Prospect Is Bright For Bumper Peanut Crop

Prospect for bumper crops of peanuts are brighter than ever in the Cross Plains area. First peanuts are expected to begin moving to the market here the latter part of September or early in October.

W. T. Cox, local buyer, said yesterday that prices for 70 test nuts would be between \$197 and \$198 per ton. This is barely below \$3 a bushel.

Although rains over the Cross Plains area have been less than desired during the summer months, peanut crops have not suffered appreciably. The ample bottom season in soil at planting time tended to sustain the crop.

Wildcat Flowing Oil Near Nimrod

A new oil strike, which may vitalize interest in the Nimrod area, was made last week. The test, drilled on a block farmed-out by Magnolia, is located on the Schaefer heirs tract, two miles east of Nimrod in Eastland County.

Exact potential of the well is not known, however, on a drill-stem test it gassed to the surface in three minutes and flowed in one hour and 10 minutes. Initial pressure was 1,110 pounds per square inch and flowing pressure 1,015. The hole's bottomed at 2,884.

Local oil men say production is from an 18 foot saturated zone in the upper Caddo limestone. Preliminary estimates of production were between 100 and 200 barrels daily.

Drilling has started one location east of the new strike. It is a re-entry into an old hole drilled by Don Shoate.

522 Enroll Monday As New School Term Is Begun Here

Cross Plains schools began the new term Monday morning.

"After 31 years in the teaching profession," said Supt. Paul Whitton yesterday, "Monday

was the most orderly opening day I've ever experienced."

Twenty-six instructors, 522 students, 10 bus drivers and 7 school employees inaugurated

the new semester with purpose and punctuality. All activities moved on schedule and the entire operation functioned smoothly.

Fourth first grader interviewed was Donald Pope, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pope, who commented: "My twin brother in the first grade writes better than I do but I can read better than he... riding the school bus is fun... asked by the reporter which he expected to make better grades, he or his twin, Don opined: we'll probably tie."

89-Year-Old Football Fan Laid To Rest Here Sunday

Mrs. S. B. Harris, 89, who died Saturday morning shortly after 11 o'clock, was laid to rest in the Pioneer Cemetery Sunday afternoon. Services were conducted from the Cross Plains Church of Christ with Elder B. R. Houze of Big Spring officiating, assisted by C. L. Casey of Cisco.

Mrs. Harris was born in Boone County, Ark., June 29, 1871, and had lived near Pioneer the past 14 years. She was a member of the Primitive Baptist Church.

A number of years ago Mrs. Harris and her husband were cited as number 1 Cross Plains High School football fans. Despite the fact both were then past 80 years of age, they attended nearly all games while their grandson, Billy Jack Harris, was a member of the team.

Survivors include the husband, six sons: W. F. N. C., L. C. and P. H., all of Midland, L. B. of Rising Star and Jess of near Pioneer; 34 grandchildren, 62 great grandchildren and five great great grandchildren.

Grandsons were pall bearers. They were: Victor, Max, Leonard, Carl, Orbie and Don Harris.

Half Inch Of Rain Received Monday

A half-inch shower which fell in Cross Plains Monday night yielded a half inch of moisture. The precipitation brought total rainfall received thus far this year to 10.85 inches, according to records maintained by S. F. Bond, official observer for the U. S. Weather Bureau here.

Showers in town Tuesday afternoon were unmeasurable and were recorded as only a trace. Total rainfall for the month of August was 2.01.

Dove Season Open In Area Thursday

Local nimrods were oiling shotguns and laying in supplies of ammunition yesterday for the opening of dove season at noon Thursday.

Birds are reported plentiful in the Cross Plains area.

Daily bag limit this year is 15 and possession limit must not exceed 30. Legalized shooting hours are from 12 noon until sunset. Shotguns must be permanently plugged to three-shell capacity, and may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles is prohibited.

A 33 man Buff squad will be seeking to stop the Bear's two year winning streak over the locals. The Thundering Herd has 14 returning lettermen, four of which are two year letter-earners. Baird has 10 returnees, and is picked a strong second in their district, 7-B.

The county seaters are touted to have a fast backfield working from the "T" formation. While Cross Plains is not considered especially fast, the Buffs are bigger than in recent years, and they have 14 experienced lettermen. The Buffs average 154 pounds.

