



Icy Roads Close Schools 2 Days

Cross Plains students went back to school Wednesday morning after a four-day recess. Icy roads, which made traffic

dangerous, necessitated closing the system Monday and Tuesday.

2 Local Officers Attending School

Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson and City Marshal Cranz Nichols, Jr., are attending a two-week law enforcement school in Coleman, sponsored by the Texas Department of Public Safety. The Cross Plains officers have attended all sessions and report the training valuable in better understanding of Texas statutes.

The school schedule had been set up to allow two days for such an emergency and this week's shut-down will not alter the previously announced ending date of May 18, unless there is additional bad weather. The scholastic school year takes in 175 days of classroom instruction and the calendar provides for exactly the required number between now and May 18, stated Superintendent Paul Whitton yesterday.

POLL TAX PAYMENTS LAGGING IN COUNTY

Although payment of poll taxes quickened in Callahan County this week, only 1,151 receipts had been issued to Wednesday at noon, reported Albert C. Lovell, tax assessor-collector. This is 54 per cent of the total poll taxes paid two years ago—last election year—when 2,128 receipts were issued.

With only four business days remaining in which the \$1.75 stipend can be paid in time to carry voting privileges, indications point to a lowered number of poll tax holders this year.

\$28,750 Contract Let At Courthouse

Callahan County Commissioners Court has awarded a contract to E. B. McCowen of Abilene for \$28,750 worth of repairs to the courthouse building in Baird. Work will begin before the end of January.

Jerry Rosser, Abilene engineer, has been retained to represent the county in the improvement project. The contractor was reported Tuesday waiting a work order from Rosser to begin.

Project Outlined

Specifications call for a new basement floor in the courthouse, all water and sewer lines to be removed and relaid, making them accessible to service, razing and rebuilding of concrete aprons and sidewalks adjoining the structure on the outside, and reterracing grounds to cause water to drain away from the building.

New Jail Planned

A renovation program at the Callahan County jail, for which

a \$15,000 bond issue was recently voted, has been broadened and plans call for tearing down the present jail building and erecting a brick veneer sheriff's home on the site and a new jail building to the west. Bids were asked on this basis in December but were declined when none fell within the \$23,000 Commissioners had allocated for the project. The \$23,000 was obtained by adding \$8,000 from the county treasury to the \$15,000 approved by voters in the bond election.

New bids are now being asked and a letting is expected in February, the Review was told Tuesday.

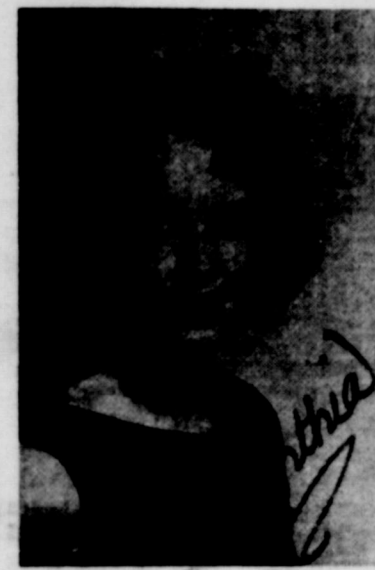
Cynthia Newton Chosen Beauty In Bryan Contest

Cold Weather Helps In Screwworm Fight

Fifteen committeemen of the Cross Plains area, presently engaged in a financial drive to

raise funds for a statewide fight on screwworms, were spurred in their efforts this week by an announcement from Austin that recent unprecedented cold weather in South Texas promises to become a strong ally.

CROSS CUT RANCHERS JOIN WITH PROGRESS

Livestockmen of the Cross Cut area have contributed \$748 to the program designed to eradicate the screwworm pest from the Southwest.

"Virtually every owner of livestock in our community has contributed," said Ross J. Newton, chairman at Cross Cut for the movement which is being sponsored there by Brown County Animal Health Commission.

The Cross Cut sector was likewise one of the first to complete the recent brucellosis testing program.

The hard freeze that went as far south as the lower valley may have all but wiped out the screwworm fly and have set up an ideal situation for the program of distributing sterile male screwworm flies to wipe out the breed, as has been done in Florida.

Nathan Foster, chairman of the committee of 15 to conduct a financial drive among Cross Plains area livestock owners, said last night that impassable roads had thus far delayed the solicitation but that it would be resumed Thursday and Friday.

"I have no fear but that we will raise our proportionate part of the county's goal of \$5,000," he said.

