Death Claims Early Settler; First White Baby In County

Mrs. L. L. Blackburn, wife of a well-known Baird attorney and one of the first white children born in Callahan County, died Saturday morning.

She suffered a heart attack at her home in Baird and was rushed to the Callahan County Hospital, where she expired Saturday afternoon at four o'clock.

Mrs. Blackburn was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Trent, pioneer settlers. She had lived in Callahan County all her life and in the Baird area since 1892. She was born Sept. 15, 1878.

She received her education at St. Mary's College, Dallas, and taught school at Old Zion Hill south of Putnam and at Baird for several years. She married L. L. Blackburn at Baird on Feb. 15, 1905.

Mrs. Blackburn was a charter member of the Wednesday Club of Baird, honorary member of the Corinne Blackburn Club, honorary president of Callahan County Old Settlers Reunion, longtime member of the Callahan County Library board and a member of the Episcopal Church. At the time of death, she was an officer of Women's Society of Christian Service. She helped organize Callahan County Library and museum, located in the basement of the courthouse.

She was preceded in death by a son, John Lock Blackburn in 1923.

Funeral services were held

from a Baird funeral home Sunday afternoon at 2:30, with Rev. Richard Duffey, Episcopal minister from Coleman officiating. He was assisted by Rev. Bruce Parks, pastor of the First Methodist Church of Baird. Burial was in Ross Cemetery in that city.

Survivors include her husband; a daughter, Mrs. Fabian Bell of Baird; a granddaughter, Mary Ann Bell of Baird; and a sister, Mrs. B. O. Jones of Big Spring.

Brucellosis Tests May Be Given Local Cattle

As a result of meetings held in Cross Plains and Baird last week, testing of Callahan County cattle herds for brucellosis is expected to get underway within the next few months.

The meeting, called by County Agent Glen W. Green and Callahan County Farm Bureau, held in the City Hall in Cross Plains Thursday afternoon was attended by about 50 farmers and ranchers. Dr. James B. Henderson of Coleman spoke to the gathering, pointing out the penalties which could be expected if the program was not begun in Callahan County soon.

No Candidates Offer For 3 Spots On City Council Here

With only two weeks remaining for candidates for the City Council to announce in time to get their names on the ballot, interest appears running low here.

Terms of three councilmen will expire in April. They are C. F. (Pat) McNeel, Jr., C. H. Dawson and Otis Purvis. None has yet indicated whether or not he will be a candidate for reelection.

Texas election statutes require that candidates make official announcement one month prior to the date of voting. With balloting set for April 4, deadline for filing will be March 4.

Cross Plains City Councilmen serve for two years. Three councilmen are elected on odd numbered years, and two councilmen and a mayor on even numbered years.

Hold-over members of the council are Mayor Ted Souder, C. D. Westerman and Garland Gary.

World Day Of Prayer To Be Observed Here

Seventy-fifth anniversary observance of "World Day of Prayer" will be commemorated with a special service at the First Presbyterian Church in Cross Plains Friday afternoon, beginning at 3 o'clock. Ladies of the First Methodist and Presbyterian congregations here have joined together in arrang-

ing the local event in keeping with plans set forth by the sponsoring agency, United Church Women's National Council of the Churches of Christ in the United States.

Worldwide prayer will begin Friday morning on a small Pacific atoll just across the international dateline, as the first rays of sunlight appear. It will be carried on in thousands of communities like Cross Plains, being concluded at sunset by Christians on Saint Lawrence Island, near the Arctic Circle.

Purpose of the day is to unite all Christians in a bond of prayer and Christian fellowship with others around the world and to make an offering for interdenominational projects at home and abroad.

Five leaders have been designated for the service scheduled in the Presbyterian Church here. They are: Mrs. Clay Kinard, Mrs. R. C. Brown, Mrs. Doyle Burchfield, Mrs. Fonia Worthy and Mrs. Howard E. Coburn. Special parts are to be taken by Mrs. Parker Baum and Mrs. James Hickman, as they explain purpose of the 75th annual observance.

Mrs. Burchfield, the general chairman for Cross Plains, and Mrs. Tom Bryant, who cooperated in arranging Friday afternoon's service, stressed that persons of all faiths or of no faith are invited to be present. The event is interdenominational, interracial and international, they said.

No one will be called upon for public tuterance. Much of the prayer will be in the nature of silent petitions.

General theme of the 75th observance is the promotion of peace and Christian fellowship.

\$729.50 Paid For Pioneer Building

Workmen began razing the old Pioneer school building Monday morning.

The structure was sold Saturday night by citizens of the community to E. H. and Ray Hollis, owners of a demolition company. The building brought \$729.50 and was sold through sealed bids. There were 10 bidders.

Money from sale of the building will go to Pioneer Cemetery Association to be used on maintenance and permanent improvements. The Review was told.

Sale of the building was made to the highest bidder through sealed offers. All proposals to purchase were opened at a regular monthly meeting of the Pioneer Community Club.

One other building on the former Pioneer school campus houses the club room of the community organization. It is the structure which was formerly used for vocational agriculture, when the Pioneer school was in operation.

Putnam School's Pilot Program Viewed By State's Top Educators

A new idea in education, being pioneered by 18 specially named Texas small schools was studied and discussed by prominent educators and interested patrons at a meeting in the Putnam school building Monday night.

The Putnam institution, headed by Superintendent R. W. Reynolds, was one of the small schools chosen to implement the idea in this state. The innovation is to cover a five-year period and participating schools have just recently completed the first semester under the program. Monday night's gathering was to hear reports, problems and achievements during the initial phase.