The non-conference battle will start at 8 p.m. in Baird.

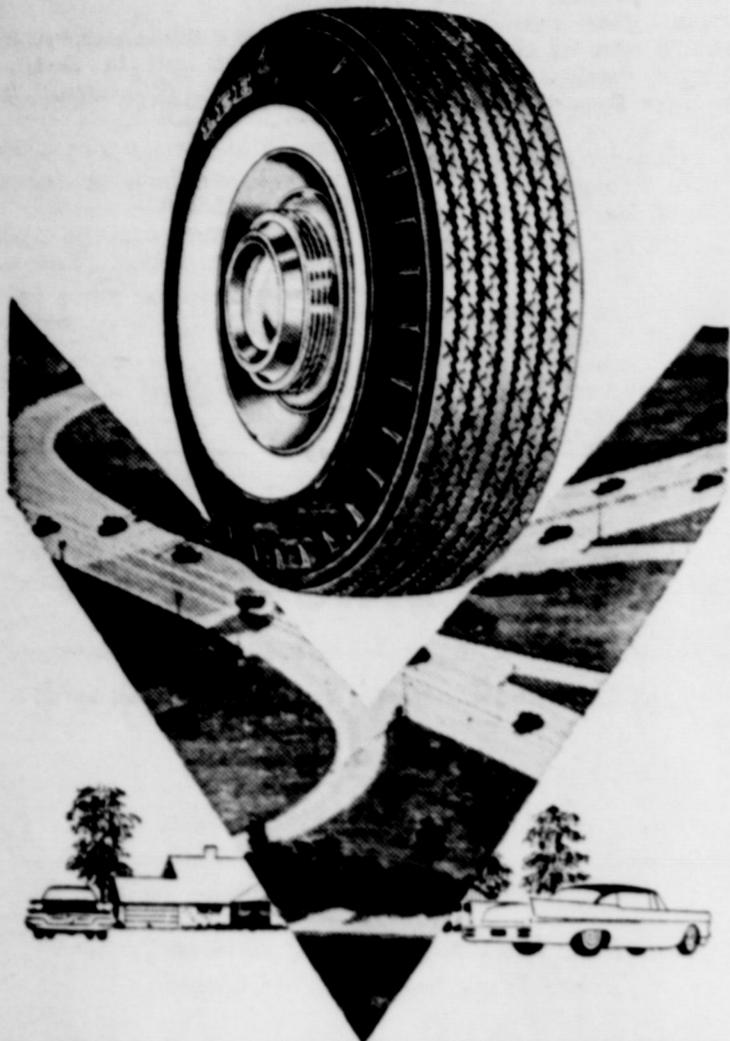

The well-known Brownwood businessman was killed in a plane crash near Elgin, Okla. Four other persons also died in the crash. They were: Loy T. Brown, 25, son of the Brownwood man, Patricia Brown, 23, the younger Brown's wife, Paul Krueger, 43, a North Texas State College music professor, and Paul Krueger, Jr., 4-year-old son of the professor.

The craft had been the object of a day-long search before it was spotted Friday night with the mangled bodies of its occupants.

The plane, piloted by Loy Brown, had left Dallas early Friday en route to Minot, N. D., by way of Oklahoma City.

Its last message indicated weather trouble — southern Oklahoma was infested with thunderstorms at the time.

At 5:10 a.m. Brown radioed

Sheppard Air Force Base at Wichita Falls, he was attempting to find the Lawton airport. At the time he was over Ardmore, Okla.

Jim Williams, a Lawton newsman, reported watches on the passengers' arms stopped at 5:20.

Williams, a pilot, said the airplane plowed into the earth at a steep angle, splintering, but not catching fire.

The ill-fated craft tore a hole about four feet deep and 15 feet long in the ground.

The wreckage was discovered by an aircraft from Fort Sill which had been taking part in the search. The crash site was about one mile north of the sprawling military reservation.

