## What's Cross Plains Like?

(AN EDITORIAL)

What kind of a town is Cross Plains?

Most every resident here has at one time or another been asked that question.

Like most other small cities throughout the nation, Cross Plains has not grown spectacularly since the end of World War II, when population began to concentrate in metropolitan centers. On the other hand, this little city has not "gone to pot". Comparatively, Cross Plains has prospered better than most and forebodes a brighter fu-

Let's look back on the 16 years since the big change in American life moved into high gear. What's happened in Cross Plains during that span of time?

More than 75 new homes have been built or moved here, approximately 35 blocks of pavement have been laid down and fully paid for, five new church buildings have been built and two others vastly improved, in excess of a quarter of a million dollars worth of additions completed on the local school campus, over \$3,000 worth of beautification at Cross Plains Cemetery, local bank deposits have risen 99 per cent, school enrollment upped, almost unbelievable improvement and enlargements given telephone facilities here, possibly \$300,000 spent for new construction and modernization by other business establishments, the city's bonded indebtedness cut in half and the old tax rate maintained.

Church attendance here is high, percentage of home owners best in history, there are no racial problems, the community possesses 11 active civic and fraternal organizations, bankruptcies are rare, climate is healthful, surrounding agriculture diversified-no one-crop economy, people are friendly in daily life and compassionate in time of sorrow.

These are by no means all of the signs that Cross Plains is doing well. They are simply ones which popped into the editor's mind in the few minutes allowed for this
