## Land And Keep It' Senior Citizen Advises

"Life in Cross Plains has been happy", Mr. McCord says, "and if I had it all to do over I'd still want to settle here."

He recalls several very exciting times in the history of the city, however, probably the most outstanding in his recollection is the building of the present township in the early years of 1900. He recounts that the Higginbotham building in Cross Plains, completed in 1915, was a real show place. Visitors driving through, used to always get out of their vehicles and go inside to view the mammoth store.

"When I first came to Cross Plains, I felt sure that the railroad would be extended westward, and Dick Cordwood and several of us offered to pay cash bonuses for a station to be built in the vicinity of Caddo Peak", he recounts.

A farm bought near the Peak on anticipation of the railroad coming was perhaps the only poor real estate investment Mr. McCord ever made. Through the years he has acquired a number of pieces of real estate and his advice to any young man starting out is to buy a piece of land and hold it.

## Frost Falls On This Area On Thursday

Further evidence of the strangeness of this year's weather was seen in Cross Plains last week end.

Frost fell over much of this section in the early morning hours Thursday, May 12. At Willie J. Parrish's place, two miles south of Cottonwood, "Four o'Clocks" were blackened as if they had been scathed by a blaze.

Parrish and Ode Strahan also noticed that "Bull Nettle" weeds were nipped in large patches.

April frosts have long been considered uncommon here, however, such occurrences in May are indeed rare. J. M. McMillan recalls, however, that in 1908 this area received a frost on May 20.

## Census Bureau States Population Here 1,164

Cross Plains' 1960 population is 1,164. The city suffered a loss of 137 in the past 10 years.

Callahan County's population dropped from 9,087 in 1950 to 7,206.

While news of the population was disappointing to citizens of Cross Plains, who had hoped the city might reflect some growth, the decrease here was well below the average experienced by most small towns in Central and West Texas.

Baird lost 193, Rising Star 296, Gorman 198, Comanche 437, Cisco 783, De Leon 229, Moran 219, Ranger 690, Eastland 350, and Brownwood over 3,500.

Only small city near here showing an increase in population was Clyde, where an increase of 201 was reported.

Published hereunder is a chart showing how a number of nearby cities fared in the recent head-counting. Of the 14 listed, only Clyde gained:

Dear editor:

I have been thinking long and hard over the big spy question and so far I haven't come to any valuable conclusions, other than it might be better to spy with an atomic-powered submarine instead of an airplane, the kind of sub that just spent three months under water without coming up traveling around the earth. You may not see as much as you do from an airplane, but it's a whole lot safer.

On the other hand, the problem of who owns the sky has been engaging my thoughts, and while it's a hard problem, it's not as hard as farming.

You take my farm out here. My deed says I own the land and everything under it, and my neighbors own everything under theirs, but if you stop to think, you know that the deeper in the ground you go, the less you own, if the world is really round. The nearer you approach the center of the earth, the narrower your wedge of earth becomes, until finally, when everybody's property line reaches the center, everybody is squabbling over a pin-point piece of ground. Wonder what Mr. Krushchev has to say about this?

Now you take the sky above

my farm, I don't know exactly where the sky begins, but I know I must own some space above the ground, at least I don't believe the law would allow somebody to build a shed over my land, even if I did have enough room to drive a tractor under it without hitting my head. But after you get up a few thousand feet, I don't know. I do know though that I'd have a hard time proving an airplane flying a mile over my farm was trespassing, although if there was any way I could charge for it, I would.

And as for space fourteen miles above, I can see how no country wants another country's airplane flying around up there photographing whatever it can find, but how about 200 miles up? 500? With a photographing satellite? You can see if every country owns all the sky above it, upward forever, and the earth is spinning through space, somebody is going to have a hard time marking his exact amount of sky and keeping track of it. It's pretty complicated.

I sometimes get the idea I the universe is just too big for man to handle.

It's all a problem I will leave to Washington.

Just looking at the shape of my Johnsongrass farm, I figure it's more than I can handle.

