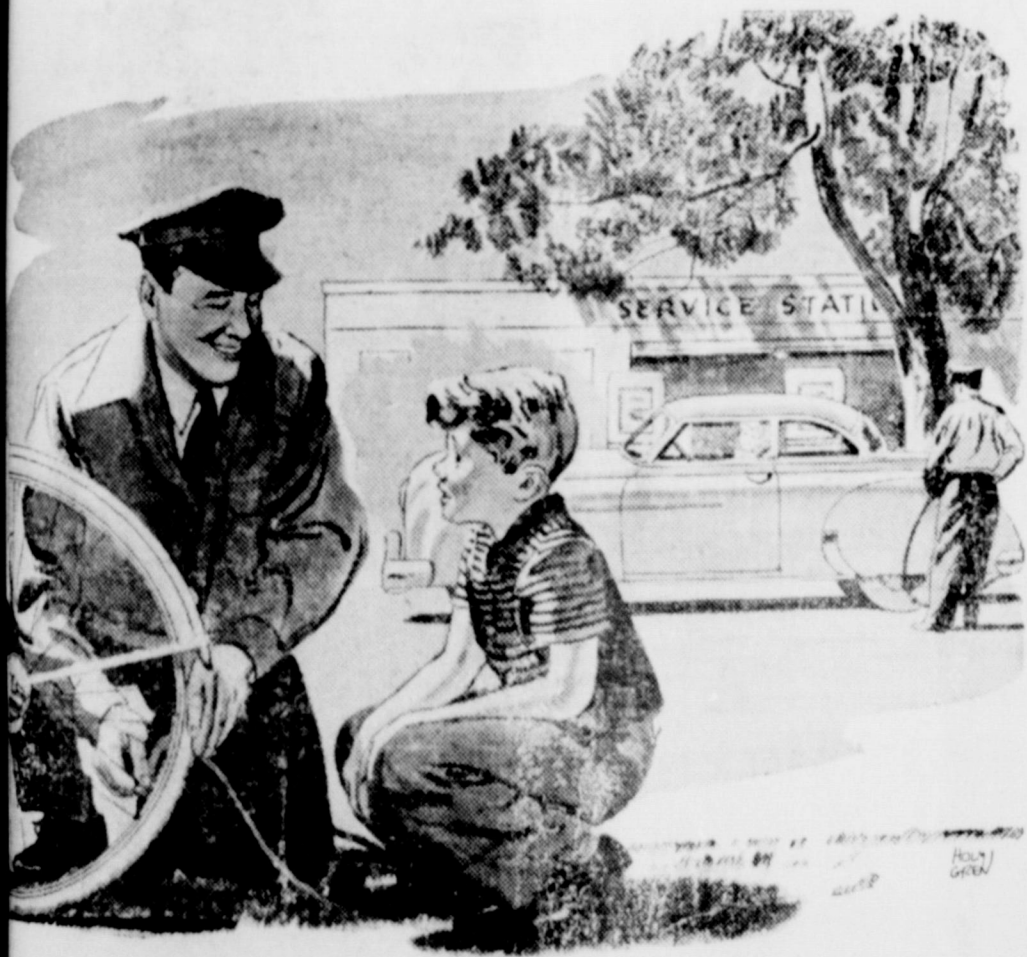

Deputy's Home Will Have 2-Way Radio

Cross Plains City Council meeting in extraordinary session Tuesday night, voted to pay one-half the cost of installing two-way radio facilities in the home of Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson here. Callahan County will be asked to pay the remainder. Total cost of the facilities are expected to be \$380.

Installation of the new equipment will make it possible for local people to contact the Deputy more rapidly. Heretofore it has often been necessary to telephone the sheriff's office in Baird and have officials there radio Richardson.

It is pointed out that much of the local deputy's work is along highways and in rural districts. In recent weeks his home has been besieged with calls and on occasion immediate contact with Baird has been impossible to establish. Under the new arrangement Mrs. Richardson will accept calls for her husband and forward them to him by radio.

