## Only Half County's Cars Now Licensed

Although deadline for displaying 1961 license tags on automobiles is but eight days away only one-half the passenger cars of Callahan County are presently registered. This was revealed in a statement from Tax Assessor-Collector Albert Lovell Tuesday morning.

Approximately 3,000 passenger cars are licensed in this county each year. To Tuesday morning 1,543 sets of new plates had been issued.

In Cross Plains, A. J. (Ted) McCuin had sold 402 and Lovell's office in Baird, which serves the remainder of the county, had dispensed 1,141.

## Building Jobs Underway In Area Total \$119,600

An estimated \$119,600.00 worth of construction is underway in the Cross Plains area. Most of the total involves new homes and improvements of old ones.

Largest commercial venture underway here at present is a new motel, being built on Highway 36 east of town by C. B. Hester. He moved his residence from Pioneer to the site last week. It is to be arranged to serve as an office and living quarters for the motel management.

The N. M. Dillard home, just across the street from the new motel is currently nearing completion. The dwelling will be

one of Cross Plains' finest and is expected to be ready for occupancy within two weeks.

Mr. and Mrs. Tommie Harris, who reside in the Rowden Community, are completely remodeling their home. All inside partitions have been removed to accommodate a new and enlarged floor plan. Exterior walls are to be brick veneered.

Foundation was being run yesterday for a new home being built by Mr. and Mrs. Hadden Payne. It is to be located just east of their present place on their land nine miles west of Cross Plains. The dwelling will have three bedrooms and incorporate many innovations.

Slightly out of the Cross Plains area, but being handled by local contractors, is a home improvement project in the city of Putnam. It is at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. Bud Fleming. A spacious storage room is being added and the present kitchen enlarged and made more commodious.

In the process of completion is a comfortable two bedroom, living room and den home for Mr. and Mrs. Charles Howard Edgington in the Webb Store area. Construction there is virtually finished.

Recently occupied and now receiving finishing touches is the home of Mr. and Mrs. Lee-man Underwood, just outside the city limits on the old Pioneer highway. The dwelling is entirely new.

A major building project is underway in the north part of town here, where three new residences are presently being built by Horace L. King and Nathan Morris. When these three are finished, three more will be started. The houses are three bedroom size and are to offer many of the building trade's newest ideas.

The former W. A. Williams home, recently purchased by Tom Culvahouse of Odessa, is being redecorated both inside and out and is being modernized.

The place on North Main St., recently bought by Vernon Falkner, is being improved. The house is being painted and concrete work added.

One other major improvement project is expected to be started on North Main Street soon, however, plans had not been perfected yesterday.

Two holidays will be added to a regular week end at Cross Plains schools, giving local students and faculty members a four day recess at Easter.

Friday, March 31, will be a holiday, as also will the following Monday, April 3.

## City Buys 126,000 Gallon Water Tank

In a regular meeting of Cross Plains City Council Tuesday night a bid of \$5,779.34 was accepted for the municipality's purchase of a 126,000-gallon galvanized, bolted steel water tank to be assembled at the city's settling plant in the east part of town.

Seller of the reservoir, Miller Tank Company of Abilene, is expected to have the facility ready for use within five weeks.

The tank will be 24 feet, one and one-half inches high and 29 feet, 10 and 5/8 inches in diameter. Ten gauge steel will be used throughout the tank with the exception of decking, which is to be 12 gauge.

Mayor Ted Souder said the council voted the purchase to be able to store greater reserves and alleviate many summer time water shortages. Too, he pointed out the additional stored water could be invaluable in the event of a major fire.

The city will pay cash for the tank.

John Purvis, previously announced candidate for school trustee, stated Tuesday night he was withdrawing from the race.

Ballots for the election had already been printed and have been in use for absentee voting at the County Clerk's office in Baird. Statutes require ballots be available 20 days prior to election time for balloting of voters who will be away from their places of residence on election day.

## PHILOSOPHER CORNERS CITY MAN ON NEW PLAN TO SAVE CITIES FROM DECAY

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou asks a question this week that's had to answer.

Dear editor:  
A friend of mine who went to grammar school with me and now lives in Abilene came by this Johnson grass farm out here the other day and after parking his car carefully to avoid a stack of wire and posts I've been meaning to move since I left them there three or four years ago, got to kidding me about the farm situation.

"Well," he asked, after I'd showed him which side of the front step to step on without getting hit with the other end, "your government checks coming through on time every month? What's the support price now on Johnson grass? How much extra are you getting this year to retire some more land? How do you tell your retired land from your cultivated land? Just thought I'd stop by and see where us city folks' tax money is going."

I'm not much at talking, but I had been reading a newspaper earlier in the day so I asked him:

"By the way, how much is Abilene going to get out of the Administration's urban renewal program?"

"How's that?" he asked.  
"Don't you keep up with the news?" I asked. "I see by the paper today that there's a drive on to save the cities. It's a fact. We got marginal cities the same as marginal farms. Looks like cities have been planted too thick, the same as crops. Here, read this."

I showed him the paper, which said President Kennedy has sent Congress a \$3,250,000,000 (that's three and a quarter billion) bill to "save the cities," in the form of outright grants plus loans to "reinforce the big cities in their desperate struggle against blight and decay". Under the program, a city man could get a 40-year mortgage with no down payment to build a house, in order to "upgrade decaying neighborhoods".

"What's the matter with you city folks?" I asked. "Can't you run your towns without help from Washington?"

"I don't think you have a true appreciation of what this particular piece of legislation is designed for," he said, or words to that effect, adding that he had to be going, it was getting late, and he sure en-

joyed visiting with me.  
I'm not saying the cities don't need this money. All I'm saying is that if I'm supposed to get a government check every month, what happened to it?