## Widow Wins \$85,000 In Suit Last Saturday

A widow and four children apparently won \$85,000 in damages in 104th district court at Abilene Saturday, as a result of an oil-well blowout near Cross Plains Dec. 17, 1958, in which Dennis L. Halepaska was killed. The accident occurred on the Charlie Smith place, one mile northeast of town.

After 13 hours of deliberation, the jury reported it had found for both sides in a \$450,000 damage suit.

Halepaska's widow was suing Callihan Interests, Inc., of Abilene, on behalf of herself and her four children, asking compensation for the loss of her husband's earning power.

She alleged that the company had been negligent in installing the "christmas tree" equipment at the well-head, and that their negligence caused her husband's death.

Callihan Interests had contended that there was no negligence, and that perhaps an error in Halepaska's judgement had caused his death when the well blew out.

The jury found a total of \$85,000 in damages for Mrs. Halepaska and her children, \$45,000 for the widow, and \$10,000 each for the four children.

But the jury also found that Halepaska should have had full

knowledge of the way the well was equipped, that he should have appreciated the danger of a possible blowout, and that he had voluntarily exposed himself to a danger he should have known and appreciated.

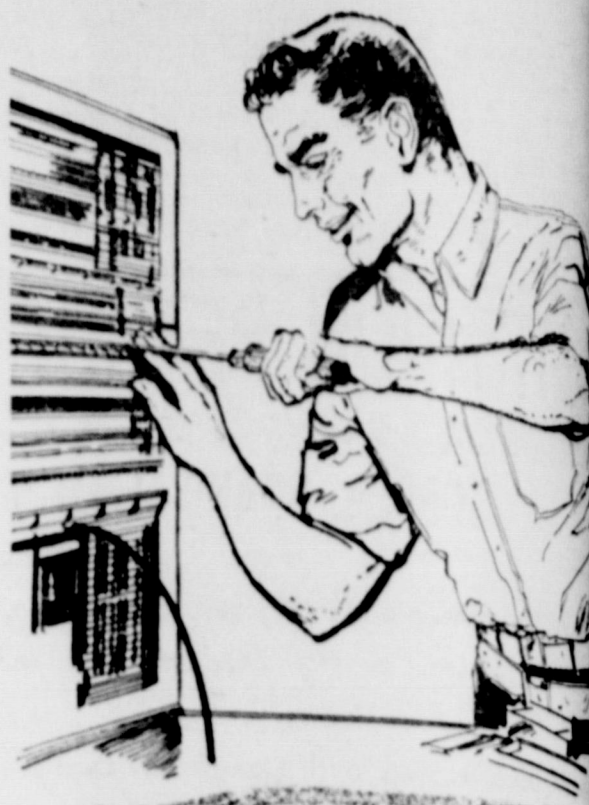

## Widow Wins \$85,000 In Suit Last Saturday

A widow and four children apparently won \$85,000 in damages in 104th district court at Abilene Saturday, as a result of an oil-well blowout near Cross Plains Dec. 17, 1958, in which Dennis L. Halepaska was killed. The accident occurred on the Charlie Smith place, one mile northeast of town.

After 13 hours of deliberation, the jury reported it had found for both sides in a \$450,000 damage suit.

Halepaska's widow was suing Callihan Interests, Inc., of Abilene, on behalf of herself and her four children, asking compensation for the loss of her husband's earning power.

She alleged that the company had been negligent in installing the "christmas tree" equipment at the well-head, and that their negligence caused her husband's death.

Callihan Interests had contended that there was no negligence, and that perhaps an error in Halepaska's judgement had caused his death when the well blew out.

The jury found a total of \$85,000 in damages for Mrs. Halepaska and her children, \$45,000 for the widow, and \$10,000 each for the four children.

But the jury also found that Halepaska should have had full

knowledge of the way the well was equipped, that he should have appreciated the danger of a possible blowout, and that he had voluntarily exposed himself to a danger he should have known and appreciated.

