To illustrate how really technical the gas business is, consider: probably no more than a half dozen men to serve the city council within the next 20 years have been sufficient to maintain in engineering monthly gas charges from the city from daily at the office meter.

It is difficult to locate the gas which might arise in payments made by the city. They probably run in the neighborhood of \$20,000 annually.

There is certainly no reflection on the fine men who have been rendering sacrifice to the city. A man must be adequately trained to do what surgeon can do, or what bricklayer can do, or what first year algebra?

From the standpoint of economics, is it advisable for the city to own its own gas system in the face of such obstacles?

All public utility concerns required by state law to pay 10 percent of their gross receipts to the municipality by which they are franchised. Telephone Company and Texas Utilities pay two of all receipts from gas into the city treasury.

Any merchant can tell that two per cent of the gas represents a sizeable chunk of the net.

The City of Cross Plains will sell its gas system to some firm in this field. The price would likely be high to pay off the town's bonded indebtedness. The city would get the two per cent gross receipts tax from the gas company currently does from the public utilities operating.

In addition, the city levies an ad valorem tax on the gas company on the telephone company, the electric company, additional taxes, plus savings on about \$50,000 of bonded indebtedness probably aggregated and presently profited from gas system. A private gas company could tie-in the system interstate trunk lines, guaranteeing a sufficient gas in any kind of

Edwin Columbus Neeb, son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Charley Neeb, was born at New Braunfels March 14, 1882. He came to the Cross Plains area with his parents early in life. He was married to Miss Effie Terry June 22, 1923.

The deceased was a Cross Plains business man more than 50 years. He was at times engaged in the produce business here, operator of a soft drinks bottling works, owner of a tin shop, ice plant, and until he retired several years ago, a service station owner at the corner of Main and 8th Streets. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church, and formerly served on the Cross Plains City Council.

Survivors include his widow and one sister, Mrs. W. A. Payne of this city. Pall bearers were: Lindsey Tyson, C. C. Westerman, F. C. Newton, Ted Souder, Dick Wagner and Craig McNeel.

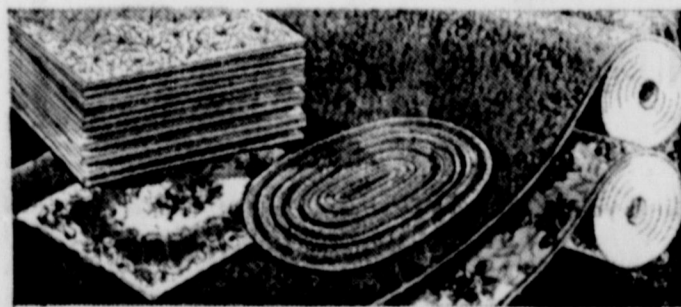

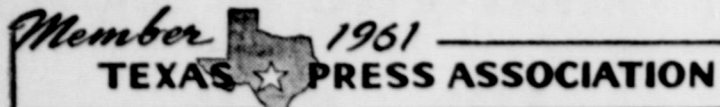

PHILOSOPHER SAYS HE HAS NO PLANS TO MODERNIZE HIS DILAPIDATED DIGGINGS

Editor's Note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm stands up for his principles today, which is hard to do from a sitting position.

"Dear editor: "A town friend of mine I hadn't seen in a long time dropped by to see me out here the other day and he got to looking the place over and finally he said, 'Why don't you modernize things around here a little? This is 1961 we're living in, not '32' "Well, I know what year it is, I've got a calendar, that's one of the splendid things about democracy, one man's calendar is just as good as another's and the man with 500 is no better

than the man with only one, I can't say anything just about laughed apologetically as though maybe I would, although the truth is this place suits me like it is.

"Well, maybe not exactly like it is, but the amount of work it'd take to make it more modern isn't worth the difference.

Moreover, what's modern is something that's hard to put your finger on. At the very moment you buy a new model, branded 1961 and made only two hours ago, engineers are off in a corner somewhere scheming up a newer model to replace the one you just bought.

"Sometimes it seems to me there's no use in getting something new, there'll be something newer out tomorrow.

"For example, take refrigerators. I've always contended that a refrigerator, when it manages to maintain a temperature of around 36 degrees, has reached its full purpose, and anything below that is ridiculous. Refrigerators have been doing this for years, maintaining the right temperature 24 hours a day, but they're still bringing out new models.

"I've got a refrigerator out here on this Johnson grass farm but if I bought a new one, it'd be out of date 12 months from now, and if you're going to be out of date 12 months, you might as well be out of date 15 or 20 years. An ex-convict, is an ex-convict, whether he served one year or 25. My notion is that the time to buy a refrigerator is when you haven't got one or the one you've got plays out.

"Some people say this theory is bad for business, that it'd stand in the way of progress and mass production. This is because they don't have enough confidence in business. Business, as I see it, will always manage to sell the consumer a little more than he can pay for, regardless of what bracket he's in. If I ever get through paying for my 1939 tractor, I'm going to buy me a new one.

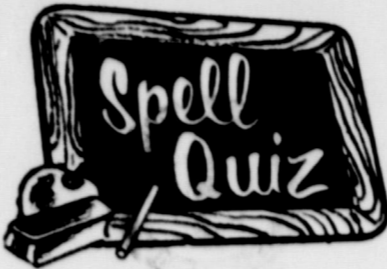
