Carole Cox Wins Local Betty Crocker Award

The 1961 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Cross Plains High School is Carole Cox, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Howard Cox.

Having received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating seniors, she becomes a candidate for the state Homemaker of Tomorrow award which will be announced in March.

Each school Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive an award pin, representing the slogan, "Home Is Where the Heart Is." The examination papers of school Homemakers of Tomorrow will be entered in competition to name the state's Homemaker of Tomorrow.

The \$110,000 homemaking education program sponsored by General Mills offers a \$1,500 scholarship to the first ranking girl in each state and \$500 scholarship to the state's second ranking participant.

State Homemakers of Tomorrow and their faculty advisors receive an expense-paid educational tour to New York City, Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., April 8-13, the trip culminating in the announcement of the All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow whose scholarship is increased to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in the nation will have their scholarships raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

150 Cross Cut Cattle Get Brucellosis Tests

Brown County's brucellosis testing program got underway in the Cross Cut area Monday with 150 cattle being examined.

Further testing was delayed Tuesday by rain, however, plans are to resume the work as soon as weather conditions permit.

Herds tested Monday included those of: Mrs. Porter J. Davis, James Oscar Koenig, J. M. Greenwood, Raymond DeBusk and Mrs. Lois Garrett. Next cattle to be tested include those of: Albert Conlee, Mrs. Dow Westerman, Emil Ringhoffer, Sam Balkum, August Garlitz and R. T. Watson.

Between 1,500 and 2,000 cattle are expected to be tested in the Cross Cut area, said Ross J. Newton, yesterday.

It is pointed out that persons who have cattle ranging in Callahan and any adjoining county may have all their animals examined as a part of the Brown County program, facilitating the movement of animals from one county to another.

Simultaneous with brucellosis testing in Brown County, herds are also being examined for tuberculosis. It is expected that 10 days or two weeks of fair weather will be required to finish the work in Brown County.

PHILOSOPHER PUZZLED OVER CONFLICT-OF-INTEREST LAWS WORRYING CONGRESS

Editor's Note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou, probably is too literal-minded, his letter this week indicates.

"Dear editor:

"I'm not interested in any appointment in Washington. I can get talked about enough right here at home where I'm comfortable without going to the national capitol for it, but I have been following the newspaper accounts of hearings on appointment made by the new President and it looks like I could qualify for nearly any of the jobs.

"That is, I wouldn't have any conflict of interests. I wouldn't have to sell off any stocks and bonds. I got a clean bill of health on that score, which seemed to be the only point the committees were interested in checking into when a prospective appointee came before them.

"As I understand it, conflict of interest means if a man owns stock in a big company doing business with the government, he's got to get rid of his stock before he can serve, or else he might have a natural tendency to let government contracts where it would do the most good for his stock.

"I have been thinking this matter over, and while I'm not going into the fairness of the law, it's probably a pretty good one, still I'm afraid Congress is going to have trouble enforcing it, if it goes into it far enough. "For example, take the Secretary of Health, Education and

Welfare. As I understand it, his job is to promote the health, education and welfare of the people, consequently, to avoid any personal conflict of interest, does this mean he has to get rid of his family and all his other relatives and friends? Obviously, he can't be promoting measures which will rebound to the interests of his own family.

"Or take the Secretary of Agriculture. He ought to know something about farming, and about the only way I know to learn something about farming is to own some land, yet clearly a land-owner would run head-on into a conflict of interest if he promoted something for the good of the land or the good of the farmer, although there are people who will say there have been Secretaries of Agriculture who could never be accused of promoting anything like that.

"This thing requires considerable study. And to top it off, I understand President Kennedy has converted his possible conflict-of-interest holdings into government bonds. And there you are. Every time he promotes something for the good of the government, isn't he promoting the soundness of those government bonds?

"Getting qualified men for government service is getting harder and harder all the time, but I doubt if it'll ever get hard enough to where I'll qualify.

