Cemetery Fence Fund Given \$375 This Week

More than 24 per cent of funds necessary to build a new chain-link fence around Cross Plains Cemetery are now on deposit at the Citizens State Bank here.

That report was made yesterday by a solicitation committee composed of W. A. (Slim) Crutchmer, Mrs. J. Peyton Smith and Mrs. Eli Powell.

Persons who have not sent contributions to the fund are being urged to do so at once. Money may be mailed to any member of the committee or left at the Citizens State Bank.

WOODMEN SERVE 148 AT OYSTER SUPPER TUESDAY

One hundred and forty-eight people were fed at the Woodmen of the World oyster supper here Tuesday night.

Purpose of the function was to entertain local people in the lodge hall and at the same time raise funds for the organization's community service program.

"We are humbly grateful to everyone for their presence and fellowship," said Roy Cox, local WOW Camp Commander.

The modernistic type of fence to inclose the cemetery will cost in the neighborhood of \$3,000, committee members state.

Donors this week to the fund were: W. A. Payne \$10, Jim McGowan \$20, Citizens State Bank \$200, Fern Adams \$10, Naomi McClure \$10, B. K. Eubank \$10, West Texas Utilities Co. \$100, Mrs. Edgar McMillan \$5, and R. E. (Hick) Edgington \$10, for a total of \$375.

Contributions reported last week totaled \$350, bringing the amount now on hand to \$725.

"Several other large contributions are expected to be received within the next few days," Crutchmer said yesterday. "They have already been promised, however, we are not counting anything until its on deposit in the bank."

Should sufficient money be received during the present campaign, there is some talk here of hot-topping the street from the end of pavement on West Eighth Street to the cemetery and possibly surfacing roads inside the grounds. Nothing definite, however, has yet been worked out on this.

Paramount Oil, Inc., of Abilene No. 2 H. D. Gary, et al. is to be drilled as a 2,900-ft. rotary project one mile northeast of Cross Plains.

Drill site is 330 feet from the north and 1,250 feet from the west lines of R. R. Puckett Survey 770. Location places it 570 feet north of No. 1 Gary, a 3,725-foot Ellenburger producer.

During the Rev. Mr. Walters' tenure at the local church, a \$75,000 building has been completed, the budget raised from \$14,000 to \$28,000 annually, and nearly 300 persons added to the membership.

New Street Lights Go Up In Residential Area

Twenty-one new street lights are being installed in the residential area of Cross Plains and one additional large type illuminator is being added by the city here this week.

Church Recommends Youth For Minister

District Superintendent Dr. Allen Peabody, of Cisco, conducted quarterly conference and brought the message at the First Methodist Church here Sunday night.

James Payne, Cross Plains High School senior student, was recommended for a license to preach. He will go before the District Conference, which has jurisdiction in granting licenses.

Two new stewards for the church were elected. They are Dr. M. E. Roth and J. C. Bowden.

Reports of members indicate the local Methodist congregation has been enjoying good success. There have been nine additions to the church roll in the last five months.

Workmen began Monday afternoon setting new poles. The additional light being installed by the city is across the street north of Worthy's Grocery and Station on Highway 36, in the western edge of the corporate limits. It will be a 6,000 lumen light, the same as those on Main Street with the exception of the town's seven brightest lamps, which are 10,000 capacity.

The lights being installed in the residential district are of 2,500 lumens, two and one-half times as bright as the old type, arm and reflector fixtures.

The residential lights are being paid for by property owners at the rate of \$15 annually. In several cases two or more householders have gone together in sharing the expense.

"I wish to compliment our citizens on providing these new lights," said Mayor Ted Souder yesterday, "perhaps some time in the future we may be able to install many more."

Bench Warrants To Send 4 Felons Before Grand Jurors

Four bench warrants were issued this week summoning three men and one woman, now held in jails at Belton and Lockhart, to appear before Callahan County Grand Jury which convenes Oct. 31.

The three held in jail at Lockhart are: Mrs. Eva Rae Daniels, 25; Jack Daniels, 29, and Elmer Musselwhite, 35. Summoned from Belton jail will be James Daniels, 20. The four have been charged with burglary in Callahan County.

Bench warrants were necessary to return the quartet here because each one has already

been convicted of a felony, and is currently waiting transportation to the state penitentiary.

Three women and one man will also be brought here for grand jury investigation. Two of the quartet, a man and wife, are held in jail at San Saba. The other two were at large Wednesday morning but were expected to be picked up momentarily.

The eight persons will be brought to Callahan County by Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson, who filed charges against all of them in connection with burglaries of eight local rural homes.

If Weather Not Enough, Local Farmers Given 2 New Worries

As if the weather did not present enough problems, local farmers were given two new causes for concern the past week.

Army worms have appeared in a number of grain fields and are reported doing extensive damage, and "Southern Blight" is evidenced in some peanut crops of the area.

