Active Week Faces Cross Plains Voters

It's voting time again. Saturday and Tuesday will be election days in Cross Plains. Voters of the school district will trek to the polls in the City Hall here Saturday to choose two trustees to serve for three year tenures. Then Tuesday, citizens of the city will ballot on three aldermen to serve during the next biennial.

Six candidates are pitted in the school trustee race. Listed in order of appearance of names

on the ballot, they are: Ben Atwood, Chester Glover, Jimmielee Payne, R. E. (Hick) Edgington, Dr. Carl J. Sohns and Jimmy McCowen. Atwood and Glover are seeking re-election, whereas the other four are bidding for first terms.

One other name will appear on the school trustee ballot. It is that of John T. Purvis, who announced and then withdrew after ballots had been printed and delivered.

In the City Council race, there are also six candidates seeking three places. They are C. H. Dawson, Otis Purvis, J. A. Burton, L. F. Foster, James B. Thomas and Freddy Tatom. Dawson and Purvis are present members of the Council, Foster is a former member, and Burton, Thomas and Tatom are asking initial terms.

Simultaneous with the city election, citizens of Cross Plains Voting Precinct Number 6 will cast their preferences for a successor to Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson in the United States Senate. 71 candidates are listed on the ballot, a record high for the number aspiring to a single office at a Texas election.

Two high candidates will meet in a run-off primary four weeks later.

Charge Trucker In Death Of Child, 7

Charges of negligent homicide were filed in Callahan County court Thursday against George Henry Brown, 49, Dallas truck driver, in connection with the traffic accident in which a seven-year-old Admiral boy was killed the day before.

The child, Charles Leslie Walker, was killed instantly and his mother and sister injured. The accident occurred one mile east of Baird on Highway 80.

New Tank To Double City's Water Storage

Above ground water storage will be doubled in Cross Plains with installation of a new 126,000 gallon reservoir, recently purchased by the City Council here.

Approximately 60,000 can be contained in each of two present tanks—the standpipe back of Bishop Chevrolet Company and the settling basin on East 9th Street.

The new reservoir, sold by Miller Tank Company in Abilene, will be ready for use here about May 1. The city will pay \$5,779.34 cash for the facility.

With a total of 246,000 gallons of above-ground storage, which completion of the new tank will give, the local water system will be able to store approximately two days use during the peak consumption periods of mid-Summer.

The settling basin on 9th Street is maintained full—at an eight foot level in silica settling. Too, Ted Souder points out, keeps a reserve in the event of a major fire.

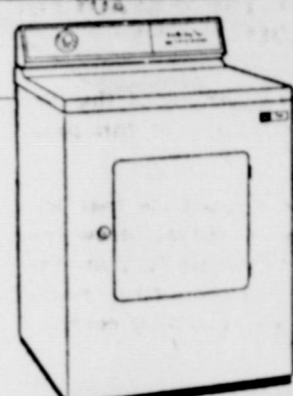

Stick Horse Made By Putnam Boy 'Gallops' Across Five Continents

Was there ever a stick horse as widely-traveled as this one? Gold Dust, a bright-eyed and bushy-tailed has returned to Putnam after criss-crossing five continents in eight months. He didn't even work up a sweat.

The pony started his journey last summer — July 26 to be exact — to commemorate the hundredth anniversary of Pony Express.

The two-foot-long wooden animal is the creation of Roddy Reynolds, 12, and his father, Putnam School Supt. R. W. Reynolds.

Gold Dust was fashioned from a piece of white pine and then staked out at a roadside stop in New Mexico while the family was on a vacation trip.

A note attached to Gold Dust asked travelers to carry him on to other points, notifying Roddy by mail of each stop.

In best Pony Express tradition, Gold Dust was soon on his way.

By Sept. 30 the pony had visited Phoenix, Dallas, Los Angeles and was on his way by jet airliner to Chicago. The little stick horse was really moving—he would have been the envy of those 75 ponies that needed 10 1/2 days to gallop from St. Joseph, Mo., to Sacramento, Cal., for the Pony Express' inaugural run in April 1860.

Then a four month silence put the Reynolds family out of touch with Gold Dust.

Finally, late in January, Roddy received a card from Ireland, bearing only the cryptic question, "What! No wagon train?"

The Irish note opened the floodgates to mail from the far corners of the world.

A map on the wall of the Reynolds' living room pinpoints with thumb tacks Gold Dust's world travels. A bulging scrapbook contains the real prize of the pony's adventures: A letter from Gold Dust to his youthful owner.

The note was written by an airport employee at San Juan, Puerto Rico. It tells of Gold Dust's troubles with customs officials, who required a second "vaccination" because the pony failed to carry a certificate in his saddle bag.

The U. S. Public Health Service at the airport provided the document.

Gold Dust also tells Roddy in the letter of two beautiful señoritas who patted him and of a cute, brown-eyed filly he fell for at a Puerto Rico race track.

The pony visited two Puerto Rican schools and even appeared on television.

Next Gold Dust visited Spain. Then, a few days, the pony came home by parcel post.

KLM Royal Dutch Airways officials at Johannesburg, South Africa, apparently thought Gold Dust either was lost or should get out of Africa. They sent the pony to KLM's Houston lost-and-found bureau. From there the stick horse made its way to Putnam.

While the Reynolds were glad to see Gold Dust again, they were disappointed his trip had been cut short.

"We had hoped that he would go round the world visiting in a majority of the countries. We plan to start him on another run soon," Reynolds said.

Even so, Gold Dust did pretty well. He visited Arabia, the Virgin Islands, Haiti and Brazzaville, just to name a few. The pony's wanderings included all the continents of the world except Australia. His travels were aided by 10 airlines that gave him free passage.

The pony, which came home with his nose broken, was covered with dozens of written and carved autographs. But Gold Dust is ready to ride again.

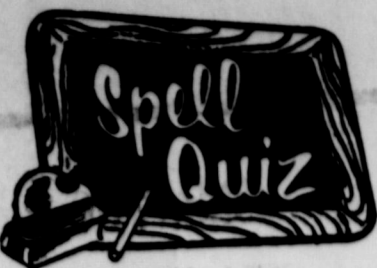
