## Cross Plains Will Aid Storm Victims

Cross Plains will extend the hand of compassion to flood sufferers in the Texas Coastal area.

The Lions Club here has stationed a large van on Main Street and is now leading a community-wide effort in the collection of furniture, foods, clothing and household items to be distributed to families whose homes were ravaged by Hurricane Carla.

"We invite churches, other civic organizations and our people as a whole to get behind this humanitarian undertaking," said Dan Johnston, who is heading the campaign here, "lets respond enthusiastically."

It is hoped that between 20,000 and 30,000 pounds of good, useable items will be collected in Cross Plains.

"If one truck is not enough, others will be ready," Johnston said.

Word reaching Cross Plains last night from the stricken area was that many families lost everything they possessed. Immediate help was reported urgently needed.

Persons who have items to contribute and no way of getting them to the truck, may call any of the following Lions Club members and a vehicle will be sent to haul them to the collection point: Dan Johnston, RA 5-2181; Don Watkins, RA 5-2251; Byron Richardson, RA 5-3501; Bob Latson, RA 5-4314, or Dr. M. E. Roth, RA 5-3341.

"It is genuinely hoped that every person in Cross Plains will have at least a small part in this effort," Richardson said.

Tuesday night; "those who prefer may contribute cash and purchases will be made locally of items particularly needed in the stricken area."

Money may be handed to any member of the Lions Club or left at the Citizens State Bank, earmarked for this undertaking, said members of the civic club.

Plans are to keep the truck on Main Street night and day until loaded and ready to go. A committee of Lions will then deliver it to one of the cities hardest hit by Hurricane Carla.

Large signs will be emblazoned on the van, offering easy identification and explaining the nature of the project in which it is being used.

"There's no better way to express our thanks for having been spared such a catastrophe than to extend the hand of charity to those who are now in want because of it," Johnston concluded.

### LATE RAINS BENEFIT PEANUT PROSPECTS

## Give One Time To U. F.

(AN EDITORIAL)

Cross Plains has finally elected to take a methodic approach to the handling of charities. For years the community has done a wonderful job of supporting some and completely ignoring others.

It has been a case of only "the squeaking wheel getting the grease."

There have been so many different drives that hardly a month passed that some type of financial campaign was not being waged. The public was becoming weary of constant solicitation.

Now all charities and beneficent activities are to be financed in one annual campaign. Money will be raised in a single canvass each year and then apportioned to various agencies by a budget committee, representing six local civic and fraternal organizations. The parent charity will be known as the United Fund, and its annual financial campaign will be held in October, timed with national publicity.

Donors will be asked to give liberally, about the same amount as was formerly pledged to: Red Cross, Cancer Crusade, Heart Fund, March of Dimes, Boy and Girl Scouts, Local Relief, Goodfellows Christmas Cheer and other activities. After contributing one time to the United Fund, givers will be asked to refer all future solicitors to the UF budget committee.

It must be expected that there will be imperfections at first, however, a number of dedicated people have been laboring diligently to avoid as many pitfalls as possible. The United Fund idea is a good one. It has been successfully employed in hundreds of other communities the size of Cross Plains and is the best answer yet devised. Give it your support, financial and otherwise.

## Core Drills Begin On Retention Dams

Core drilling began Monday on the first of several retention dams to be built on the watershed of Turkey Creek.

Information obtained from core holes will be used to develop specifications for construction.

Initial drilling Monday was being done on site number two, which is on the Floyd O'Dell and George Coats places, 10 miles northwest of Cross Plains. The lake there will cover 21 acres, impounding 106 acre feet of water. Allocated to be spent by the federal government on this project has been \$89,592.

Order of coring on other sites on Turkey Creek retention structures is reported as follows: 3, 8, 9, 10, 12, 4, 5, 6 and 7.

Construction of 10 floodwater retaining dams is planned to get underway in February and be completed before the Summer of 1962. Mark Adair, chairman of the board of supervisors for Turkey Creek Conservation District, has been told.

The remaining two sites, 1 and 2, are scheduled for coring in March next year, and actual construction can not be contracted before 1963.

## State Approves Callahan Bonds

Callahan County now can begin its projected \$50,000 in courthouse and county jail improvements, since Atty. Gen. Will Wilson has approved its bond issue as to legality.

Of the \$50,000 courthouse improvements will take \$35,000 with the other \$15,000 for improvements to the county jail. Both are at Baird.

The bonds will bear 3.25 per cent interest and be paid back at the rate of \$3,000 in 1962, \$4,000 in 1963 and 1964, \$5,000 in 1965 through 1968, \$6,000 in 1969 and 1970, and \$7,000 in 1971.

The total valuation of the county for tax purposes was listed as \$12,033,592.