BIG RATTLESNAKE SLAIN WEST OF HERE SATURDAY

A diamondback rattlesnake, four feet and 11 inches long and weighing seven pounds, was killed on an oil lease west of Cross Plains Saturday afternoon by Bob Dean.

The large reptile, viewed by at least 20 people here, was said by many to be the largest of his type ever seen locally.

They have been mainly an infestation of East and South Texas. The worms are not easily seen in the daylight hours. They hide in the soil and come out in the late afternoon and feed on tender grain throughout the night. Their damage has been so extensive that replanting will be necessary in some fields.

"Southern Blight" has not been widely spread, however, it is blamed with curtailment of many local yields. Agronomists say rotation of crops is the only remedy for the malady.

The army worms, which some observers say double in size every day until they reach maturity, have heretofore done little damage in the Cross Plains area.

Location for a 1,900-foot rotary project has been staked six miles west of Cross Plains in the Am-Hard (Cross Plains) Field. It is Lamar D. Evans, Abilene, No. 6 G. A. Bowden, 1,700 feet from the north and 970 feet from the west lines of G. M. Vigal Survey 798.

Walter Pope, eldest son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Pope, scored seven placings with entries in the sheep division, and Tommy Garrett, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Garrett, won eight places in the dairy division of the show.

Young Pope had seventh and eighth place winners in the ram lamb class, third in the pen of three lambs division, 11th and 12th in ewe lamb competition,

fourth in the pen of three ewe lambs judging, and fourth among all lamb flocks.

Garrett's winnings were as follows: 10th in bull calves, 14th in junior yearling heifers, ninth in aged cows, 10th with three-year-old cows, seventh with two-year-old cows, sixth in dairy herds, and third in get-of-sires.

Both local youths are sophomores in Cross Plains High School and are active in vocational agriculture work and projects of the local Chapter of Future Farmers of America.

September Fines Reach New High Of \$1,593.20

Fines collected in Justice Court in Cross Plains during September totaled \$1,593.20.

Previously the high month for collection of fines here was June 1960, when the aggregate was \$1,589.00.

In reply to a question, "What happens to fees received from fines; what political subdivisions get it?" J. M. McMillan, local Justice of the Peace, pointed out that the receipts from his office last month were apportioned as follows: \$63.75 went to the state, \$220.04 to county commissioner's precinct 1, \$146.69; to precinct 2, \$183.36; to precinct 3, \$183.36; to precinct 4, \$264.00; to the county's jury fund, and \$532.00 to the county general fund.

In addition to the cash fines received in Justice Court here during September, two others were settled by jail sentences. One of the service fines was for \$69.50 and the other for \$25.50.

Oil operators filed applications with the Railroad Commission for permission to drill seven new projects near Cross Cut.

A wildcat is slated to be drilled to 3,000 feet with rotary three miles northwest of Byrds Store. It is Clark Oil Co. of Odessa No. 1 Ellis Newton, located 7,957 feet from the south and 3,000 feet from the west lines of N. B. Mitchell Survey 136.

W. M. Durham Jr., of Comanche No. 1 J. E. Prater was staked as a proposed 1,500-foot rotary project, 3 1/2 miles south of Cross Cut. Drillsite is 1,741 feet from the north and 150 feet from the east lines of the southwest quarter in W. L. Swain Survey 145.

Harding Brothers of Dallas staked five locations in the regular field three miles east of Cross Cut. Permit depths applied for are 1,500 feet with rotary.

Site for No. L-2 O. Thompson is 3,451 feet from the south and

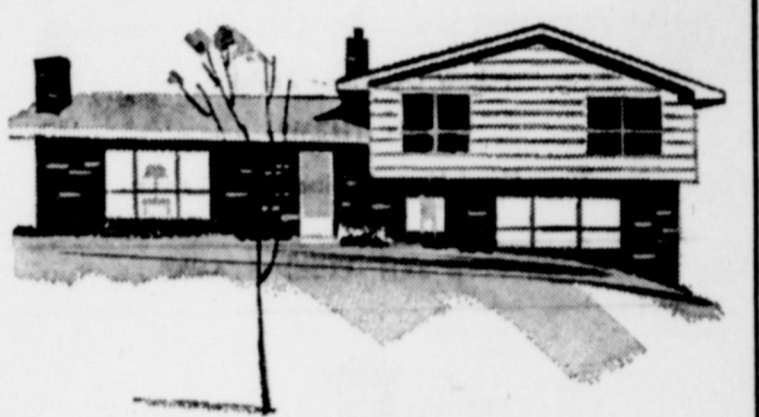

PHILOSOPHER WANTS WORLD TO KEEP PRODUCTION COSTS UP ON H-BOMBS

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou seems to be worried about deflation in the bomb market, his letter this week indicates.
 "Dear editor:
 "When I turn on a hydrant and see running water, I sometimes think science is man's greatest benefactor, but when I pick up a newspaper, I sometimes think it's his worst enemy.
 For example, I read in a newspaper last night that science has now discovered a cheap way to produce a nuclear bomb.
 Before I go any further, I don't know whether you're in the habit of shifting gears in

