Touring Experts Laud Local Pecan Orchards

Seventy pecan growers from six counties toured the better orchards of Southern Eastland County Friday.

Consensus of growers was that yields this fall will be the best in 20 years. Price of better grade soft-shells is expected to range between 35 and 45 cents per pound.

High praise was paid several orchards in the Pioneer locality. That of Doss Alexander and C. T. Barton were particularly commended by the tourers.

John Purvis, Callahan County's largest pecan producer, classed them as good as will be found anywhere.

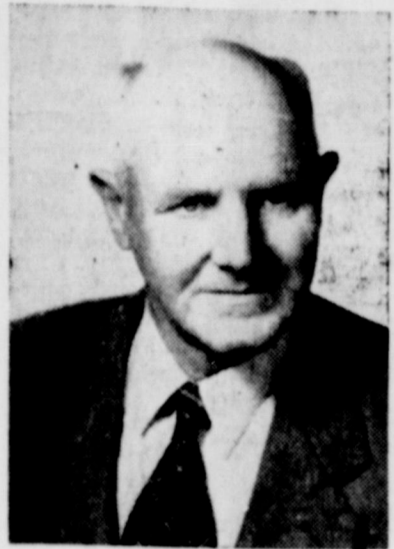
Several of the orchards visited Friday will average better than 100 pounds per tree. With approximately 10 trees per acre, gross yield per acre is expected to run as high as \$350 to \$400.

Alexander has a total of 45 acres in pecans. He is one of the veteran growers of this area, having been in the business continuously since 1934. His trees were sprayed four times this year.

Although his orchard is in Callahan County, which was not included in the territory visited by the trippers Friday, Purvis was frequently quizzed about prospects and methods employed on his place. He has over 500 trees, which Alexander said are excellent.

Purvis planted native trees in 1931 and budded soft shell varieties.

Most orchards visited Friday featured Burkett, Mahan, Western Shley and Texas Prolific varieties. The Burkett, which originated in Callahan County,

was definitely the favorite of most orchardmen.

"You just can't beat it," said Wes Strackbein of Burkett, one of the group making the trip.

First stop Friday morning was at the Daniels orchard near the old school campus in Pioneer. It is in the process of being improved and will one day be one of the finer ones in this section, opined Barton.

Other stops were made at the Munson place, the old Billy Hughes farm, the C. E. Smith orchard, and several others in the proximity of Rising Star.

County Agent A. M. Cooper of Eastland County organized Friday's tour and was hosting representatives of Texas Extension Service, Soil Conservation personnel and visiting agronomists.

Mrs. Susie Peavy, 89, a resident of Cottonwood 65 years, died early Friday night in an Abilene rest home.

Mrs. Peavy was born April 27, 1872, in Clay County, Ala. She grew up there and moved to Cottonwood at the age of 24. She married W. O. Peavy there April 8, 1906. He was a former justice of the peace and farmer. He died in 1942.

Mrs. Peavy continued to make her home in Cottonwood until four years ago when she moved to Abilene to reside with a son, Luther Johnson, 1841 S. 8th.

Funeral was held at 2 p.m. Sunday from the Cottonwood Church of Christ. Ministers Lonnie C. Cox of Abilene and Bill Nicks of Cross Plains officiated. Burial was in Cottonwood. Mrs. Smith and Mrs. Baum have called a meeting of nominees on their group to meet at Odom's Night and Day Restaurant at 9 a. m., Oct. 10.

Rev. Harold G. Wise, president of the newly-organized set-up in Cross Plains, J. C. (Doc) Claborn and Baum, in addition to their other duties during the financial drive, will prepare and issue membership cards.

"The whole purpose of the United Fund," Baum said last night, "is to approach our problem of charities in a more businesslike manner, to conduct one drive—sanction no others—and thereby, relieve citizens of continual solicitation."

Placards are to be left at all business establishments and individual cards given personal donors, evidencing that all their charities for the year have been consolidated in one gift to the United Fund.

"We want donors to give liberally, feeling that they will not be called upon again during the year," Baum said, "if they are again solicited we hope they will refer solicitors to our budget committee."

All salaried people are being asked to give a minimum of one day's pay. Business and professional men and women are being asked to contribute amounts equal to their total givings for charity during the past 12 months.

"It will take this kind of support to put the United Fund over in the Cross Plains area," commented the Rev. Mr. Wise.

Act Of Heroism Brings Award To Truck Driver

J. Floyd Hollingshead, Cross Plains man and driver of a freight line truck for an Abilene concern, was presented a "Knight of the Road" award here Monday night at the regular bi-weekly meeting of the Lions Club.

Hollingshead is credited with having been responsible for preventing thousands of dollars worth of property damage and possible personal injuries, by having warned Mr. and Mrs. Weldon Gary of Rowden last April 18, that a fire had broken out in their store building at Rowden. He noticed the blaze while driving along State Highway 36.

The award to Hollingshead was made Monday by Major Wilson E. Speir of Midland, regional Commander of Texas Department of Public Safety, in behalf of Hobbs Trailer Company who regularly brings to public

attention feats of alertness and heroism on roads and highways. Jim Barber of Fort Worth, representative of the trailer company, was present at the meeting.

Callahan Lagging In Savings Bond Sales

Savings bond sales in Callahan County for the first eight months of this year totaled \$119,682, which represents 57 per cent of the goal of \$210,000 assigned for the calendar year of 1961.

