Child Suffocated In Grain Elevator

Funeral service for Robert Harold Odom, 9-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Odom, who was suffocated at the family's ranch home near Cottonwood, S. D., shortly before noon Saturday, was held from the Cross Plains Church of Christ Tuesday afternoon at three o'clock. Minister Bill Nicks officiated.

Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home.

The accident is said to have occurred when the child fell from a walkway above a granary into a cone-shaped hole, created by the extraction of wheat which was being augured to trucks parked outside. An avalanche of grain covered the child's body and he was dead upon recovery.

The body was brought overland to Cross Plains arriving here at noon Monday.

The child was born at Philip, S. D., April 14, 1952. His parents are well-known in the Cross Plains area, both having been reared in this locality, the father near Cross Plains, and the mother at Burkett. In addition to the parents, survivors include a sister, Miss Sandra Odom, first-year student at Abilene Christian College, and two grandmothers, Mrs. Bertha Weiler of Cross Plains and Mrs. Monnie Garrett of Burkett.

Last Month Driest April In History

The month just passed has been written into weather books as the driest April in Cross Plains within memory of living men. Only 67 of an inch of moisture was recorded here.

March yielded only 46 of an inch, making the two-month total only 1.13.

Without heavier precipitations which fell in January and February this area would again be experiencing drought conditions, however, the January total was far above average, 5.60 inches falling here. 1.53 was recorded in February.

Total for the first four months of 1961 was 8.26 inches.

Cottonwood Will Observe It's Greatest Day Of Year Sunday

Sunday will be a big day in Cottonwood.

It's homecoming time for former citizens of the community and date of the annual Memorial Day observance, to honor illustrious dead buried in the hallowed grounds of Cottonwood Cemetery.

Miss Hazel I. Respass, who has served as secretary of the committee charged with responsibility of cemetery maintenance since its organization in 1943, said yesterday that scores of former citizens will return "home" for the annual event.

From the state capitol this week came word from Justice Meade F. Griffin of the Texas Supreme Court, saying that a number of people from Austin would attend.

Sunday's program will be opened at 10 a.m. with Rev. Dale Cain, Baptist pastor, bringing the devotional. He will be followed by Rev. Ray Rochelle, Methodist pastor at Cottonwood who will deliver the Memorial Day sermon.

The congregation will repair from the Baptist Church to the Community Center at noon, where basket luncheon will be spread.

Members of the program committee are: Mrs. Norman Coffey, Mrs. Oral Strahan and Mrs. Sub Peavy. John Purvis is president of the hosting organization.

Afternoon activities will be resumed shortly before two o'clock, again at the Baptist Church. Judge Griffin is expected to speak at this time, paying tribute to the pioneer families in the Cottonwood area. Plans will also be made at the afternoon session for cemetery maintenance and improvement during the ensuing year.

The Cottonwood Cemetery includes the graves of more than 1,000 persons. It is one of the county's oldest, the initial grave said to have been opened there in the early 1870's.

Need Only 3 Easements To Begin Building Dams

Directors of Turkey Creek Conservation District report that only three easements are needed before construction can begin on the flood prevention dams on Turkey Creek. Efforts are being made to clear these easements by May 15.

Turkey Creek flood prevention plan was developed in 1958 and construction phase of the program is long overdue, proponents say. The problem of clearing easements is said to have caused the delay.

Floods on Turkey Creek cause severe damage. Major floods have occurred periodically, the latest being in October 1957. During the 20 year period 1923-1942, there were 29 major and 50 minor floods, 56 per cent of the floods occurring in Spring, causing damage to growing crops and delaying plantings until after optimum planting planting dates. Largest storm in the flood series occurred October 12-14, 1930. This flood covered about 4,477 acres of the flood plain. The city of Cross Plains is partially located in the flood plain of Turkey Creek. In October 1957, seven city blocks were inundated. Estimated direct flood-water damage for the October 1957 flood was \$44,657.

It is because of this flood damage that the Turkey Creek Conservation District was or-

ganized and requested that a flood prevention plan be developed for the Turkey Creek watershed. The plan calls for the construction of 12 floodwater retarding structures. These 12 structures will temporarily detain the runoff from 50.84 square miles of drainage area, from a storm that can be expected to occur on an average of once in 25 years.

When the project is completely installed, it is expected to produce \$1.25 for each dollar of cost. Other substantial values will accrue from the project, such as water supplies, some recharge of underground streams, increased opportunity for recreation, improved wildlife benefits and a sense of security, say conservation men. The Turkey Creek Flood Prevention project is a local project. The federal government is involved only to the extent that it constructs the dams. They are then turned over to the local people to operate and maintain. The easements are made to the local people.

"Many communities in Texas are on the waiting list for such a project and are begging for construction. Why can't we get Turkey Creek flood prevention project in the construction stage? The assistance of everyone in this community is needed," say directors of the local organization.

Odie Smedley Fatally Hurt In Auto Accident

J. Odie Smedley, 74, of Baird, former Rowden stockman, was fatally injured Sunday night in a two-car accident on a rain-swept bridge near Sulphur, Oklahoma.

The mishap occurred shortly after 8 p.m. and Mr. Smedley died about two hours later in a Sulphur hospital.

