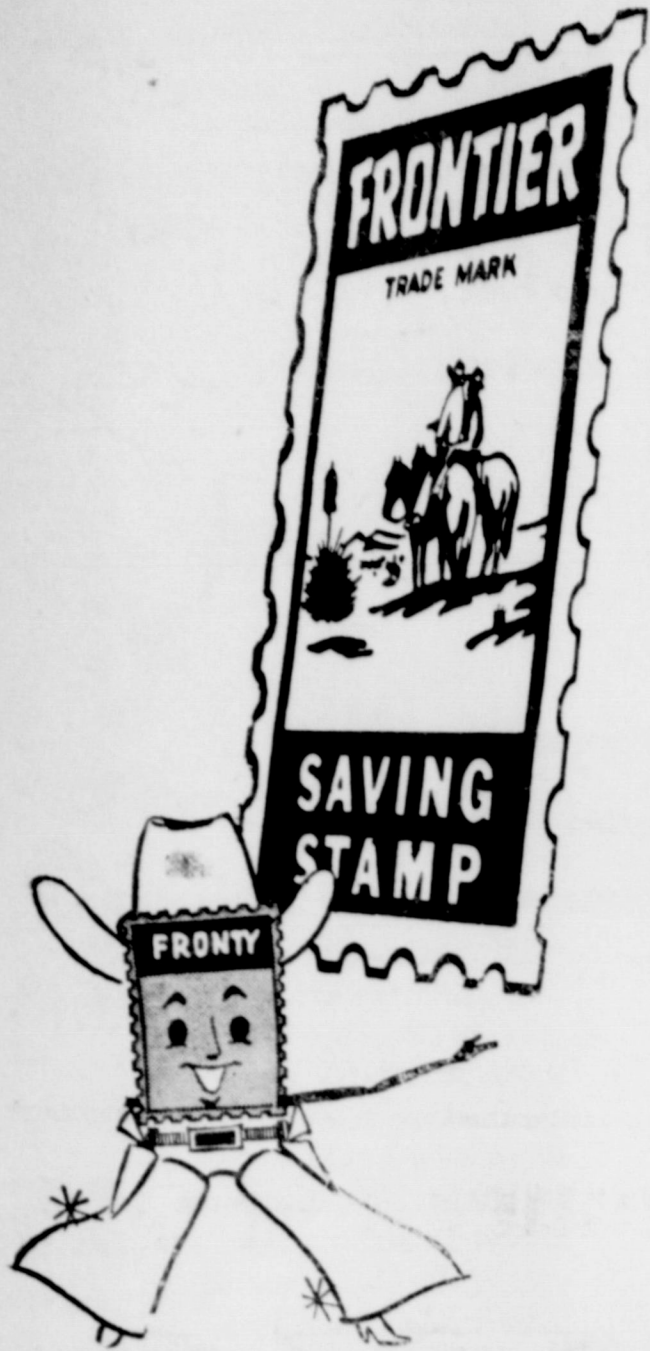