Fifty people, including departmental heads from the Texas Education Agency, college professors from T. C. U. and North Texas State College, superintendents, trustees and faculty members from participating schools, two County Superintendents, patrons and interested individuals were in attendance. The meeting was opened with a buffet supper at 6:30 in the school study hall, served by Mrs. F. P. Shackelford and Mrs. Roma McIntyre of the host city.

The Putnam school which is serving as a "pilot" institution under the new program, was credited by Charley Biters of the Texas Education

Agency with having made valuable contributions during the first semester of experimentation.

Among the new ideas being tested in the "pilot" program are these: multiple classes, supervised correspondence courses from colleges and universities offering work on the high school level, cooperative service program which involves teacher sharing, wider use of educational aides, flexible schedules and greater utilization of audio-visual materials.

Review writers attended the Monday night meeting and have scheduled a detailed feature on the new educational process for publication in next week's issue.

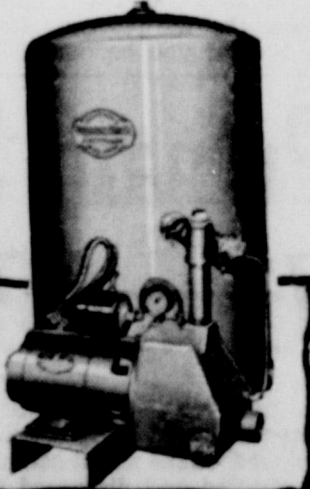

Cross Plains Junior basket- ball teams will play their last games of the current season here Thursday night, when Santa Anna squads invade the local gymnasium.

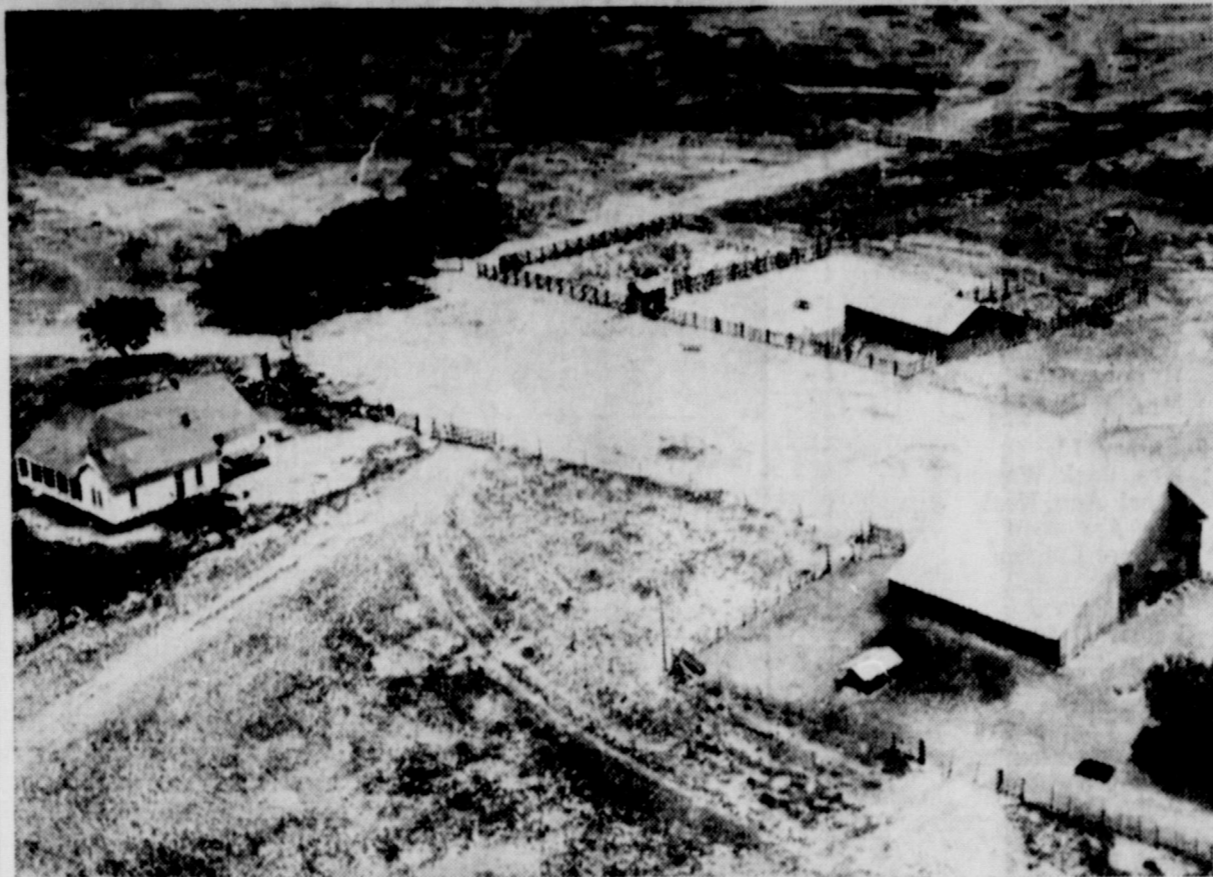

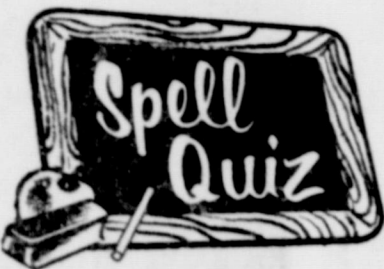
