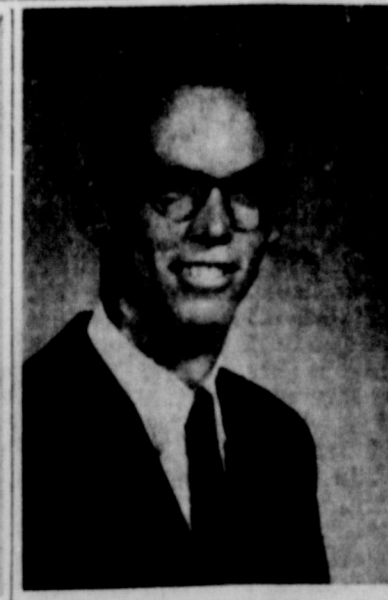

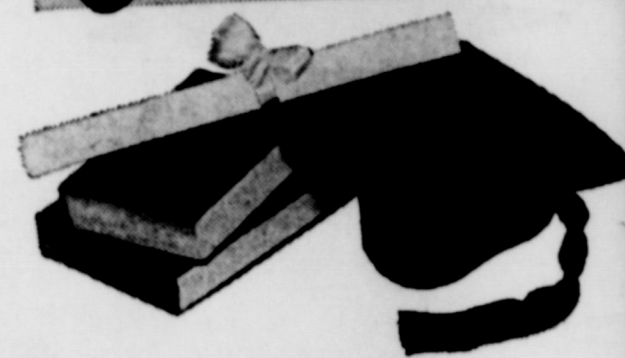

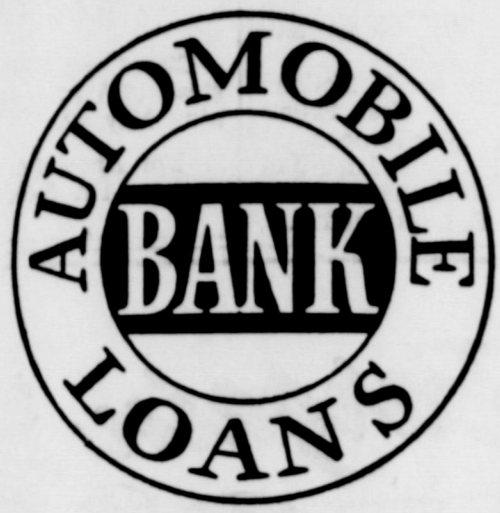

In fact, I glanced down at my feet, or rather out as I had them propped up at the time, and I calculated a careful worker ought to get three or four pairs out of one steer hide, and by that time my figures had run off the margin and into a news article and to get my mind off the lack of parity in steer hides and shoes I read it.
