They are brothers of the late J. D. Windham, Jr., whose grave in the Tecumseh Cemetery was reportedly descrated on the day of his recent burial.

Also involved in the incident here were Laura Levadelle and Wayne Williams, local residents. They were absolved of blame in connection with the peace disturbance.

Mrs. Williams, 48, and Glenn Moody, 43, also of Cross Plains, are charged in Callahan County Court with descration of the fresh grave of J. D. Windham, 15, at Tecumseh June 22.

Friday, County Judge Lester Farmer postponed a jury trial for Moody and Mrs. Williams from July 19 to Aug 3.

Hal, Tommy, Robert, and Billy Ray Windham pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace and were each assessed fines and court costs of \$53.80. Mrs. Williams and Wayne Williams were freed on bond on the disturbing the peace charge.

Witnesses report the four Windham brothers accosted Mrs. Williams and her husband, perhaps desiring to talk to them, and that Mrs. Williams fired a shot into the air.

# Work Doesn't Stop At Schools **As Classes Close For Summer**

Have you ever wondered what goes on at a public school plant during Summer months when classes are not in session?

A Review writer took a long look at the situation one day last week and came up with the following answer. Two maintenannce men -E. H. Oliver and I. V. Tenni-

son - have been going in a gallop since school closed May 22, getting buildings and equipment ready for hard use by 540 students and 42 school employees when a new term begins Aug 28.

They have reputtied and painted 173 windows, inspected and repaired 704 desks and tables, refinished all foors in the high school and ward school buildings, spread 1,200 pounds of fertilizer on lawns and the football field, and kept mowed. Four days are required to mow the grass which is scattered over nearly two acres.

Including buses, nearly a million dollars worth of property is to be maintained.

O. B. Switzer has been busy doing the same things to the school district's rolling stock that Oliver and Tennison have to buildings. Ten buses have been meticulously inspected and repaired. Those in need of re-upholstering are now receiving it. Work is being done in the school shop with equipment given the district

from military surpluses. Bodies from three of the school's older buses will be installed on new chassis in time for use as the the new term begins.

Although there has been no raise in the school tax rate here since 1949-an exception to the trend throughout Texas-the Cross Plains district has for eight years consistently operated without a deflict. Since 1952 a \$13,000 delinquincy has been erased and sinking fund built to \$36.-000. This is invested in interest-bearing securities as a financial reserve. School properties are now valued at more than four times the district's bonded indebtedness of \$216,-254.88. Few school's in this section of Texas enjoy such a solvent position.

Overseeing maintenance operations and aiding his principals in outlining the curricular program for the ensuing year is Paul Whitton, superintendent of local schools. In addition he has been devoting time to assisting the equalization board and school tax assessor-collector equating properties for assessment.

Although no classes have been heard on the local campus during the past two months, the work has not stopped. Several people have been uncommonly busy.