your mind when you get up on the international level or not, but it's necessary to follow a discussion of this type, and I will appreciate it if you'll stop and do it. That is, take the word 'cheap.' If you're in low, or ordinary gear, cheap means cheap, like low-priced automobiles before they became high-priced, or a \$40 suit marked down to \$50 and then marked down to \$39.50, but in international, or high-gear thinking, cheap means something else. The first atomic bomb cost, I think, better than a billion dollars, but this new method science has developed can produce one for around 50 million dollars. I'm not trying to be funny, that is comparatively cheap.
 "At any rate, if a nuclear bomb now be made for 50 million dollars, the experts figure at least 20 other nations besides the three or four that now have it can soon have the bomb too.
 "This is the reason I say scientists seem to have as their goal working themselves out of a job, because I can name some of those 20 nations it's going to be highly unhealthy to let have the bomb.
 "You take Cuba. If all that's standing between Castro and a hydrogen bomb is 50 million dollars, he can make that much just by getting on television one afternoon and taking over a few more American businesses over there. In fact, I guess you would say Castro is the highest paid television performer in the history of the industry. I understand some American television stars make a million dollars for 52 shows a year, but Castro can make 50 times that much the first 30 minutes he's on the air. Ask any American who's lost a refinery over there. And he sometimes speaks for four or five hours.
 "Now I don't trust Castro with a B-B gun and a bag of chicken feathers, not to mention Castro with three or four hydrogen bombs and three or four planes and enough gasoline to fly to you know where.
 "If scientists were smart, they would make hydrogen bombs more and more expensive to make, like tractors. What's got in to em, anyway?

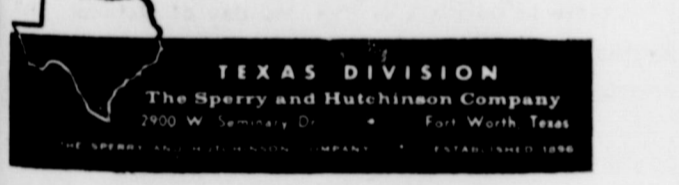

POISON ON TELEVISION

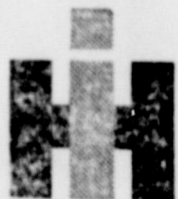

Plains High School Buffaloes made the virtual impregnable wall of their forward line Friday night to a 16-8 conquest of the Santa Anna Mountaineers. The game was the 10-A contest for both squads.

Bill Gunn's improving offense jumped off to an early start on their fourth drive. After the visitors' initial punt on the 45, the locals moved to the 35. Quarterback Doug Dallas faded back for a 12-yard pass to John Baird, who was tackled in the end zone. Baird action on a dead-run play broke stride until he was tackled by Dallas as he skirled right end.

Plains evened the count on the third chukker with a 30-yard gallop by Dockery. Harold Dockery, who turned in one of his most sparkling performances, scored the touchdown on the two points with a power right guard.

Plains moved ahead on the first play of the quarter. John Baird took a double reverse, his strong left arm and the poised fingers of Dockery. 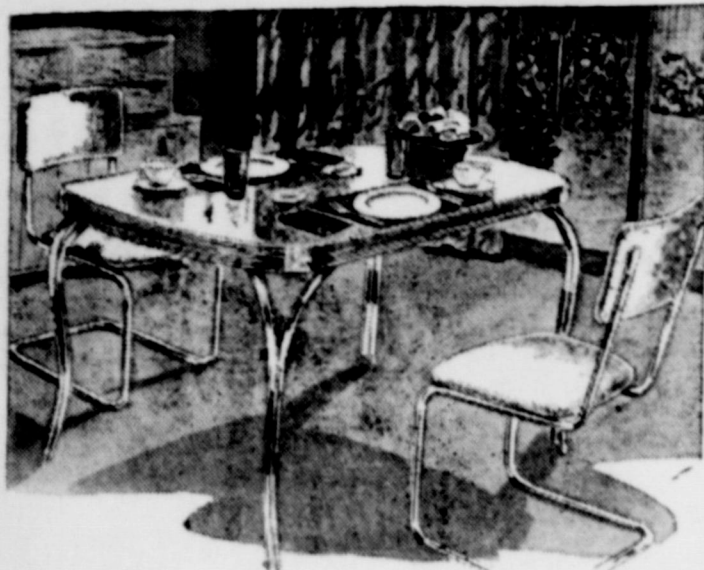
