

Soaking Rains Over Weekend Total 3.80

Flow, soaking rain, which started falling in the Cross Plains area Friday afternoon of the past week and continued intermittently until Saturday night were gauged at 3.80 on the official U. S. Weather Bureau gauge, kept here by S. F. "Fos" Bond.

According to reports the fall was general over this area with measurements in the county ranging from 3.00 at Clyde to 4.00 at Putnam. Thirsty land soaked up much of the moisture Friday and early Saturday but by noon Saturday, water was pouring off into low places and streams. Most farmers and ranchers report tanks brimful with many "running around." The run-off water was badly needed in this vicinity to refill stock tanks that were becoming uncomfortably low.

The moisture will be of real benefit to small grain crops and pastures and a few warm days will bring crops and winter grasses out in a hurry.

Turkey Creek was running bankful here Sunday morning and Pecan Bayou was bankful as it crossed Highway 279, on its way to Lake Brownwood.

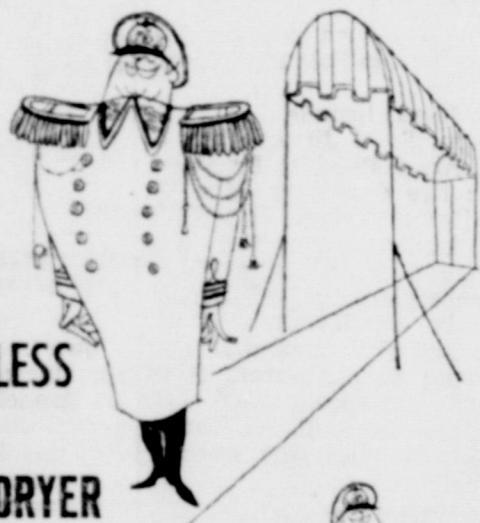

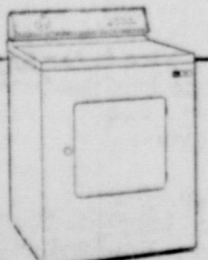

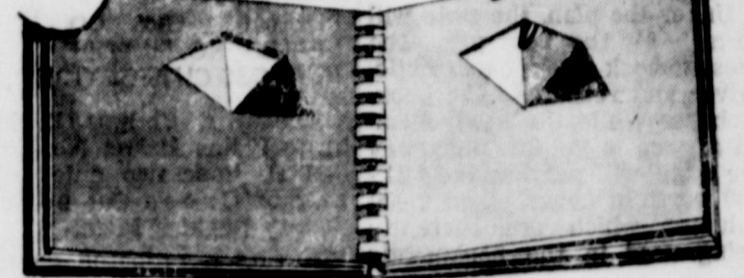

BOOKMOBILE ORGANIZED FOR CALLAHAN TAYLOR AND SHACKELFORD COUNTIES

Commissioners from Callahan, Taylor and Shackelford Counties met in Baird Tuesday of this week and joined forces to form the first multi-library service in Texas.

They voted formation of the organization and approved a budget of \$14,000 for the first year's operation, beginning next March 1.

The program will provide bookmobile library service to approximately 20,000 rural residents of the three counties.

Callahan County Judge J. L. Farmer presided at the meeting which was attended by four commissioners from Callahan County, Judge I. M. Chism and three commissioners from Shackelford County and Judge Reed Ingalsbee and four commissioners from Taylor County. Representing the state were Mrs. Annie Rae Gray and Mrs. Rosalyn T. Shamblin of the Texas State Library in Austin.

Under the plan, the state will furnish for the next year, the present book stock, bookmobile, driver and repairs to the bookmobile. While the newly-formed service is getting underway the state will provide the \$21,000 worth of books, about 7,000 volumes which are currently being used in the bookmobile service.

The \$14,000 budget will be paid for by the three counties according to the service rendered.

Callahan County will contribute \$4,000 for six stops made in the county. Taylor County will pay \$3,000 for 14 stops and Shackelford County will pay \$2,000 for three stops.

March 1, the tri-county organization will begin paying such items as the librarian's salary, clerk's salary, travel for the librarian and contributing to the bookmobile operation. After other expenses are paid \$3,000 will be set aside for the purchase of a bookmobile.

Schedule of stops will be announced later, along with further details of the operation, it was said.