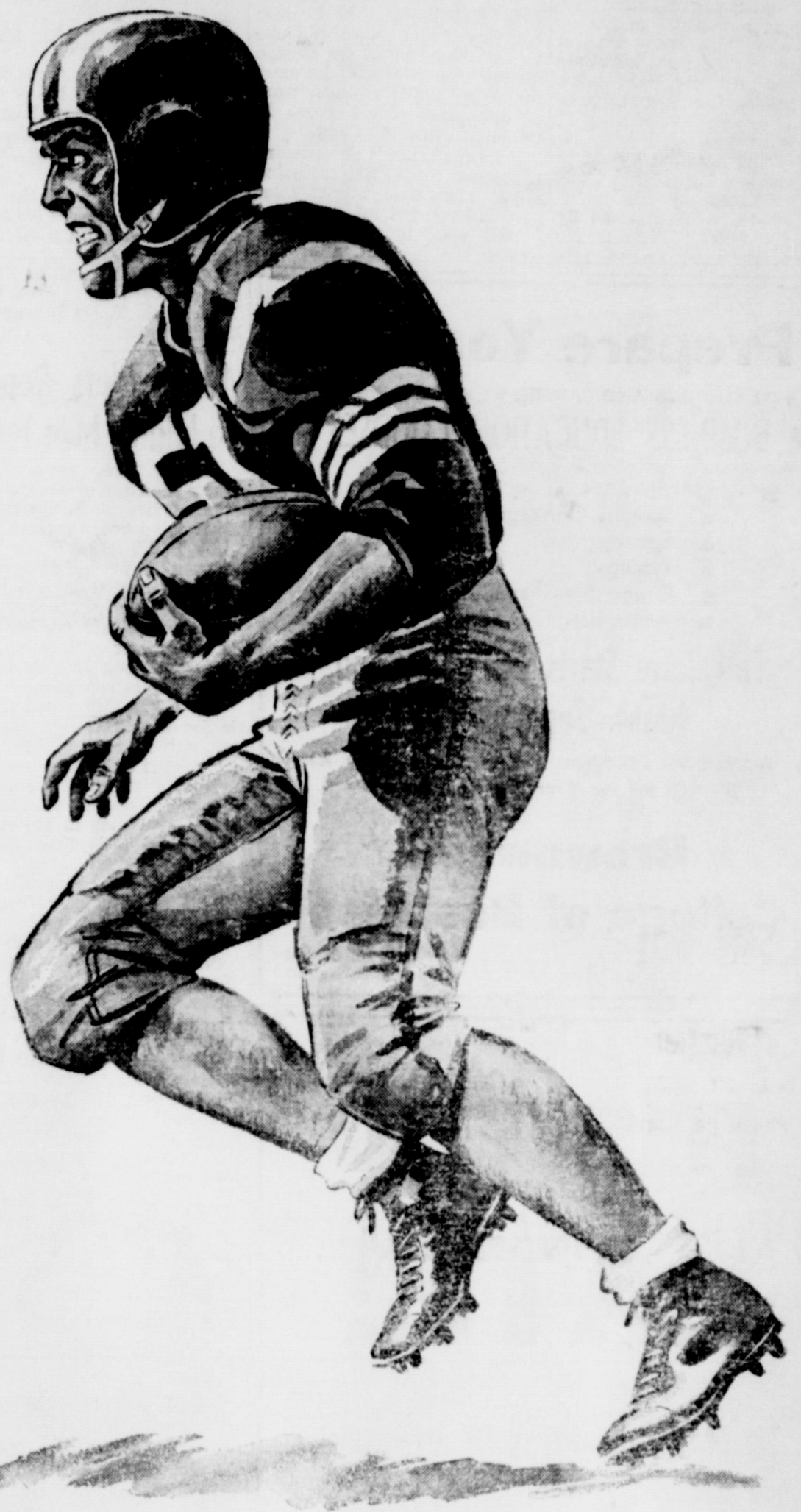

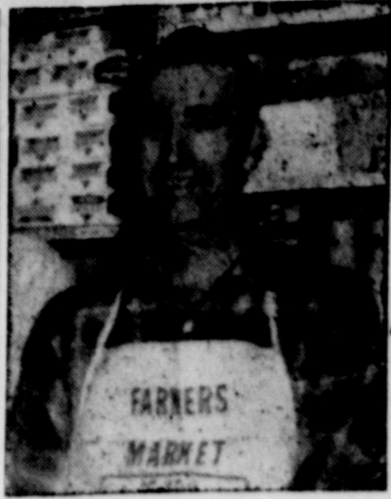
