

put up the money to have my Negro publisher who publishes home bombed. It got so bad the Anderson, South Carolina one week that I had to have Herald (P. O. Box 1079, Ander- the sheriff of Anderson County son, S. C.), and other papers to send two deputies to spend a night with me.

During February 1959, Da vis Lee filed a libel suit against all NAACP branches in South Carolina. He also filed suits against the Baltimore Afro-American, and the Pittsburgh Courier for printing Roy Wilkin's smear against him. After printing an article explaining why he had to sue his enemies, Lee said that he received several anonymous phone calls at his office and home daring him to appear in the street. The Herald reported that the threats against Mr. Lee were so vehement and frequent that it was necessary to place a police guard around his home.

The April 10, 1960 issue of Davis Lee's Herald reported that the Afro-American Newspapers of Baltimore, Maryland had settled all of his libel suits against them out of court just a few hours before three of the suits were scheduled for trial in the Federal District Court at Anderson, South Carolina.