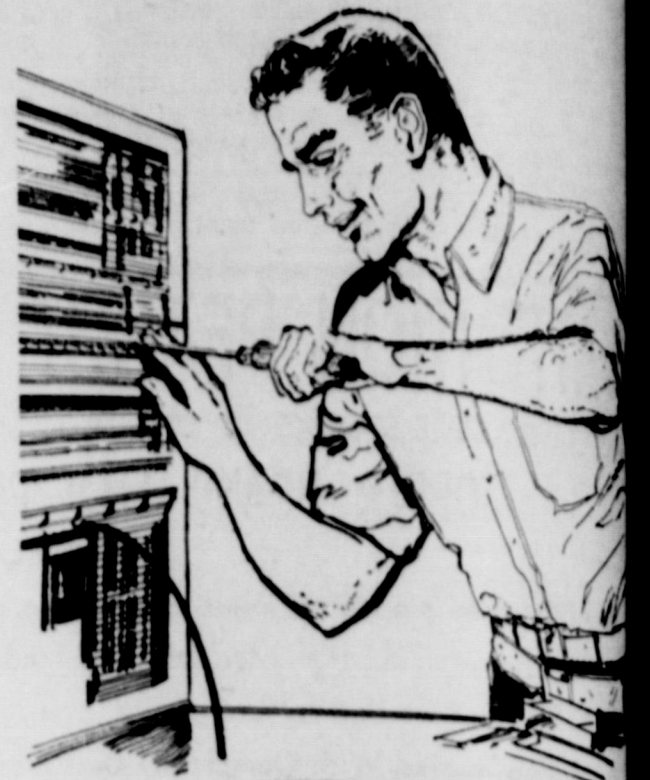
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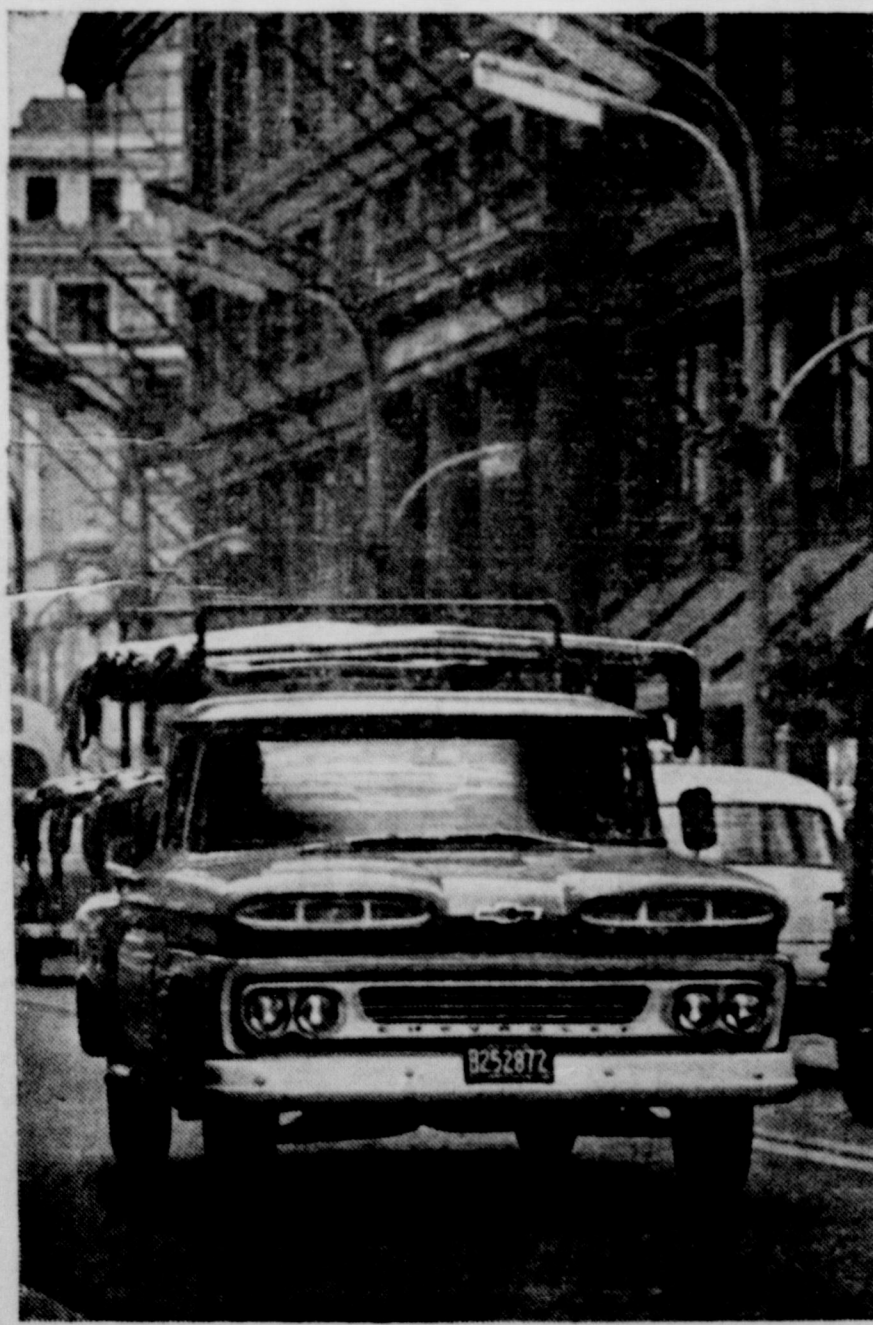