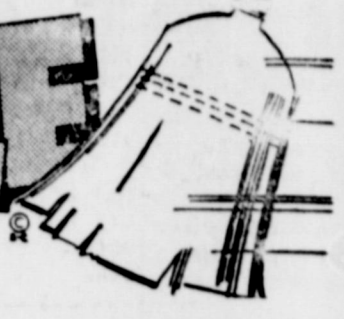

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Local Man Featured In Star-Telegram Article

Editor's Note: The following article, written by Jon McAnally, appeared in the Farm and Ranch section of the Fort Worth Star-Telegram Sunday, titled "Assets at 19" and highlights the career of Larry Cross Plains man who recently awarded the American Farmer degree by the Future Farmers of America.

McAnally, a 19-year-old near Cross Plains, is a young man. Determination is in him, soil and his ability to a living from 265 acres of organized farming and program.

His desires are strength several valuable assets. He was born and raised on and knows the business the best teacher—experi-

ence in his favor is an under- wife, Barbara, who says she wouldn't have her husband living any other way.

Another reason why Barbara feel like they stay on the land is their son, Mark. Both say that own thinking, children the country have a better hood than those raised

bara's parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. McAnally, are dairy farmers. They live near Cross Plains.

Larry is quick to agree that a living from a small ranching program has many hardships. But, plans for the future are not a permanent stay on his presently leased land, located nine miles southwest of Cross Plains.

"I want to own my own place and equipment and perhaps a few registered stock," Larry said.

Coming from his past farming and ranching experiences and he has grown since first coming into the business Larry wants to have a very good chance of achieving this goal.

Larry got his start in the livestock business while in the fourth grade. His dad gave him a part of the entire McAnally herd of cattle.

"The said I could pick one calf out of the bunch," Larry said. So he picked a heifer and started in the farming and ranching business.

With that start, Larry turned profits into more profits, investing them wisely. Now his herd numbers 20 head of good quality cows and calves.

Larry's experiences have also earned with outstanding honors and awards. Most of these during his high school years as a member of the Cross Plains Future Farmers of America Chapter.

He credits much of his success in FFA work to his high school vocational agriculture teacher, O. B. Edmondson.

"When I first started in the FFA, Prof. Edmondson urged me to set my goal high in the organization," Larry explained. Larry set it as high as he could. He aimed at becoming a recipient of the American Farmer degree, the highest degree of the FFA.

This goal was reached in October, 1960, when Larry, along with 22 other FFA members from Texas, were awarded the American Farmer degree. He received the highest state honor—that of Lone Star Farmer, in 1960.

"Prof. Edmondson was behind me all the way in my records and work in the FFA," he said.

Larry said actually his greatest thrill in the FFA came in 1957, when he won Maverick, the mystery calf in a calf scramble at the State Fair of Texas.

Then a junior in high school, Larry was among 30 boys who were battling for one of 15 calves which had been turned loose in the arena. The boy who caught the mystery calf would win a steer from Flat Top Ranch at Walnut Springs.

Larry was quick to catch a calf, but he was the last to get the animal haltered.

"They were just ready to disqualify me on time when I finally got my halter around the calf," Larry said.

"I was tired, dirty and hungry as I led the animal off, but when the announcer said I had caught Maverick, I forgot all of this."

Under Larry's grooming for a year, Maverick turned into \$650 profit for his youthful owner. It also won fourth place in the fat steer competition at the State Fair of Texas in 1958.

Explaining why he treasured being winner of Maverick so much, Larry said, "The American Farmer degree has a lot of honor with it, but winning Maverick was a chance in a lifetime."

During his high school FFA career, Larry won several firsts and seconds showing breeding stock in county shows. He also served as secretary of his FFA chapter.

At present the McAnallys are living on a ranch they have leased from an aunt. There's 165 acres of cultivated land on the place and about 100 acres of pasture. Their principal crops are wheat and oats.

"The oats are grazed in the fall and winter and the cattle are removed in time to get a spring harvest of grain," Larry said.

Larry and Barbara, who were childhood sweethearts, were married in August after their graduation from high school in May, 1959.

Barbara, who is no stranger to the farm, was an honorary member of the FFA for five years. During this time she raised and exhibited registered Jerseys in stock shows.

The young couple have had to learn to roll with the punches when bad luck strikes. The latest calamity they've had to cope with was the total loss of 20 acres of cotton planted last spring.

