## Rising Star Man Freed On Felony Theft Count

Melvin Fox, 27-year-old Rising Star man, was acquitted in 42nd District Court at Baird Monday afternoon on a felony theft charge in connection with a recent robbery of Jennings Auto Salvage in Cross Plains.

The jury deliberated about 45 minutes before returning a "not guilty" verdict.

District Attorney Wiley Caffey introduced as evidence a "voluntary written confession" by the defendant as state's exhibit.

Caffey summoned Cross Plains Deputy Byron Richardson to the witness stand. Richardson testified he had taken the confession from Fox. Price testified he had witnessed the statement. Rising Star Constable Blake Forehand testified he

had also witnessed the statement.

The defense, represented by Rupert Jackson of Baird, attacked the statement.

Fox, on the witness stand, testified that "Byron Richardson told me I had better go ahead and make that statement or he'd know the reason why I didn't."

Fox characterized the statement he attributed to Richardson as a threat.

Fox was charged with taking a battery and three radios, and from six to 10 auto generators from the Cross Plains used car lot of L. G. Jennings last July 18.

George Scott, called to the witness stand by Caffey, testified that he and Fox had taken the items from the used car lot.

## Commission Authorizes 15.7 Miles Highway Construction

New, direct route from Coleman to Cisco, through Cross Plains, moved a step nearer reality last week as the Texas Highway Department authorized construction of 15.7 miles of new pavement for State Highway 206, to be built during the 1961-62 program. Cost was tentatively set at \$955,000.

Broken into four projects, the program will start at Burkett, coming directly to Cross Plains and on to two miles into Eastland County. At the end of this 15.7 miles the highway will connect with an existing farm-to-market road, which is to be straightened and reconstructed to conform to the standards of

the remainder of Highway 206. The work-over on the farm to market road this side of Cisco will come later in another project, according to H. O. Woodward of Coleman, member of the Texas Highway Commission. A new section of State 206, from Coleman to Burkett, is just being completed, and is in use at this time. The balance of 206, from Coleman to U. S. Highway 67, is said to be in excellent condition.

The four projects for 206, as approved are: 5 miles in Coleman County from a point near Burkett, to the Brown County line, at an estimated cost of \$250,000.

In Brown County, 1.3 miles, at an estimated cost of \$65,000.

In Callahan County, 7.4 miles, from the Brown County line to the Eastland County line through Cross Plains, at an estimated cost of \$540,000.

In Eastland County, 2 miles, at an estimated cost of \$100,000.

Woodward is of the opinion that all four projects may be handled in one contract letting. Money has been allocated for the program. Surveying is expected to start soon.

At this time, State Highway 206 extends only from the intersection with U. S. 67 at Coleman to Cross Plains. This project will extend it on to Cisco. There it will intersect with the new Interstate 20.

Young farmers and advisers from 12 local chapters met Thursday in Cross Plains High School building to hear reports of progress in the organization and to study organizational improvement, according to Dr. J. R. Jackson, Agricultural Education Department of A. and M. College and associate adviser of the state organization.

O. B. Edmondson, teacher of vocational agriculture at Cross Plains; Harold Garrett, and Larry McAnally, attended the meeting for the purpose of securing information and suggestions pertaining to organizing and operating young farmer chapters.

Bobby Traweck, State Young Farmer Vice-President from Dublin, presided at the meeting in which Cal Johnson, Director, Southwest Public Relations, Sears-Roebuck Foundation, Dallas, and J. B. Payne, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture, Texas Education Agency, Stephenville, served along with Dr. Jackson as instructors and consultants in various phases of the Young Farmer program.

Young Farmers and vocational agriculture teachers from Dublin, Pottsville, Strawn-Desdemona, Mineral Wells, Santo, Rising Star, Comanche, Sidney, Cross Plains, Trent and Baird attended.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at two o'clock from the Burkett Baptist Church with Rev. E. G. Key, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Burkett Cemetery.

Born Oct. 15, 1901, in Burkett, Mr. Audas was the son of a pioneer Coleman County family. He was a retired Burkett merchant and stock farmer.

