Terry Watkins Takes College Faculty Post

Man, 58, Drowns On Hornsby Farm

Tragedy struck with dramatic suddenness at the farm of a Cross Plains businessman near Rowden Tuesday night.

Paul Marshall, 58, a carpenter, drowned in a stock tank

while fishing with his brother, Cassel, on the place of their brother-in-law, Alton E. Hornsby. The accident occurred about 9 p.m.

Cross Plains and Baird fire departments, units from the Texas Highway Patrol and Callahan County Sheriff's department rushed to the scene. It was not until 11:30, however, were they able to raise the body which was submerged in 17 feet of water. Scores of neighbors and volunteer workers aided in recovery attempts.

The deceased was a brother of Mrs. Alton E. Hornsby of this city. He had been staying on the place and was preparing to reconstruct the house.

Funeral services will be held from the Baptist Church here Thursday afternoon at three, with burial in the Clyde cemetery.

Survivors include: two children, Linda Kay and Wayne Marshall, of Muleshoe; his mother, Mrs. Ara Marshall of Lubbock; the father, J. E. Marshall of Byers; three brothers, Cassel of Cross Plains, J. E. of Red Bluff, Calif. and Travis H. of San Francisco; four sisters, Mrs. Hornsby of Cross Plains, Mrs. R. W. Tolbert of Fort Worth, Mrs. Vera Nelson of Clyde and Mrs. D. L. Jordan of Lubbock.

Funeral arrangements are being handled by Higginbothams of Cross Plains.

Warning Issued About Livestock On Highway

Warning is issued by Texas Department of Public Safety that a new law, controlling livestock on designated highways, is now in effect and that violators will be prosecuted.

The new law makes it illegal for a person knowingly to permit his domestic livestock to roam at large and unattended on state and federal highways. It applies regardless of whether or not the highway right-of-way is fenced. Maximum fine for such violation is \$200, and each day the violation occurs may be considered a separate offense.

Farm to market roads are excepted from the law. The new law also gives law enforcement officers the authority to have such livestock picked up, when unable to locate the owner, and turned over to the sheriff or constable in the county.

The law does not prohibit the driving or herding of livestock across or along highways. It gives peace officers the authority to enforce provisions of the act without a warrant.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said state patrolmen will enforce provisions of the law in an effort to reduce the traffic hazard caused by animals on designated state and US highways. He said that during the year 1959 a total of 1406 rural traffic accidents occurred in Texas involving animals of all types.

Lowering Water Table Occasions Worry Here

Despite abnormally heavy water consumption, occasioned by 100 degree plus temperatures, Cross Plains water department was able to meet all demands the past week.

Pat McNeel Jr., water commissioner, told The Review Tuesday, however, that he is apprehensive for the future if present demands remain constant. Mondays and Fridays

are ordinarily peak consumption days, he pointed out, and on Monday of this week 28,000 more gallons of water was used than produced.

"We have 23 wells pumping every drop they'll make," he said, "however, the water table appears to be dropping."

McNeel stressed that he was not asking at this particular time that all irrigating and lawn sprinkling be discontinued. He did urge, though, that outside uses of water be held to the minimum.

The overhead tank, located at the fire station here has been kept full all week. The 60,000 gallons it holds assures adequate pressure throughout the entire system but continued strong demand for water may result in this reserve being dissipated. As a safeguard against fire, city officials have decreed that a minimum of eight feet be retained in the large settling tank when the tower supply is gone.

Exact gauging is not possible, however, officials believe that average daily consumption here the past week has been in excess of 150,000 gallons.

Brucellosis Presents No Problem For Area Herds

Despite the fact that five nearby counties were declared Type II brucellosis areas Monday, cattlemen of the Cross Plains area are presently unworried.

The Texas Animal Health Commission has announced that work will begin in September in Scurry, Throckmerton, Coke, Mitchell and Rannels Counties in checking herds and possible eradication of the livestock malady.

Executive Director Dr. R. G. Garrett said the action had to be taken in order to save the cattle industry of Texas a possible \$10 to \$12 million loss. He pointed out that much of the recent cattle brought in from Florida had been traced down and no fever ticks had been found, but added, "This doesn't mean that its not here."

In order for Florida cattle to be shipped into Texas now, the commission is requiring it to be dipped in an approved solu-

tion, usually arsenic, and accompanied by a certificate from the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture.

In the event that cattle dipping should again become necessary, as was the case in 1918, dipping vats would have to be re-constructed on most Callahan County ranches. J. L. (Pokey) Bonner told The Review that the only dipping he knew of in this area in recent years was at the Owen ranch, where cattle were dipped for rabbit ticks about five years ago. "Offhand I can not think of another usable dipping vat nearby," he said.