Callahan County ranchers are being asked to contribute 50 cents per animal unit to be used in the fight on screwworms.

It is pointed out that an animal unit consists of one head of breeding cattle, or 10 head of sheep or goats.

District Judge J. R. Black has transferred the trial of S/Sgt. Willie Ridgeway, 39, on a charge of murder with a motor vehicle, from 42nd District Court in Callahan County to Abilene.

Change of venue was asked on the contention that the defend-

ant could not get a fair trial in this county because of "existing prejudice."

Judge Black set the trial in Abilene for Jan. 25. Indications are that three days will be required to complete the case.

of the Air Force stationed at Dyess AFB, is charged in the Nov. 18, 1961, highway traffic death of Mrs. Van (Imogene) McMillon Boozer of Fort Worth. She was killed in a two-car crash near the Callahan-Taylor County line.

The Negro airman has been

in jail in lieu of a \$10,000 bond.

He also is charged on five counts of assault with a motor vehicle in a misdemeanor filed by County Attorney James Paul Shanks. The misdemeanor complaint is based on injuries sustained by five persons riding in the same car as Mrs. Boozer.

Mrs. Sarah M. McCowen, well-known Cross Plains lady, has filed official announcement of her candidacy for County Clerk of Callahan County, subject to action of the Democratic primary, May 5, 1962.

Her initial statement to voters appears hereunder:

"Many citizens of Callahan County, who are familiar with my qualifications and after having reviewed my past 19 years of continuous public service, have encouraged me to file for the office of County Clerk of Callahan County, subject to the Democratic primary, May 5, 1962.

"I am the former Sarah Hounshell, born and reared on a farm in the Cross Plains trade territory. After finishing high school and business school I served three years as a postal clerk until married to B. C. McCowen of Cross Plains. "1945 mail clerk, Ordnance Branch, Department of Army, Camp Bowie, Texas.

"1946-1947 Statistical coding clerk, Fourth Army, Fort Sam Houston, Texas.

"1948 Assistant budget and fiscal clerk, Department of Air Force, Ladd Air Force Base, Fairbanks, Alaska.

"Sept. 29, 1949 - Nov. 1950 Administrative technician, U. S. Air Force Security Service, Kelly Air Force Base, Texas.

"Nov. 24, 1950 - Aug. 1, 1951 Fiscal accounting clerk, Department of Army Forces, Weisbaden, Germany. Transferred with contract ended.

"Aug. 5, 1951 - Nov. 23, 1952 Assistant purchasing and contracting officer, U. S. Air Force, Florence, Italy. (Two-year contract ended.)

"December 15, 1952 - March 1, 1954, Statistical clerk, Alaskan Air Command, Anchorage, Alaska. March 15, 1954, returned to Cross Plains due to illness in the family.

"July 1, 1954 - May 1, 1955, Office manager, bookkeeper, secretary for Kinnebrew Drilling Co., Cross Plains.

"May 8, 1955 - December 31, 1961, Office manager, bookkeeper, secretary for Big D Drilling Co., Cross Plains.

Free Booklet Explains How To Escape Fallout Dangers

Persons who have wondered what precautions to take to escape dangers of radioactive fallout will be interested in a Defense Department booklet now available at the Cross Plains postoffice.

The publication is free upon request as long as the supply lasts.

The pocket-sized book is entitled "Fallout Protection-What to Know and Do About Nuclear Attack."

After months of redrafting and departmental controversy, it was produced by the office of Civil Defense of the Defense Department at a cost of \$825,000.

The booklet explains how to survive attack and live for the country's recovery. It defines words and outlines some basic facts of nuclear attack.

A nuclear explosion is unfolded for the reader and the descent of fallout is traced.

Several types of community shelters are illustrated, as well as plans for family shelters. According to the booklet, a four person basement corner shelter can be produced for a cost of \$125.

A listing of shelter supplies is included.

The last few pages of the booklet are devoted to first steps toward recovery.