The present bookmobile operation which has been conducted by the state as a demonstration service, expires Feb. 28. Cross Plains has been privileged to be included on the itinerary with stops being made on on Main Street here twice monthly.

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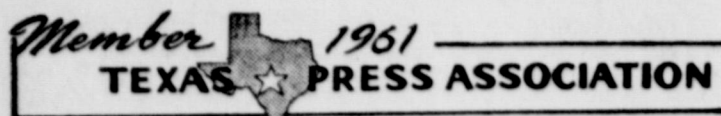

FOR and AGAINST LUMUMBA AND THE UN

Two names frequently mentioned in news reports on the African-Congo situation are Patrice Lumumba and Col. Joseph Mobutu. Lumumba is the communist conspiracy's stooge and Mobutu is strongly anti-communist. Communist leaders in Moscow and throughout the world are demanding that Lumumba be returned to power in the Congo. In the United States, the weekly communist Worker frequently harps on this demand. Left-slanted newspapers in our nation refer to Mobutu as "Strong-Man Joseph Mobutu", but Lumumba is given the nice title of Premier or former Premier.

A review of a few significant facts in the Congo mess will show clearly why Mobutu is so much disliked by the communists and leftwing liberals. After he gained control in the Congo, Col. Joseph Mobutu ordered the communist embassies to close and get their staffs out of the country immediately. This is the only kind of "diplomatic" dealing which the communist conspirators understand, and on September 17, 1960 the Soviet embassy hauled down its flag in what a newspaper report called "a humiliating end of relations with the Congo Republic." The flag came down ten minutes before the deadline set by Col. Mobutu, and the communist conspirators rushed out of this new nation. As one Soviet communist

"Wait till next time. We will be back."
The communists will not be back if Col. Joseph Mobutu has his way. A newspaper dispatch from the Congo on September 20 said that Mobutu had installed a commission of students and technicians pledged to protect the Congo "from Communist colonialism and from Marxist-Leninist imperialism." On November 8 Col. Mobutu said: "... Never, never will they be permitted to return as long as I am alive."

Now, just where does that so-called powerful force for "peace", the United Nations, stand in this perilous Congo situation? A UPI news dispatch of October 25 said that the UN "moved into the Congo to maintain peace and help Lumumba re-assert authority." Events in the Congo since Col. Mobutu chased the communist conspirators out indicate the correctness of this October 25 UPI report. There have been repeated complaints from anti-communist leaders in the Congo that the UN forces were working to undermine them and make it possible for the communist tool, Lumumba, to return to power. 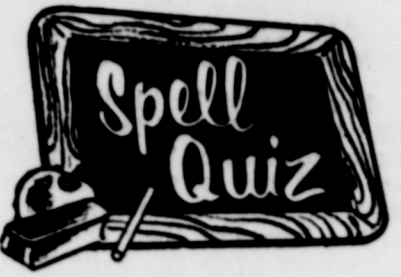

If somebody had built a dam upstream years ago, maybe the fence wouldn't have washed out, but at the moment, the only thing left to do is to sit there and watch it float away."

"A neighbor of mine was saying just this morning what a shame it is for President-Elect Kennedy to no more than get sworn in January 20 when he has to face up to the Cuban crisis. No time to lean back and get the feel of the Chief Executive's chair in the White House, no time to wander around the place and get used to the idea that he's now the President, has to work overtime the first day."

"But I don't look at it that way. I have a notion that four years from now President Kennedy will review the situation and wish that all his problems had been no worse than the Cuban situation. When a man applies for the job of President in these days, he's got to be equipped to thrive on one crisis after another, each new one worse than the old one."

"Therefore, don't be looking to me for a solution to the Cuban situation. That's what the President is hired for."

"I will add though that trying to solve the Cuban problem is like trying to stop a flood

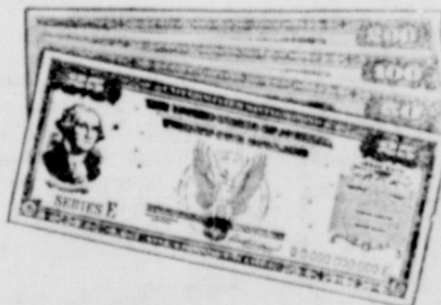