He married Alma Burns Jan. 23, 1923, in Burkett. He was a member of the Baptist church. Surviving are his wife; one son, William L. of Houston, and three grandchildren.

## PHILOSOPHER PROVES STUMBLING BLOCK IN THE FIRST STEP MOVING FORWARD

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou seems to be dragging his feet on a new idea, his letter this week indicates.

"Dear editor: Here it is only a week after the country has elected a new President and some things have already moved forward.

For example, the mail service — not the mail service generally, it's about where it always was — but a particular idea for the mail service.

As I understand it, the past office department in Washington is experimenting with a new type of mail delivery in which you write a letter on a special piece of paper, fold it into an envelope, drop it in a machine. The machine then opens it, looks at it, finds out where it's going, transmits it electronically to its destination, then tears up the original. On the receiving end, another machine reproduces it, seals it, and hands it over to the local post office for delivery.

I have been thinking about this system and I have my doubts. In the first place, if the machines can deliver a letter from New York to the Cross Plains post office, it won't be long before somebody wanting to move even further forward will figure out how to have it

delivered electronically to my mail box, and I'm having trouble enough keeping my present mail box propped up without having to maintain an electronic brain machine alongside it.

"In the second place, I don't ever remember having received a letter on any day that I'd have been any better off or more informed if it had gotten to me two days earlier. Very few people have any thoughts or messages to convey to me that are that important. And I don't know of anybody, congressman, governor, sheriff, newspaper editor, who would be any better off or any more informed finding out what I think two days earlier than he can find out now. I take the position that if it takes me a week to think up an idea, anybody waiting on it can wait an extra day and not be hurt. In some cases he could never heard and be just as well off. And this thing works vice versa.

"It may be important to get a guided missile to its destination in 30 minutes, but very few thoughts are that devastating.

"I think this country ought to move forward, even if it has to go around me to do it, but electronic mail service may not be in that category. I'm not interested in this country's spending money to get my monthly bills to me two days earlier than I'm getting them now.

## Construction Is Begun On Palatial, New Home

Work began Monday morning on what will probably be the largest house built in Cross Plains in more than 25 years. It is to be the home of Mr. and Mrs. Neal M. Dillard, who recently sold their place, four miles west of town, to John D. Montgomery.

The palatial new dwelling will be built facing Highway 36, in the eastern edge of the city limits. It will embrace more than 3,000 square feet, have three bedrooms, large den, kitchen, dining area, three baths, glassed-in patio, utility room and triple carport. Contractor

for the project is Mayes Lumber Co. of this city.

The house will be masonry from the ground up to four feet. The remainder of the exterior walls will be of half log siding, specially milled in Boulder, Colorado for this particular job. Driveways and approaches will be hard-surfaced.

The Dillard home is on 23 acres of land. The residence area will embrace more than 400 feet, fronting the highway.

Between 12 and 14 weeks will be required to build the house. It will be shown to the public before occupied.



# Albany Bops Buffs 42-8 In Season Finale Friday

Albany Lions won the District 10-A championship here Friday night as they humbled the Cross Plains Buffaloes, 42-8.

A total of 43 points were packed into the first half, 35 for Albany and the Buffs got their 8.

All five Lion touchdowns in the first half were indirect results of Buff misques. The visitors pounced on four loose balls and a fumble on a punt attempt set the stage for the Albany scoring parade.

Cross Plains got its only tally with just three seconds remaining in the first half.

On the exchange of fumbles, Albany took possession of the oval on the Buff 23-yard line. Right Halfback Don Mitchell swept left end for the final four yards of the five-play drive. Right Tackle T. G. Willie kicked the first of his five extra points.

Another Cross Plains bobble proved costly as the Lions moved 29 yards in five plays to pay dirt. This time the touchdown came via the air lanes with QB Roy Hogan hitting Left End Dennis Tucker with a six-yard shot. Willie again split the up-rights.

Late in the initial period of play Albany took over on a Buff fumble. After picking up a yard, and a five-yard penalty, Hogan again went to the air and found Right End Bud Leach in the end zone. The pass covered 34 yards. Willie kicked the point.