City Councilmen expressed appreciation for the type of law enforcement Cross Plains is currently enjoying.

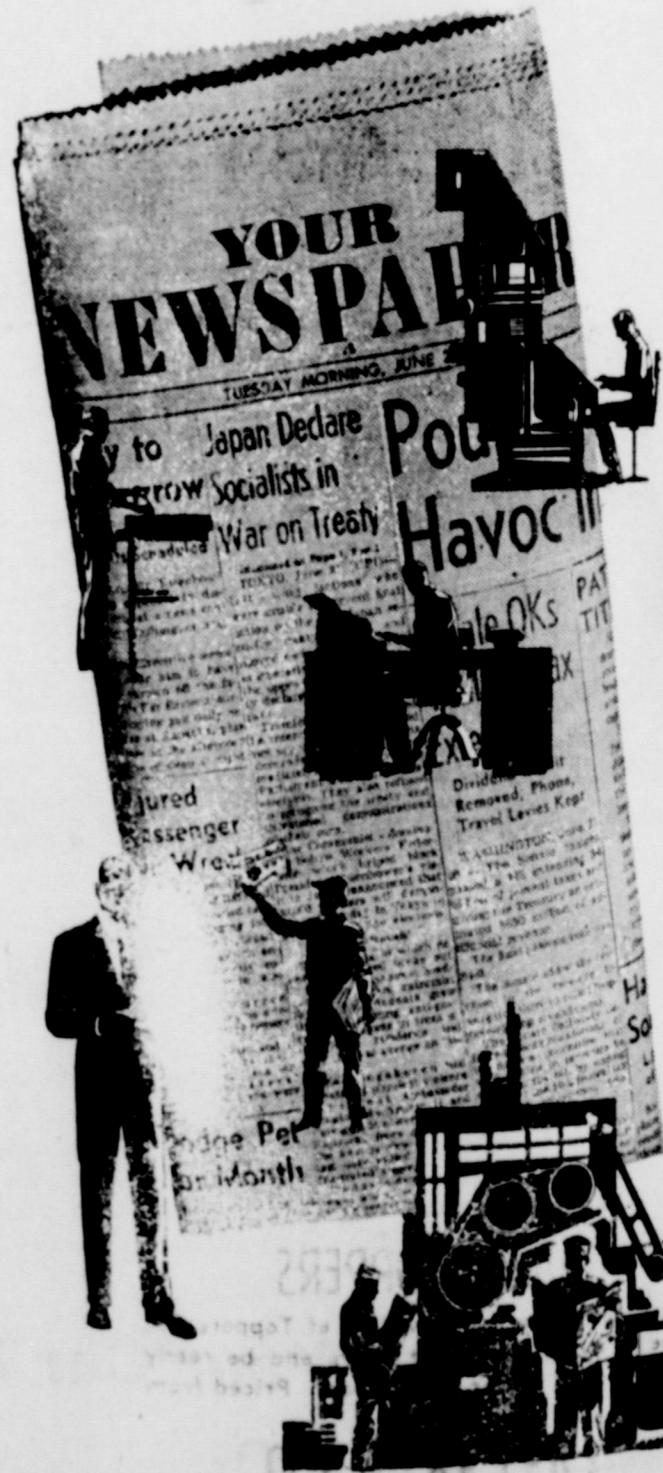

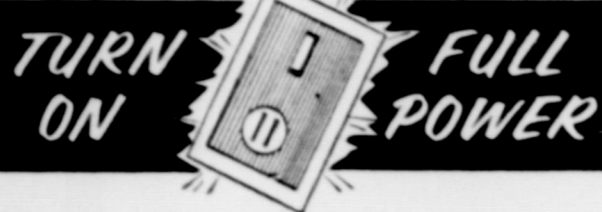

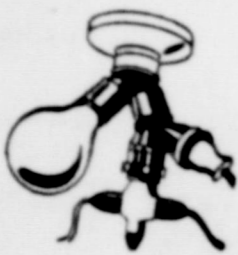


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Early Longhorns Blister Buffs 32-8 There Friday

Longhorns packed 32 touchdowns in the first and fourth periods to win over the Cross Plains Buffs 32-8 Friday.