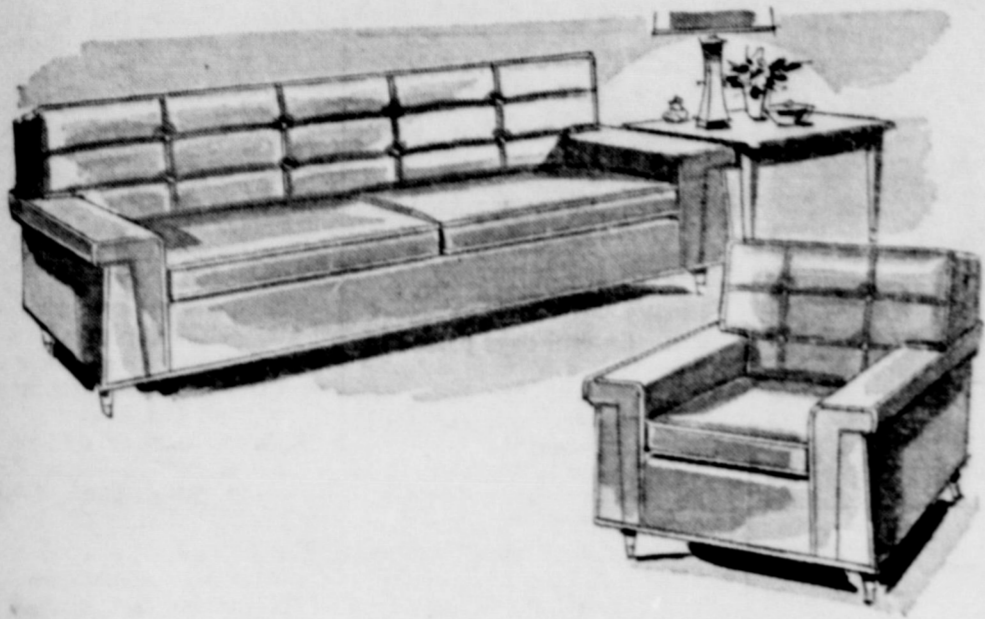

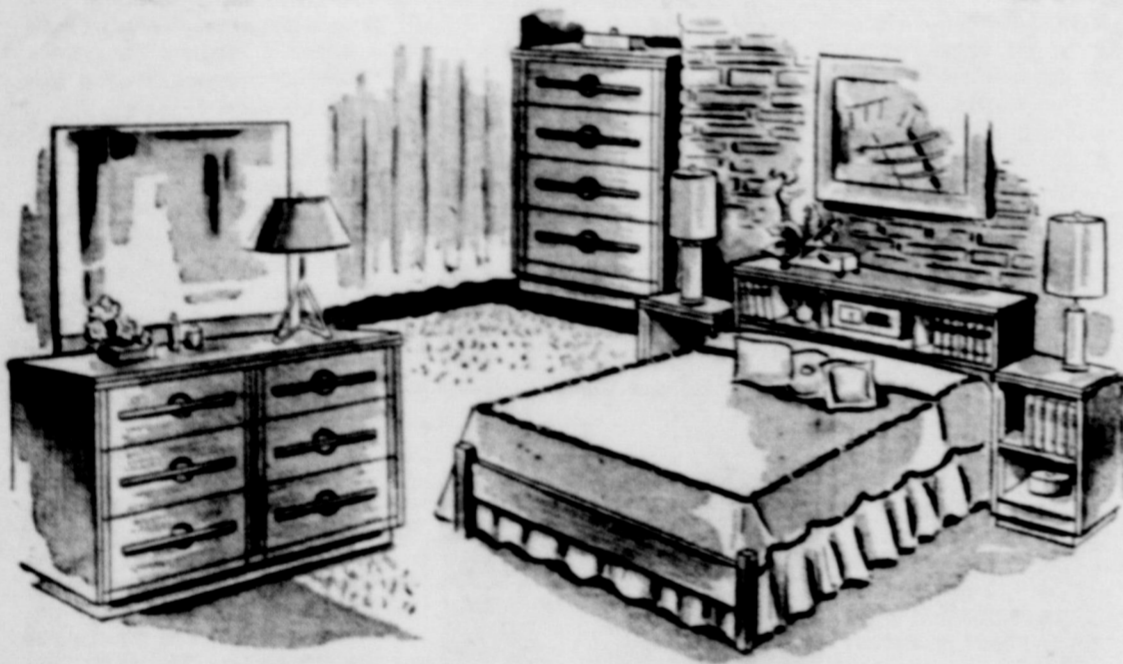

Have you ever wondered what the other towns in the United States named Cross Plains are like. Recently the Review editor contacted William F. Dehman of Cross Plains, Wisconsin, and received the following information letter in reply.

