## Courteous conduct becomes enforceable law

What used to be considered courtesy is now the law and it's costing some local drivers, some who don't even know about the

Justice of the Peace Herman Morrison said some drivers have complained they weren't aware of the new law.

The drivers have been ticketed for failing to change lanes or slow down for emergency vehicles who are stopped on the side of the road with lights activated.

The state law was passed by the last legislature and went into effect Sept. 1, 2003. It states that a driver nearing emergency vehicles with their lights flashing must vacate the lane closest to the stopped vehicle, if possible, or slow down 20 miles below the speed limit. If the posted speed limit is 25 m.p.h. or below drivers should slow to five miles per hour.

Violators can be fined up to \$200, but that fine can increase to \$500 if there is property damage. If there are any bodily injuries resulting from the violation, the offense is upgraded to a Class B misdemeanor.

## Cars being towed from nursing home

While visiting residents at the nursing home is good, parking in the circular drive is not.

In fact several visitors have found their cars towed away after having parked there.

The reason is the circular drive is to be used for patient loading and unloading and EMS ambulances have been having trouble getting in when a resident has needed to be transported to the hospital.

# Muleshoe couple dies in weather related collision

A Muleshoe couple died in a massive pileup of 15-20 vehicles near Post Thursday.

Louis Guzman, 55, and his wife Tomasa, also 55, died when the Peterbuilt truck they were driving rearended a Freightliner truck driven by Alfred Barry. Department of Public Safety Corporal John Gonzalez said no information about Barry was available.

The Gusman's truck was

the third vehicle involved in the massive collision.

"There was a major dust storm at the time and visibility was zero," Gonzalez said. "People said they couldn't see the car in front of them."

Barry was one of eleven people sent to two hospitals in Lubbock. Six of the victims were sent to University Medical Center, including Tomasa Guzman and five others sent to Covenant Hospital. Louis Guzman died

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

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# Lady Mules win first round of playoffs

The Lady Mules kicked the 25-7 Lady Mustangs of Sweetwater out of the state playoffs with a 51-34 thumping Friday night in Post.

Both teams had large crowds of fans on hand to witness the match between the district 2-3A champions and the runner up of district 3-3A.

Only five times this season have teams been able to withstand the baseline-tobaseline defensive pressure the Lady Mules exert. Sweetwater was no different and began to crack under the pressure early in the second period.

The Lady Mustangs had shown little interest in shooting from the outside in the two games the Lady Mules had scouted. But Dacy Ivy and Kelly Rainbolt each drained a 3pointer in the first two minutes of the game to give the Lady Mustangs a 6-3 lead.

Sara Benham chased down a long offensive rebound and found Kelsy Friskup open under the bucket to chip away at the Sweetwater lead. The Lady Mustangs faltered under the defensive pressure and chunked the ball out of bounds.

Benham elevated over the defense and scored in the lane to give Muleshoe a brief lead. The Lady Mustangs answered with backto-back buckets and owned a 12.11 advantage at the end of the first period.

The Lady Mules collected the first eight points of the second frame with Benham making a pair of free throws and a bucket with an assist from Friskup. Lindsey Wood pilfered a pass and added a layup to keep the scoring rally alive.

Amber Cowart found a crack in the defense and drove for an easy bucket to give the Lady Mules a 19-12 advantage. Sweetwater trimmed the lead to three points on back to back buckets with just under two minutes left in the first half.

That was as close as the Lady Mustangs would get as the Lady Mule pressure intensified. Jamie Carpenter picked off a pass and was shoved in the back. Carpenter dropped in both charity tosses to give the Lady Mules a ten-point lead as the first half drew to a close.

Rainbolt made two-ofthree free throws after being fouled on a desperation shot as the half ended.

Benham led all scorers with 14 points at the intermission and Rainbolt had 11 for Sweetwater.

Brandi Wood came storming back in the second half and collected a pair of put backs. Tori Barton drove a stake through the Lady Mustangs heart with a 3-pointer from the corner with three minutes gone in third period.

The Lady Mules owned a 37-26 advantage to start the final period. Benham fought through a hack and put up a one-handed floater Friskup each dropped in in the lane. She added the charity toss to give the Lady Mules their largest lead of the night, 16 points.

