Bailey Unseats Brashear For 76th District Representative

Scott Bailey unseated veteran lawmaker Paul Brashear Saturday in the run-off primary for State Representative from the 76th District, comprising Callahan, Eastland and Shackelford counties.

Bailey carried Callahan and Eastland counties but lost Shackelford. The total vote was 4,081 for Bailey to 3,235 for the incumbent Brashear.

Callahan County also went for the winner, W. T. McDonald, 794 votes to 599 for Lloyd W. Davidson for judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Only run-off election for a place in the county government was that in which Roscoe Shelnut and Burrus C. Miller were pitted. It was Commissioner of Precinct I. Shelnut emerged victorious, garnering 546 votes to Miller's 486. Shelnut's election will make one-

TOMATOES GROW ON IRISH POTATO VINES

Putnam's Mary Guyton Has Had Varied Career

A woman who came to Callahan County 41 years ago, because she liked the possibilities this section afforded, is even more optimistic about the outlook today. She is Mary E. Guyton of Punam, known to a legion of friends as "Aunt Mary".

Few Texas women have had a more varied career than has the venerable Putnamite. Born in Stoke-on-Trent, England, Jan. 2, 1882, she came to America with her mother when four years of age. They immigrated to Trenton, N. J., where "Aunt Mary's" father was a designer of pottery. Her early education was taken in that city.

After becoming a Registered Nurse, she went to Tucson, Ariz., and was head surgical nurse of that city's largest hospital. In 1912 she moved on to Portland, Ore., and worked as a nurse there. It was in Portland that she married Dr. J. B. Guyton, well-known West Coast surgeon.

The couple came to Texas a few years later, and during the Breckenridge boom he practiced medicine in the Stephens county seat. His wife refused to live in the squalid conditions Breckenridge afforded at that time and made her home in Ranger. All the while she continued to serve as his surgical nurse and anesthetist. This necessitated commuting to and from Breckenridge, competing with oil field traffic over dusty, sometimes almost impassable roads. The hardship served only to whet the enthusiasm of the diminutive R. N. for this new, more lucrative industry.

She moved to Putnam, bought the Brick Hotel for \$24,000, spent another \$10,000 modernizing the hostelry and changed its name to The Mission Hotel, by which it is known until this day. The hotel business offered more leisure time and it was profitably utilized by entering the oil business on her own account. In a single year, Mary Guyton and her partner, G. L. Lydia, drilled 300 shallow wells in Callahan County. They had 50 consecutive strikes without a single dry hole. Always, though, they retained only a minor interest, about one-eighth each.

"We couldn't afford the greater risk," she says. Mary Guyton has seen Putnam when it was as busy as a teeming bee-hive. Through her hotel passed some of the best known men of the oil business. She met them all, won their respect and admiration, and closed hundreds of drilling deals and was instrumental in the opening of several shallow fields in the Putnam area. She estimates that she had a part in the drilling of more than 1,000 wells in Callahan County alone, and many of her operations have

been elsewhere. "Don't you believe the oil business has left this county forever," she says, "there are bigger and brighter days ahead."

The area between Cross Plains and Putnam, she believes, offers outstanding possibilities. Evidencing this faith, she has bought two farms in the "trend" and owns royalty interests under a number of others.

The years have been kind to the little English girl, who sought and found a happy, active life in America. She's a parcel of energy; talks and moves with enthusiasm, leaving the impression that if anything big happens in Callahan County Mary Guyton will be right in the middle of it.

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Philosopher Finds Business Men Don't Keep Posted On Latest Economic Trends

Editor's Note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou apparently doesn't have a full understanding of what the price index is, his letter this week indicates.

Dear editor: One trouble with this country is that not enough business people keep up with the economic trends.

For example, I read in a copy of a newspaper day before yesterday that living costs rose four-tenths of one per cent in April, as reflected by the consumers price index, a set of figures put out by the U. S. government.