August sales in this county amounted to \$7,612.

"Accelerated buying will be necessary in the last quarter of the year if Callahan County does not fall short for the year," said Howard Farmer, County chairman for the sales effort. Texas as a whole has achieved 65 per cent of the 1961 quota, whereas Callahan County lags behind the state average by eight per cent.

to the opening tally. It was the first Wildcat victory over the Buffs in more than a decade. While revenge was sweet for the visitors, Cross Plains had to swallow its fourth straight defeat of the 1961 grid campaign. Rising Star's record is 2-2.

The Bisons wasted no time in posting their lone tally of the night. Right halfback L. V. Falkner scampered 34 yards on the second play from scrimmage for the touchdown. Quarterback Doug Dallas kicked the oval through the uprights for the extra point and completed Cross Plains' only score.

The Wildcats experienced line went to work ripping huge holes in the Buffs' defensive formation for the fast backfield to scoot through for large gains.

Midway through the first period Rising Star narrowed the Buffs' margin to one point as quarterback Johnny Jones sputtered 25 yards to score culminating a six play, 62 yard drive. The points failed.

Two Cross Plains fumbles set up a duet of TDs for the Wildcat eleven in the second quarter. Rising Star's Mack Harris recovered a Buff misque on the Herds' 11, and two plays later fullback Jodie Edmiston covered the final 10 yards for the tally. Again the two point conversion failed.

Only 46 seconds later Edmiston duplicated his earlier performance, this time from 20 yards out, after Jones had lapped up another Buffalo bobble. Jones then passed to right end Larry Harding for the two points and a 20-7 halftime lead.

Just to fill out the scoreboard, Rising Star pushed across a touchdown in each of the last two cantos. In the third period Rising Star gained possession of the pigskin on the locals' 22 after a high snap from center on an attempted Buff punt. Jones sneaked over the goaline from one yard out on the fourth try. Right halfback Dicky Morrow circled right end for the two points.

With only three seconds remaining, the visitors posted eight more points on the scoreboard. Jones found Morrow with a 40 yard aerial in the end zone. Jones then worked the pass for the two points to Harding. Cats' Tommy Alford set up the touchdown with a pass interception on the Cross Plains 46.

During the second half the locals never got beyond the Wildcat 40 yard line, although Cross Plains picked up 12 first downs in the contest to the visitors six. Total yards rushing and passing Cross Plains netted 215 compared to Rising Star's 235. Cross Plains lost the football four times on fumbles and had one pass swiped.

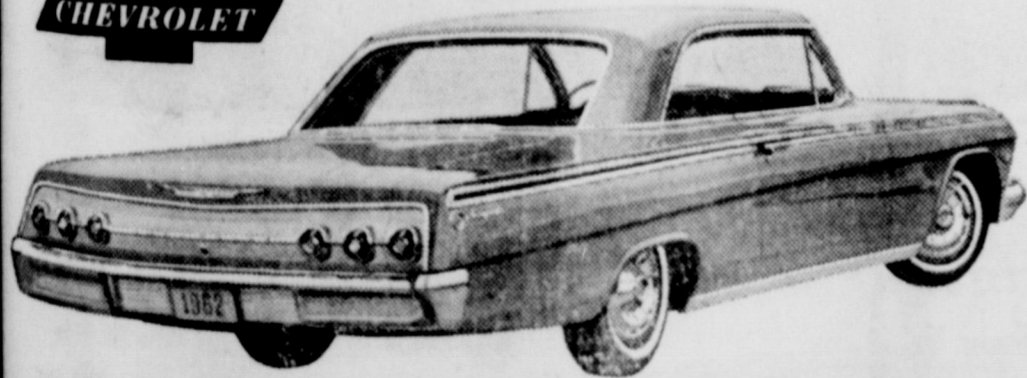

PHILOSOPHER SAYS RUSSIAN IDEA OF UN IS LIKE BANK ROBBER SERVING ON OWN JURY

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discusses the United Nations this week. He may be getting too far away from his farm.

Dear editor: "While I have always suspected that joining up the countries of the world in the United Nations was a laudable goal but about as hard as uniting a bunch of farmers, and while I can't name off-hand very much the U.N. has done, still it must represent a threat to some form of disorder or Russia wouldn't be concerned with it."

"However, I'm not going into a discussion of the U.N.—not just because I'm ignorant of it, that's no excuse for not discussing anything, you set up a standard that a person has to know what he's talking about before he talks and nine-tenths of the conversation would stop—but what interests me is Russia's idea that the U.N. ought to be run by a three-man board, one from Russia, one from the United States, and one from some place else, each with the right to veto the other two."

"I have given this proposal careful thought, and the best I can figure it out, it'd be like trying a bank robber before a three-man jury consisting of the judge, the prosecuting attorney and the bank robber, with a unanimous vote necessary for conviction."

"It'd be like me borrowing money from the bank, with an agreement that before the loan could be called in, me and the banker both would have to vote unanimously on whether or not to foreclose on me."

"I don't believe Russia will get anywhere with this proposal, yet on the other hand I doubt if the United Nations will get anywhere as long as it has Russia on its hands."

"Russia is like a hurricane. You don't know where it'll strike next, but you do know wherever it strikes, it's bad. The world though has survived lots of hurricanes, and it probably can survive Russia, but you'll have to admit, it's going to take a long time for it to blow itself out."