"Our game plan was to deny their inside players the ball and try to run their guards out of gas," said Lady Mule coach Shana Simms. "Brandi (Wood), Kelsy (Friskup) and Sara (Benham) did a great job defending inside."

"Sweetwater is a great ball club and really gave us a game tonight."

"We rotated our guards often to keep the pressure high out front. Defense wins championships and I think we proved that tonight,' concluded Simms.

Sweetwater turned the ball over 20 times during the game and the Lady Mules converted those turnovers to points.

"We started a little slow tonight," said Amber Cowart. "But we attacked them on defense and put a lot of pressure on them all the way down the court. Coach Simms rotated us in so we could run their ball handlers out of gas."

"Our speed was just too much for them tonight,' said Sara Benham. "Our guards really put pressure on them out side. They are big and like to use their post players to score."

"Brandi did a very good job on Rainbolt and Kelsi shut Owens down. After the first quarter our guards really made it easier for us inside," Benham said.

Benham led all scorers with 23 points and B. Wood added eight. Barton and

five points, L. Wood and Carpenter made four apiece and Cowart chipped in two.

The Lady Mules continued their playoff run in the Rip Griffin Center against the Tulia Lady Hornets on Tuesday night.

A win in the regional quarter finals would put the Lady Mules in the Texas Region 1 3A Tournament.

The games would be played in the United Spirit Arena on the Texas Tech University campus February 27 and 28.

# 60 Minutes and Evangelical **Christian Theology**

It has been a good while now since our church's program of teaching included a Sunday evening service. In fact, we try pretty hard NOT to program much on Sunday evenings at all, so that this little section of the week actually becomes for our folks, if not a "day of rest," at least an "evening of rest." One thing this means in practicality is that, if I want to, I get to watch CBS News' 60 Minutes program.

I often wonder why I want to. I prefer not having anything approximating a serious thought on Sunday evenings, and the 60 Minutes media stars frustrate and anger me at least half of the time. But still I kinda like the format, and I enjoy listening to Andy Rooney even when I disagree with him because I'm often as

surly and opinionated as he is. So I was watching that program one Sunday or a few ago when the lead story was entitled, "Rise of the Righteous Army." CBS Correspondent Morley Safer was focusing on "evangelical Christians" who, he says, "form one of the most potent forces in American politics and society," people who "place their faith, a personal relationship with Jesus Christ, above everything else in their lives and hope to spread that

According to Safer, 40 per cent of the votes for George

Gospel to the world."

W. Bush in the last election came from evangelical Christians. And, according to Safer, the beliefs of these folks are "beginning to reshape the culture as wellthanks to a group of best-selling novels known as the 'Left Behind' series."

My ears perked up when I heard this introduction. You see, if I was to try to locate myself in the larger map of Christendom, larger than my little mud puddle, I'd probably opt for "evangelical Christian" as a pretty accurate description of me and where I fit. And I'd certainly like to think that "evangelical Christians" make a difference in our society and culture.

But, wait a minute! The difference we make is "thanks to" the "Left Behind" series?

I think Morley Safer is confused. Or maybe I am. Do all Christians" "evangelical believe in the theological premise of the "Left Behind" series? A firm belief of Christianity in general has always been that Christ is indeed coming back. I believe that with all of my heart. But I think I'll leave how and when up to Him. Personally, I don't at all buy the specific and, to me, strange end-time opinions of the "Left Behind" authors (though I'm very jealous indeed of their sales). I think they've misinterpreted parts of Matthew 24 and lots of Revelation. I'm not very surprised that a guy like Morley Safer thinks they're weird.

But it also really bugs him that they look only to one God and one Savior. Color me weird that way, too.



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

at the scene. None of the other victim's injuries appeared to be life threatening, Gonzalez said.

The massive nature of the pileup, and the problems with visibility caused law enforcement officers to come from Slaton, Canyon, Lubbock, Scurry and Terry counties along with DPS troopers. EMS units from a number of area cities also responded to treat and transport the injured.

"Without all the help from area law enforcement agencies this could have been a lot worse," Gonzalez said. "Farmers in the area turning their fields to soften the dirt and reduce the dust also helped tremendously."