"As you state there are Cross Plains post offices in Texas, Indiana, Tennessee and Wisconsin. There are also other villages which bear the name Cross Plains. From data I have been able to gather, the Cross Plains in Indiana is the oldest village to use that name. A post office was there in 1850. Another post office was in Cross Plains, Alabama, many, many years ago. It was in Denton County but I believe during the Civil War the name of the County was changed to Calhoun, in honor of the celebrated statesman from the South, John C. Calhoun. In the 1880's there was a Cross Plains, Arkansas.

There was a small settlement in Sangamon County, Illinois, in the early days named Cross Plains. It has long ceased to exist or the name has been changed. There is a small village in South Dakota by the name of Cross Plains today. If you address a letter to Parkinson, S. D., I think it will be delivered to this village. There are also one or two other places named Cross Plains, all too small to have post offices."

Key Creek Oaks Have Altered Large Crowds

More than three-quarters of the large oak trees in the Turkey Creek area are now Cross Plains. The area has loaned shelter to thousands of types of public gatherings.

Sometimes Mulkey's observations went a little too far, Bond recalls. "An old, infirm lady, much beloved by her husband, was wheeled by him to the side of the brush arbor. The husband was put to much ado to draw Mulkey out to see and shake hands with her. After a handshake and a close scrutiny of the wrinkled face of the

man's wife, Mulkey inquired: "You didn't look around much before choosing her, did you?" "I never saw a more frustrated husband in my life," Bond said.

Deed to the picnic grounds was presented to the city a number of years ago. Then with the coming of Highway 36, the north portion of the grounds was deeded to the Texas Highway Department for the building of a roadside park. In honor of the District Engineer S. J. Treadway, the part improved by the Highway Department took the name of Treadway Park.

In years past many improvements have been placed in the part of the park which the city still maintains, however, vandals have repeatedly destroyed benches, fountains, speakers stands and the like almost as fast as they have gone up. A frame bandstand on the grounds burned.

Probably one of the largest crowds ever to assemble under the boughs of the sturdy oaks was during the early thirties, when a mystery wedding was held at a high spot of an annual picnic. A local man and woman, whose identity was closely guarded secret until they approached the improvised altar, were married and received hundreds of dollars worth of gifts. More than 5,000 people were present that night.

Communism Plots Against "Dixiecrats"

In the April 1960 issue of their official monthly, Political Affairs, the communist conspirators within our borders boldly called for the federal government to arrest Southern officials who hamper plans for communizing the South. In part, here is what the conspirators were told in this arrogant directive from communist leaders:

"The situation calls for . . . the arrest and prosecution of Governor Patterson of Alabama and all others in public office who defy the constitution and the law. It calls for direct federal enforcement through federal marshals, including the appointment of Negroes as marshals—in a word, for whatever federal action is needed to do the job. A national crusade to accomplish these aims is on the order of the day, a crusade in which progressives and especially Communists must occupy a place in the front ranks." The communist enemies of our nation do not expect accomplishment of this goal overnight, but they are confident of ultimately attaining it and thus attaining virtual rule over the South through federal force. Communist conspirators are quite confident of increasing the left-wing complexion of the United States Congress through intensive independent political activity.

This communist war on the South is nothing new. It has been going on for a number of years. In 1922 the Communist International meeting in Mos-

cow declared that: "The Negro problem has become a vital question of the world revolution, and they ordered communists to support "every form of Negro movement which tends to undermine or wreck capitalism. . . ."

The Red plan for bringing the South to its knees calls for the election of Negro officials to office through means of an NAACP controlled Negro bloc vote. For years communist leaders have praised the work of the NAACP and have urged communists to support it. In the February 1960 Political Affairs communists were told that the NAACP "deserves the continuing support and attention of all progressive forces." The conspirators reserved the right to make "constructive criticism" when necessary. Obviously, the communists figure that NAACP selected candidates will be highly favorable to their objectives.

The February Political Affairs labelled "Dixiecrats" as "the common enemy", and communist conspirators were told: "It is imperative that the Dixiecrats be made a major target of attack, that they be exposed and isolated." Communist conspirators are not interested in any problems of the Negro, but merely in using him as a tool to destroy the "Dixiecrats", and eventually the entire United States.