The deceased man's brother and sister-in-law were also injured and are now patients in Arbuckle Hospital in Sulphur. They are Jimmy Smedley, who was driving the ill-fated vehicle, and his wife, who reside in Baird.

Following a short distance behind were a brother, three sisters and several kinsmen of the Smedleys, traveling in two other cars. They arrived on the scene almost immediately. All were returning from the funeral of Mrs. Lonnie Smedley at Davenport, Okla. They extracted Mrs. Smedley from the wreckage, both men having been thrown free, administered first aid until ambulances arrived to carry the three to the Sulphur hospital.

Occupants of the other two cars were: Mr. and Mrs. Barney Gibbs and R. L. Smedley of Baird, Mr. and Mrs. Warren Price of Rowden and M. B. Gibbs of Abilene.

Funeral for Odie Smedley was held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 from a Baird funeral home with Rev. C. R. Myrick

of Cottonwood officiating. Burial was in Admiral Cemetery.

Pallbearers were: Voncille Gibbs, John Adair, Blain Odom, Sterling Odom, Raymond Gibbs and W. C. Hagle.

Mr. Smedley was born in Arkansas Nov. 11, 1887. He had been a resident of Callahan County since nine years of age. His wife, the former Virginia Holley, died in 1958, and he moved shortly thereafter from the home where they had lived in Rowden to Baird. He was an ex-serviceman, having served with American Expeditionary Forces in Europe during World War I.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. J. R. Crawford, of Abilene, Mrs. Bryan D. Brown of Baird; one son, Clarence, of Abilene; three sisters, Mrs. Barney Gibbs of Baird, Mrs. Lola Russell of Balmoreha, and Mrs. Hettie Price of Rowden; five brothers, Lonnie of Davenport, Okla., Lester of Big Spring, and Jimmy, Wylie and Robert Lee, all of Baird; and seven grandchildren.

Mrs. Lonnie Smedley, from whose funeral the Callahan Countians were returning, was also a former resident of the Rowden community. She and her husband moved from here in 1917. She died in an Oklahoma City hospital of a heart attack, following a short illness.

She is survived by her husband, two sons and one daughter.

'Old West' Lives Again As Posse Rodeo Opens

Re-enactment of the Old West will be evidenced this week end as Callahan County Sheriff Posse's annual rodeo is unfolded before an expected 10,000 fans.

The rodeo week end will begin with an elaborate parade down Market Street in Baird Thursday afternoon at five o'clock. "There'll be more horseflesh in the county seat that afternoon than ever before in history," said Homer (Blondy) McIntosh, posse president, yesterday.

Rodeo performance will be staged Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, all shows beginning at 8 o'clock. Bobby Estes' bucking stock will be pitted against America's top cowboys. The Callahan show is an RCA-approved event, and cowpokes in the thick of competition for national honors, have already paid entrance fees.

Cross Plains High School band

will participate in the opening parade and remain in Baird to play for the first night's show.

Although the rodeo program offers a full calendar of events including bareback and saddle bronc riding, bull riding, calf roping, bull dogging, a number of specialty and novelty acts, one of the most popular events is expected to be a calf scramble, carded nightly. Fifteen calves will be given youngsters, who are able to catch and drag them across a finish line. There will be five winners each night.

Three Cross Plains FFA boys will compete in the scramble. They are Edde Elliott, James Goble and Eddy Don Edmondson.

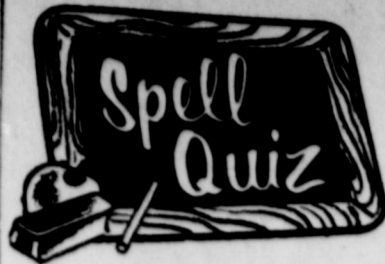
Bobby Golson took top honors in bareback bronc riding at the week end rodeo in Mullin.

PHILOSOPHER SAYS NOBODY WILL EVER ACCUSE FARMERS WITH PRICE-FIXING

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou, discusses the advantages of farming this week, at least we think that's what he's doing. Dear editor:

Every once in a while somebody asks me why I keep on farming if it's as hard as I let on and the chances of breaking even are as slim as I claim, but that's because they don't understand all of the advantages.

It's true farming out in the open under the uncertainties of the weather is a hazardous undertaking, about like trying to run a drygoods store without a roof or bank without a vault, and it's true that insects are as smart as men and while man is staying up all night in a laboratory developing an insecticide that's bound to work, it turns out the insects stayed up the night before developing an immunity to it. As I've found out long ago, every time man comes out with a new insecticide, the insects come out with a new insect.

Moreover, a lot of people distrust a farmer. If he gets ahead, he's responsible for the high cost of living; if he fails, he's

incompetent. I could go on, but by time you're probably wondering what are the advantages of farming?

Well, I won't have room week to list all the advantages not to mention time too to them up, or the imagination to manufacture them, but is one advantage that occurs to me the other day and been basking in it ever since. It's this: the farmers never been filed on by the States government for fixing.

You're not going to catch the wrath of Attorney General Bobby Kennedy by tinging together and deciding much we ought to charge what we produce. We've smarted all the lawyers government, and in all the history of agriculture since first found out if you seed in the ground it'd grow to the present day when we produce more than the can handle, no farmer has been guilty of deciding the price of what he has produced should be. We have town and ask somebody of times we don't get enough, but we stay out of

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