In the second period Albany continued their goalline crossing ways.

The fourth Buff fumble put the Lions in business on the Buff 47. Six plays later Fullback Johnny Agan blasted over left tackle for the final seven yards. Willie's kick was good.

A bobbled punt attempt set up the fifth Lion TD.

The visitors took the ball on the Buff 45 but a five-yard penalty moved it to the mid-field stripe.

But seven plays later the Lions had another touchdown. Left Halfback Bill Morrell plunged the final three yards. This time Right End Rocky Hill turned sixes into sevens.

Following the fifth Lion tally the Buffs caught fire and stormed back 68 yards for their marker.

Right Half John Baird got the drive off to a good start with a fine 22-yard kick-off return to the Cross Plains 32. After two plays netted eight yards, Baird ripped off 10 more. Left Half Alvin Hutchins spurted 11 yards to the Albany 39 on the next play.

That set the stage for the key play of the drive. Quarterback Doug Dallas pitched back to Baird who lofted the pigskin 30 yards downfield into the waiting arms of Right End Jerry Fleming for a first on the Lion nine.

On the next play Dallas flipped the oval to Baird in the right corner for the touchdown. The same combination worked on the two-point conversion, Dallas to Baird.

With less than three minutes gone in the third period, Albany crossed the goal line for the last time.

Following a 33-yard Buff punt, Albany took the oval on their own 31. After a nine-yard gain to their 40, Hogan faded and launched the pigskin into the arms of Hill, 35 yards downfield. Hill momentarily juggled the ball, but gathered it in and outran three Buffs for the final 25 yards of the 60-yard play. Willie completed his perfect night, splitting the uprights on the point after conversion try.

Albany drove 48 yards to the Buff five on the next series, but hard-charging Buff Guard Elvin Hutchins blocked the ball on an attempted field goal try.

Midway through the final quarter the Lions had a 30-yard pass and run touchdown called back by an infraction of the rules. Willie again went to the kicking tee, but the field goal try fell short and to the right.

### Buff's Take Third Place.

The Lion victory gave Albany undisputed title to the district crown with a 9-1 season record and a 5-0 district mark.

Cross Plains ended the season in third place with a 5-5 season mark, and the locals tied for third in the district standing with a 2-3 mark. Early also had