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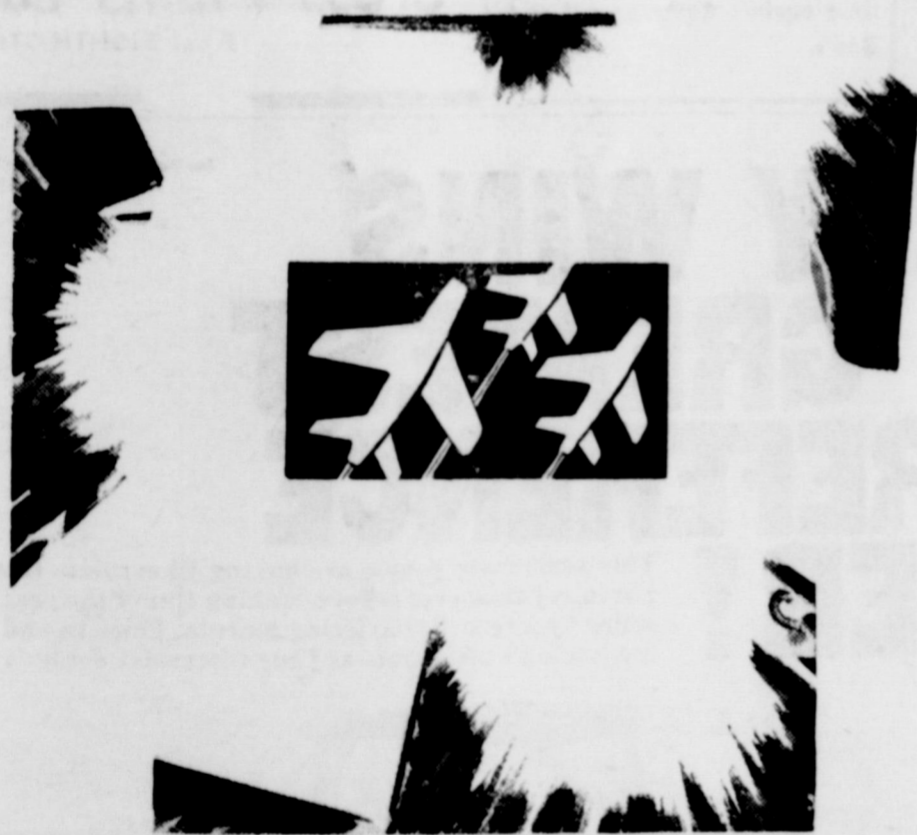

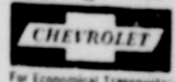

Receipts for the season have included: \$48 for insurance on players, \$100 contribution from the Chamber of Commerce, \$18.75 gift from Bill Pope for the purchase of new baseball caps, \$350 from the sale of fence advertising, \$1,239 receipts at the concession stand, and \$373.31 from bucket contributions. Total receipts, including the balance on hand at beginning of the season, have been \$2,244.01.

Disbursements for the season: miscellaneous expenses including donation to District 6 representative, parent release forms, score books, shoulder emblems for Little Leaguers and Pony League caps, \$227.23; concession stand supplies and change advanced \$545.75, West Texas Utilities Company \$120.78, fence \$76.05, playing field \$49.30, playing equipment, baseballs, bases, bats, etc. \$22.75, rest room buildings \$516.20. Total disbursements aggregate \$1,758.06. Balance on hand as of July 9, 1960, was \$485.95. Outstanding indebtedness is \$400.

H. McDonald, president of the L.L. organization, pointed out yesterday that the fine financial report is a result of much sacrificial service by many public spirited adults, who have operated concession stands and served in so many ways.

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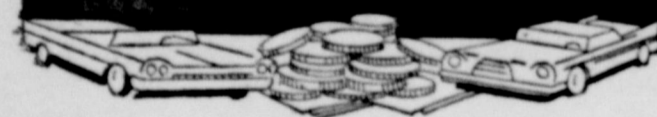

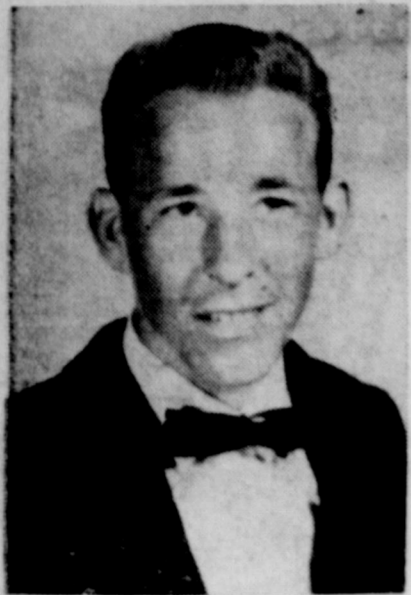