As a result of this, the article explained, nearly a million workers in the auto, farm equipment and related parts industries got an automatic 2-cents-an-hour pay raise. Their con-

tracts call for adjustments based on the government's consumers price index.

Well, now, I figured, I'm in the auto and farm equipment business, so to speak, especially the parts end of it, so naturally I concluded I was supposed to get a pay raise too, and since nobody pays me by the hour out here on this Johnson grass farm, the only way I could see how to get a pay increase was to raise the price of things I sell.

I don't know how long it takes for a hen to lay a dozen eggs, but I figured on the basis of that 2-cents-an-hour boost the others were getting, me and my hens would settle for 2-cents-a-dozen increase, which ought to be cheap enough, so I automatically marked up the price that much, and took some to town.

Like I said, the trouble with this country is not enough business people keep up with the economic trends. I couldn't find an egg dealer in this part of the state who'd ever heard of the government's consumers price index. When I said the price of my eggs is now 2 cents a dozen higher, they looked at me like they thought I was crazy.

What I figure is we've got a lot of business people in this country who don't keep up with the economic trends, or else they're still using the same price index they had pasted on their office walls twenty-five years ago.

You've got a printing press somewhere there in The Review office, haven't you? How about printing up a bunch of these new price indexes and distributing them around the country?

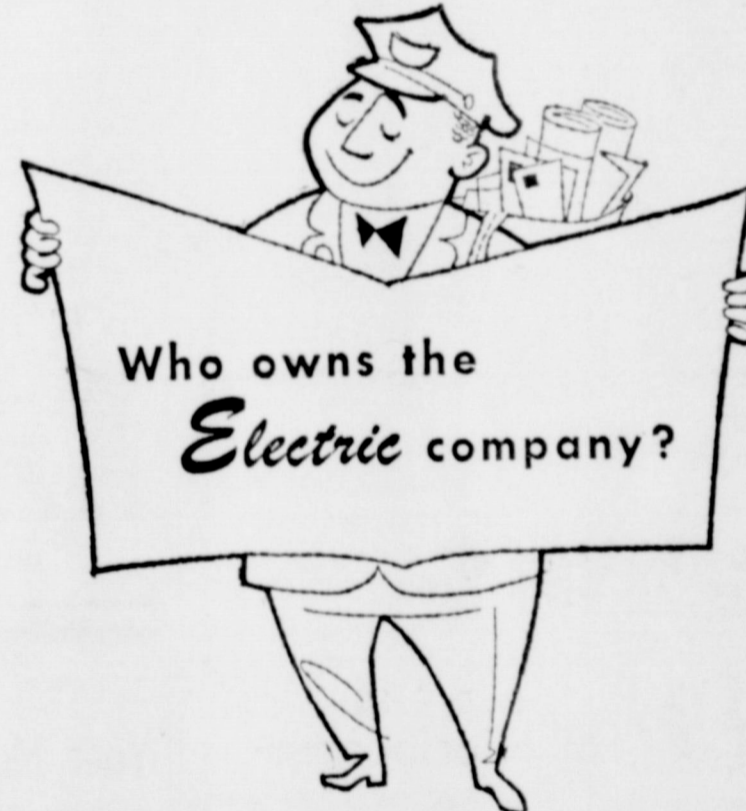

County To Harvest Record Grain Crop

One of the great grain harvests of all time is being predicted for this county by Ray Alderman, manager of the Calahan County Farmers Co-operative at Baird.

Alderman expects to buy more grain than during the bumper crop of two years ago. "We bought 100,000 pounds then," he says.

The first load of oats brought in averaged 36 pounds. And a load or so of barley tested 48 pounds, Alderman said. "Oats will be lighter but the quality is good."

The co-op stores oats and maize free to stockholders and patrons, Alderman said. Already it has a contract for storage of 10,000 bushels of local grain at a price offering of \$1.72. Free storage requires patrons to process their grain at the co-op's mill. It has flat storage for 60,000 bushels. Customers who store must have grain processed within 12 months. This plan for storage has been in operation seven or eight years. The Clyde branch of the Co-op shares in the plan.