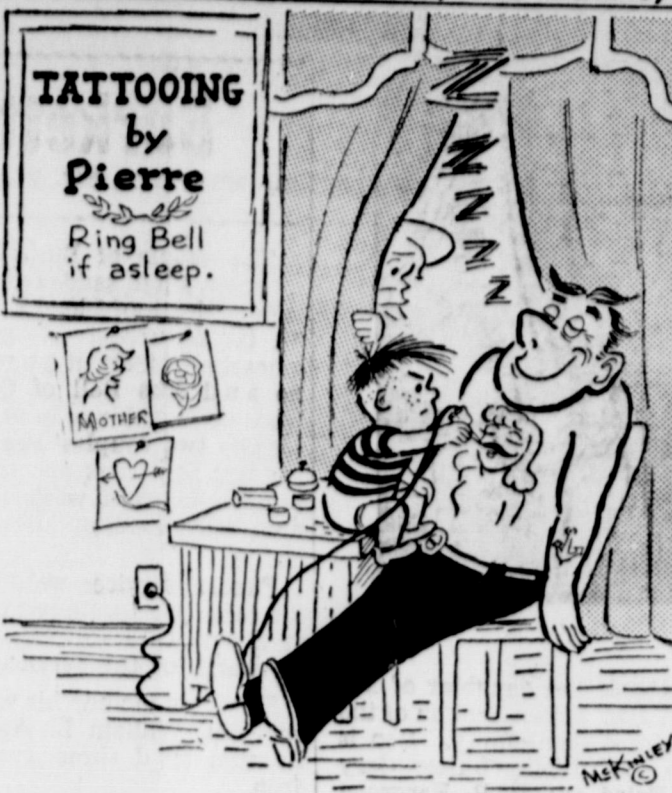

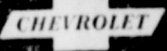

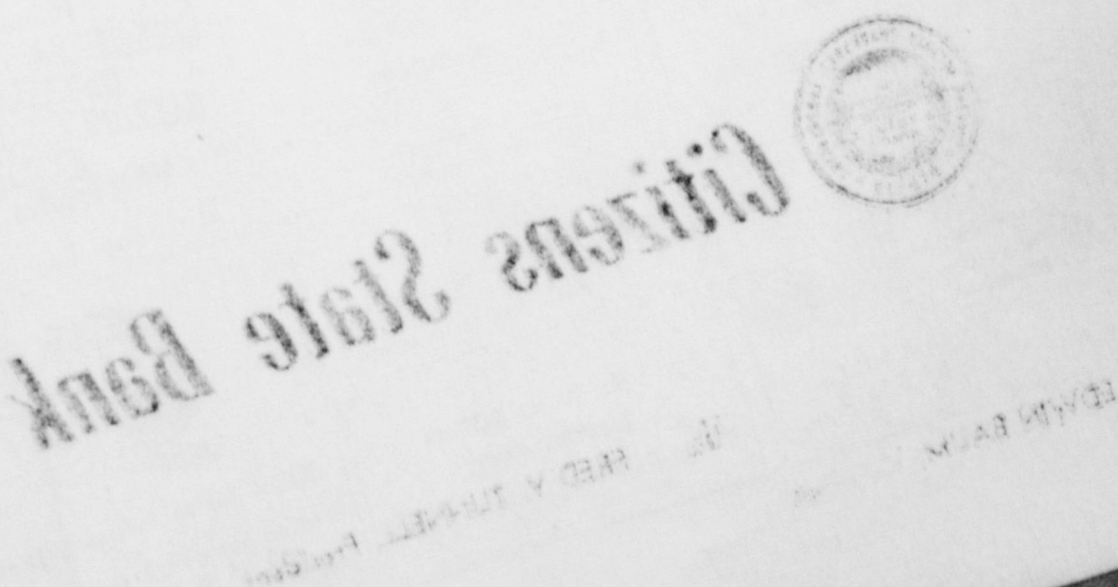

**SOCIALISM AND CHRISTIANITY**

Many people who know very little about Communism realize that its religious ideology is atheism. However, few realize the traditional socialist attitude towards religion. During recent years many American church members have been made to believe that socialism and christianity have much in common. Do they? Let us go back a few years and look into some important facts.

Socialism stems from Karl Marx just as does Communism. In his Communist Manifesto, Karl Marx called for the abolishing of "all religion, and all morality." Leaders of Socialism have proclaimed the same principle until recent years when they became silent on the issue because of the effective use of churches in promoting Socialism.

In 1906 a French Socialist leader named Herve said: "It is absolutely necessary to destroy all vestige of religious idea, Catholic, Protestant, and Jewish, in order to carry out the entire program of advanced Socialism, which depends upon the disappearance of every form of theological influence." A Socialist atheist Liebknecht said: "I am an Atheist, I do not believe in God. It is our duty as socialists to root out the faith in God with all our might, nor is any one worthy the name who does not consecrate himself to the spread of Atheism."

The New York Call of March 2, 1912 said: "There is nothing to be gained by holding out any false hopes that a study of Socialism does not tend to undermine religious beliefs. The theory of economic determinism alone, if thoroughly grasped, leaves no room for a belief in the supernatural." In a "Socialist Catechism" printed in a publication called "The Live Issue" during 1912, God was identified as "a word used to designate an imaginary being which people of themselves have devised" and regarding Christianity the Socialists said "Christianity is the greatest obstacle to the progress of mankind, therefore it is the duty of every citizen to help wipe out Christianity."

Socialists and socialistic-minded people have gone into the churches to promote their un-American philosophy just as some communists have done upon orders of their leaders. Therefore little of the anti-Christian nature of Socialism is heard today. Writing in the Christian Century, October 19, 1932 Paul Blanchard, long-time champion of socialist principles, said: "The church's survival, it seems to me, depends largely on whether the ministry has the courage to rise to the normal level of Socialism. The decline of moral principles in our nation during recent years shows how the churches have been affected by socialistic principles."
