### 10 Area Citizens Get Petit Jury Summons

A venire of 40 has been summoned to serve in 42nd District Court convening in Baird next Tuesday, Dec. 5, with 10 area residents included on the petit jury list.

Two juveniles and one adult, all of whom gave a Cross Plains address, are lodged in Coleman County jail on charges of having looted a home in Burkett. The three were taken into custody Saturday morning by Deputy Sheriffs Byron Richardson and Tod Newton, through cooperation with Taylor and Coleman County authorities.

A confession was taken from a 17-year-old youth, who stated that his sister and her 16-year-old husband were accomplices. The house invaded at Burkett was one owned by Reese Porter. It was furnished but not occupied. Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou discovers an amusing problem for the Russians, in his letter this week. It is something to think about.

And what's Nikita Smithsky going to do when who-ever re-replaces Nikita Khrushchev comes into power? "There are a lot of funny

things happening in Russia these days, and the rest of the world is missing a bet if it doesn't start laughing at them."

## Brucellosis Testing Urgent

(An Editorial)

It seems ironical that Callahan County, a region noted for its pure-blooded cattle herds, should be financially penalized when local stockmen sell their animals elsewhere for any purpose other than butchering. Such is definitely the case.

The penalty is imposed for the reason that Callahan County cattle have not been tested for brucellosis, whereas those of most all neighboring counties have. Any time a local stockman sells an animal through an auction ring or commission company, buyers are alerted purchases from this county must be either slaughtered or vaccinated before moved elsewhere.

People from other counties don't like to buy cows and bulls from an "unclean" area. They know the animals will have to be tested and then quarantined for 30 or 60 days before being placed with their foundation herds. Running the risk of having to sell choice animals for slaughtering if the tests prove positive, is not inviting to prospective purchasers.

If Callahan County is to regain its rightful place in the cattle industry, a brucellosis testing program must be instituted at once.

A previous effort to get 75 percent of the cattle owners, representing 51 percent of the cattle population to sign a petition requesting the testing program resulted in less than half the necessary signatures. A minimum of 528 must be obtained. To date 259 have signed; 269 more are needed.

Petitions are available in all sections of the county. In the Cross Plains area the following men have the papers, and will be happy to accommodate signers: Nathan Foster, Charley Coats, Tommie Harris and O. J. Knight.

Let's get at this business and clean-up brucellosis just as was done with the Texas fever ticks 45 years ago.

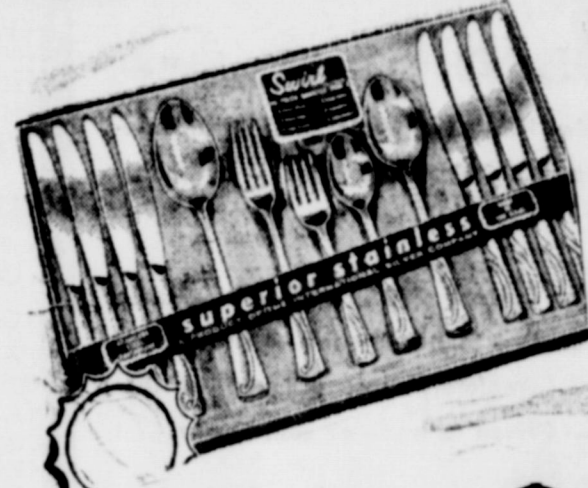

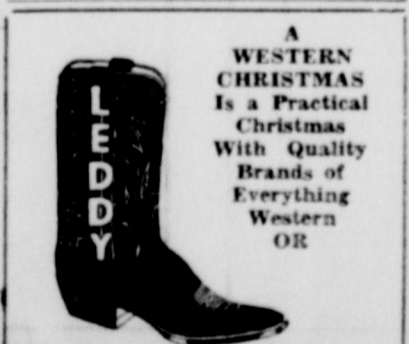