Appeal Made For Help In Easements

An appeal was made this week to people of the Turkey Creek watershed for assistance in fur- thermore the proposed flood con- trol project.

"Everyone knows Cross Plains water supply is inadequate", said a member of the board of directors for Turkey Creek Con- servation District yesterday, "and that any conservation of water could be valuable to the town".

It was pointed out that the proposed project would entail the expenditure of approximate- ly one million dollars of federal funds in this vicinity, and the influx of new money would be a boon to local conditions.

A statement issued by direc- tors of the district follows:

"A few people can not ac- complish the work necessary to push the proposed program into reality. The support of every civic-minded person of the area is needed. Delay on the part of a few has thus far held-up this project. Help is required in getting through to these few that their land is not needed, only easements, permitting con- struction which would delay the rapid run-off of flood waters. This would be of direct benefit to the easement signers. Dam- age to land would be reduced to virtually nothing.

"Please lend your support in urging those who have not yet signed easements to do so be- fore the entire project is lost".

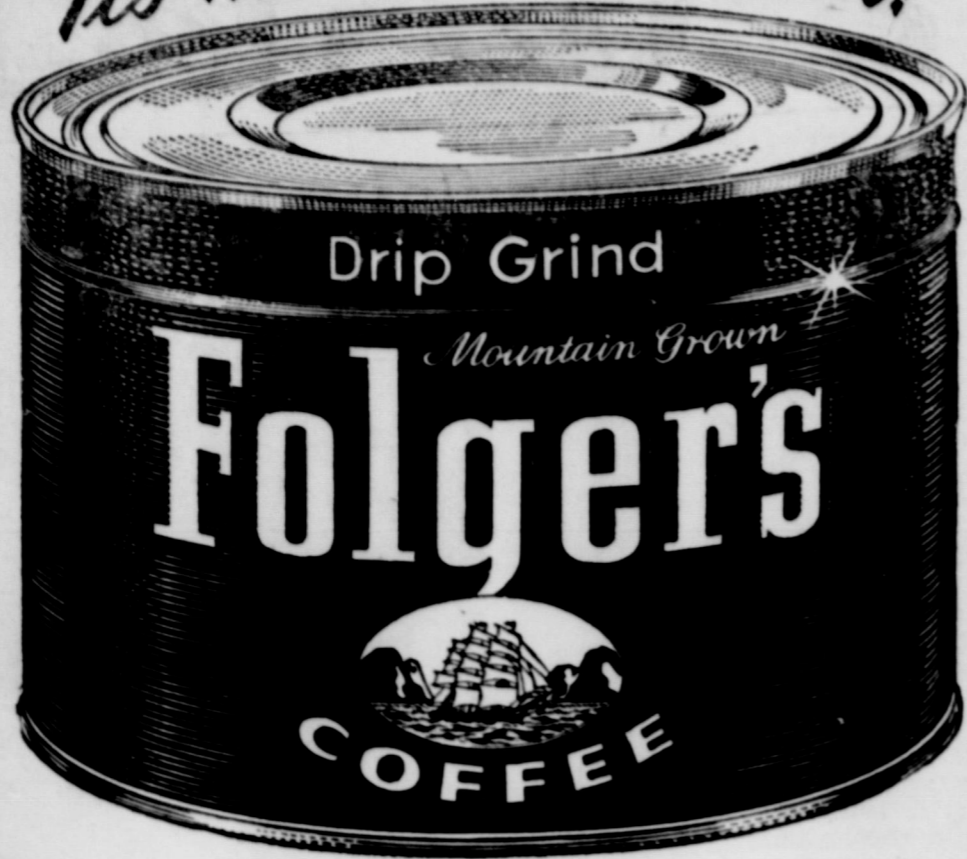