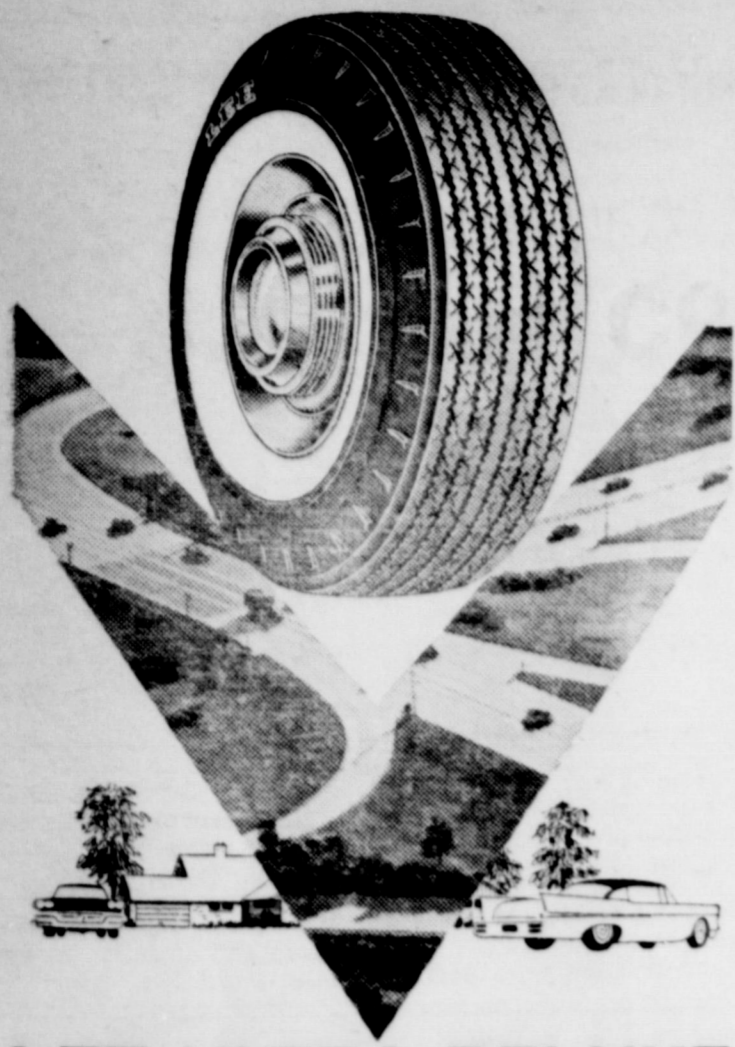