"The cotton was up and looking pretty one afternoon when we went to town. Some neighbors asked us if we had sprayed," Larry commented. "I said no and went back to the house."

"When we got there," Barbara added, "the grasshoppers had already eaten the cotton to the ground."

But, being the kind who always looks forward, Larry swallowed his sorrow over losing the cotton, disked the soil and planted it in oats.

Actually, Larry has about 550 acres under his care as he also does the farming on his dad's land. It joins Larry's place.

"We have turned all of the farming over to him," his mother, Mrs. E. N. McAnally, explained.

Under this joint operation, Larry does the work and his dad furnishes the equipment and helps in any other way he can. They, in turn, split the profits from his dad's place. But most of the older McAnally's time is taken by his job as manager of a lumber company in Cross Plains.

Larry has a brother an E'h grader who helps with the farming. He's different from Larry in that he's primarily interested in hogs as money-makers.

In order to supplement his income from agriculture, Larry does carpenter work during the winter months, the slack period of farming. His carpenter knowledge came in handy before marrying when he and

Barbara completely remodeled the house in which they live.

As to the future, Larry says he would like to go to college, if he could figure out a way to commute. He has considered college in Abilene, Cisco and Brownwood.

"I'd like a college degree in agriculture," Larry commented. Larry voiced even bigger plans for the future and said he would like to raise a herd of registered cattle. He's already looked into the potentials of Santa Gertrudis and Brangus beef cattle.

Larry plans to stay in FFA work until he is 21. Then he wants to become a member of a Young Farmer of America chapter he is helping organize at Cross Plains.

Gov. Price Daniel said of Larry when he won Maverick that Texas would be hearing from this boy in the future. By watching Larry in action and witnessing his determination, one would have to say that the governor made a statement which appears on its way to becoming a reality.

County Agent Glen W. Green and Nathan Foster, representing the Farm Bureau, have been arranging for the gatherings, and told The Review yesterday that Dr. James B. Henderson would attend both sessions to point out the advantages of immediate testing and answer questions regarding the program.

Most counties adjoining Callahan are reported to have already instituted or scheduled brucellosis testing of cattle herds.

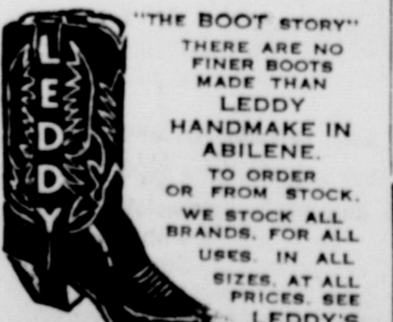

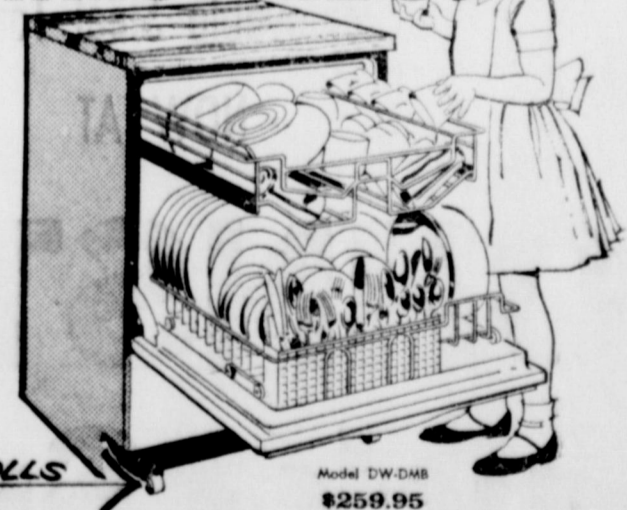

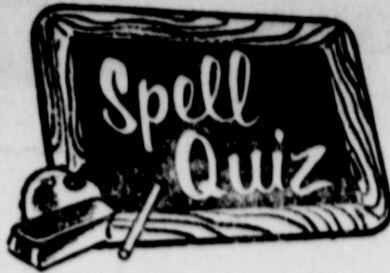
