## Easement Need Stops \$ Million Construction

Nearly a million dollars worth of new construction in the Cross Plains area is being shelved, pending the procurement of 33 easements which would permit the building of lakes and retention dams, a member of the Soil Conservation Service said yesterday.

The conservation district, embracing 59,200 acres in Southeastern Callahan and Northern Brown County has plans to build 12 retention dams which would impound 12,056 acre feet of water.

Money for construction is now available, the Soil Conservation District supervisors and directors of the local district were told at a recent meeting in Cross Plains.

O. B. Harkey, a rancher and land owner near San Saba, was present at the meeting in Cross Plains and explained how construction of a similar project in his area has benefited people of that section.

Others in attendance were: Weldon Knox, J. W. Vance and C. M. Garrett, supervisors of the Central Colorado Soil Conservation District; Edwin Baum, C. W. Coats, Earl Pyle, A. L. Breeding and W. A. Gill, of the local conservation district, as well as E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, Marvin Daniel of Coleman and D. C. Cox of Baird.

Directors of the local unit will endeavor to enlist support of other local people to work in the procurement of easements.

"There will be little objection to signing the easements, when the benefits are fully explained," a member of the directorate said yesterday.

Thus far about one-half the necessary number of easements have been signed. Unless the other signatures are gained, the whole project will fall through, The Review was told.

## Open House To Be Held At Old Dwelling Sunday

An old house with a history, which has been recently restored by Mr. and Mrs. Burl McCowen, will be the scene Sunday afternoon of an open house observance, to which all of their friends are invited.

The place is that built in 1916 for the late Mr. and Mrs. Davis Montgomery, long time residents of this area. The McCowens purchased the place and the surrounding 219 acres about two years ago. In restoration of the historic, old dwelling, said to have been built of number one, prime materials, they made no changes in the original floor plan, other than adding bath rooms.

Contractor on the Montgomery home 44 years ago was J. T.

Boswell. The late Bill McMillan, brother of J. M. McMillan, and S. O. Montgomery were carpenter's helpers on the project. One of the outstanding features of the house is that even though it was a family home for nearly four decades, no births and no deaths occurred there. Early day citizens remember, however, that it was the scene of many gala gatherings for friends and neighbors.

The open house observance Sunday afternoon will be from two until six o'clock and Mr. and Mrs. McCowen urged that all their friends and everyone who knew the place in bygone years, visit it at that time. They stress, however, that no gifts be made.

# ATTENTION! MILK CONSUMERS

We, the Dairymen of this trade territory, would like to bring to the attention of our neighbors and friends the serious situation that is threatening our industry in this community.

Every month more and more milk is being shipped into our stores from Dallas, Texarkana and other East Texas point and even from Oklahoma and other outside market, thus causing a considerable amount of milk produced by us to be sold as surplus at cheese price which is less than one-half the price received for milk to be bottled.

The money received by us as dairymen will in some way benefit the merchants and citizens of this trade territory and especially our Cross Plains Schools, as each of the Producers listed below pay school taxes in Cross Plains and our children attend Cross Plains Schools. Does the producers of milk being shipped in ever spend a dime in this community or even know it exists? They are selling their surplus milk in this area at a reduced price which means more money than they could get at cheese price. A price war never served as a solution, and they are the same as us . . . they couldn't continue to produce it at a lower price. If the plants at Abilene should close it would leave a great number of producers in a wide area from Stephenville to Sweetwater without a market for their milk and when this happens there will be no more low-priced milk here, and we dairymen will be without a market. Please give this your serious attention when buying and selling milk.

All milk produced in a wide area around Cross Plains is picked up by refrigerated trucks at our barns one day and delivered in cartons the next by two plants in Abilene — THE BORDEN CO. and FOREMOST CO.

We are under strict supervision of the City of Abilene; all milk sold is Grade A, all cows are tested for Bacteriosis and TB. We have city health inspector from Abilene at least once a month on unscheduled inspections. We have a Borden field man from Abilene at least once a month and often times more. A State health inspector checks our barns at least once a year and at no scheduled time. Butterfat and water tests are made every day on our milk at the plants, a sample for impurities checked at times we know nothing about, and if at any time our milk is not up to standard we are degraded and not allowed to sell milk until it is proved to be good. So you see, we must produce good quality milk.

We invite anyone to visit our places and see our barns and dairy operations at any time, and you are welcome to visit the plant at Abilene, which we, as producers, are proud of.

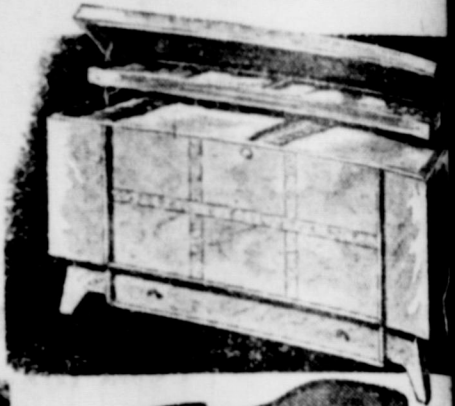

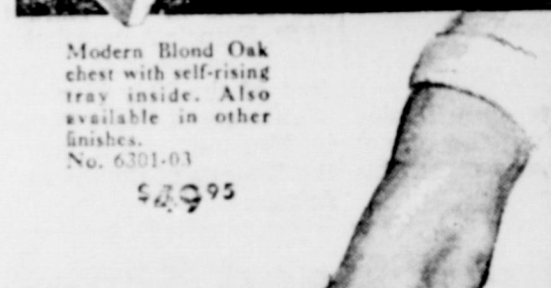