Three minutes had elapsed in the game when home team Early took an eight-point lead and half minutes later Longhorns had raised the score to 14-0.

In the first half, the Buffs battled on about even with the Longhorns.

Early took the lead in the third period when Left Halfback Alvin Smith passed to Doug Dallas for the TD. Quarterback Jim Baird for the conversion.

In the final stanza, the Buffs scored their first six points in the period.

Early Takes Lead.

Early took the opening kickoff and moved the pigskins in six plays. Right Halfback A. Milam climaxed with a 26-yard sweep. Quarterback Jim Baird passed to Left End Alvin Smith for the two-point conversion.

Early added another

touchdown.

Early covered a Buff fumble on the locals' 43, and just two plays later Milam sprinted 42 yards over the right side for the TD. Smith was stopped short of the goal line on the conversion try.

Cross Plains took the kickoff and mounted a mild threat before losing the ball on the Early 29.

Longhorns Threaten.

Early took the ball and in two plays ran the ball to the Cross Plains 21 on the strength of Left Halfback Wayne White's 43-yard ramble. But John Baird stopped the drive, pouncing on a Longhorn bobble on the Buff 18.

The balance of the half was a stalemate with neither team being able to threaten seriously.

Buffaloes Score.

The one bright spot in the losing cause for the Buffaloes came early in the third quarter. Cross Plains marched 66 yards in 10 plays for their lone marker of the night.

Hutchins terminated the drive with a three-yard blast across the double stripe. Dallas passed to Baird for the two-point conversion. With 7:15 remaining in the third period, the score

read Early 14 and Cross Plains 8.

Key play of the drive was a fourth down, 10-yard pass from Dallas to Left End Dwayne Clark for a first on the Early seven-yard stripe. Two plays later Hutchins scored. A 15-yard penalty against Early spoiled the scoring drive.

Late in the third quarter, Longhorn Guthrie smothered a Buff fumble on the Cross Plains 32. With one minute gone in the fourth, Early had the clincher. Smith lofted a 12-yard aerial to Milam who caught the ball in the midst of three Buff defenders for the tally. Key play of the six-play, 32-yard drive was another 12-yard pass with the same scoring combination figuring in the play.

Slightly less than one and a half minutes later Early added another TD.

Again Cross Plains handed the scoring opportunity by fumbling. Early captured the ball on the Bison 19, but a 15-yard penalty moved the oval back to the Cross Plains 34. Next play Quarterback Smith did some more of his fancy ball handling and sent Milam around left end for 33 yards and a first inside the Buff one. Smith sneaked into paydirt. Conversion try failed.

With 1:20 left on the clock, Early scored again. A Buffalo fumble set up the counter when Early took possession of the ball on the Bison 31, and seven plays covered the distance.

Wayne White got the TD with a one-yard crack over the left side. A pass fell incomplete on the conversion try.

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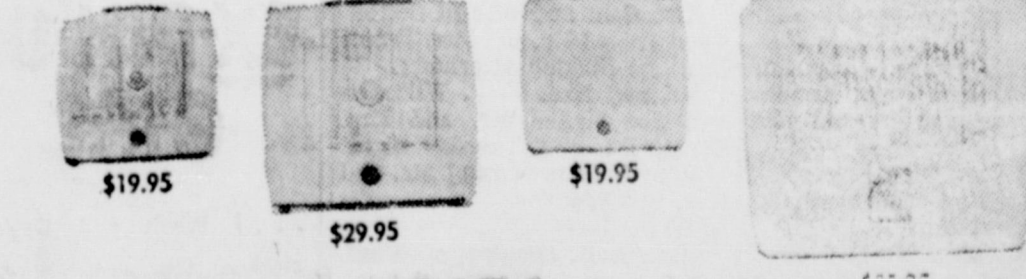
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
