


DAIRY INDUSTRY BECOMES FORCE IN ECONOMY OF CROSS PLAINS AREA




Voncille Gibbs of Rowden Milks One of Area's Fine Dairy Herds

"Unless cattle in this county are soon tested," said the County Agent, "I fear local farmers and ranchers will be penalized at marketing".

Lynx Cat Trapped By John Swafford

A lynx cat, the first known to have been willed in the Cross Plains area in many years, was slain last week by John Swafford, local licensed trapper. The predatory feline, a member of the bobcat family, was killed on the R. C. (Dick) Ames place north of Pioneer. It had previously killed several goats in that area.

Swafford, who is reputed to be one of the crafties trappers in this section of Texas, went to the Ames place upon invitation of the owner, who was suffering livestock losses. Before the lynx cat was successfully snared, some 20 skunks and opossums were caught in steel traps. An unusually large red fox was also trapped one nigth last week.

The lynx is said to heve weighed 40 pounds and possessed an unusual type pelt.

'Pappy' Cox Owns Ancient Clipping

J. W. "Pappy" Cox, one of Cross Plains oldest citizens, owns a rare clipping. It is the account of a farmer selling all his possessions in the Old South, preparatory to going West, and appeared in several Kentucky papers 111 years ago.

The clipping is reproduced