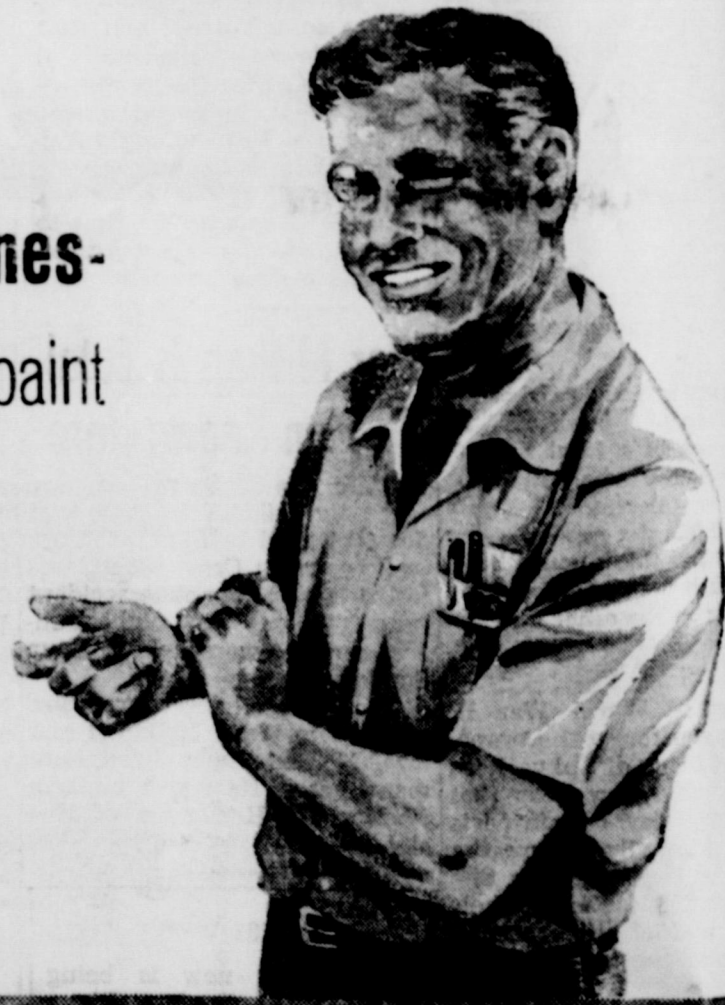

PHILOSOPHER WONDERS HOW CITY PEOPLE GOT ALONG WITHOUT URBAN DEPARTMENT

Editor's note: The Bayou Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on the Bayou recently encountered a city man, his letter this week reveals. What else it reveals, you'll have to decide.

Dear editor:

I was visited by a friend from a big city recently and he was all excited over the latest development out of Washington.

"Say," he said, "you know Washington is thinking about establishing a new Cabinet post, the Department of Urban Affairs?"

"Nope," I said. "What for?"

"Why, to help the cities solve their problems, like you farmers have got a Department of Agriculture," he said. Then he went on to explain that cities have grown by leaps and bounds in recent years, problems have piled up, like traffic congestion, noise, inadequate police protection, water shortages, classroom shortages, worn-out city streets, slums, crime, high taxes, etc.

"You name the city," he said, "big or little, and it's got problems. Big problems. There just isn't enough money coming in to satisfy all the demands and needs of city people, and the bigger the city, the worse the problem. The Department of Urban Affairs is the answer."

"Why, that's fine," I said, looking at him out of the corner of my eye, "wonder why somebody didn't think of that a long time ago? You city folks have been asleep. Why, us farmers thought up the Department of Agriculture to solve our problems years ago. In fact, the Department of Agriculture is celebrating its 100th anniversary this year, and where

do you think farming would be today if we hadn't had that Department?"

"That's right," he said, "but we're catching on. We're going to get some help finally."

"Why," I said, seeing he wasn't catching on, "you simply can't imagine what shape farming would be in today if us farmers couldn't turn all our problems over to the Department of Agriculture. You take cities. You've got a surplus of cities, haven't you? Must have, since no city government is breaking even, they can't quite make ends meet, population piling up in huge surpluses, labor costs are high, street paving equipment wearing out and no money to replace it with, and things like that. It's sure clear to me that what cities need is a Department of Urban Affairs to handle their problems. It's the only answer."

"Say," he said, "are you kidding me . . . ?"

But I told him I had to go feed my chickens and would see him later.

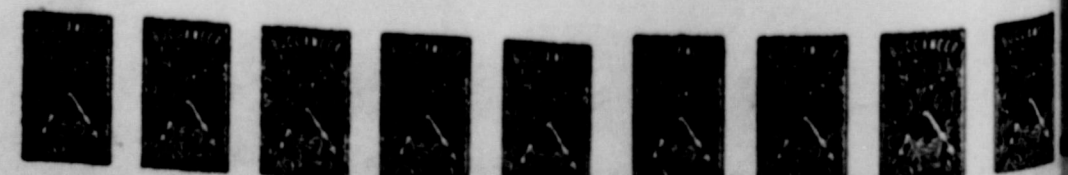

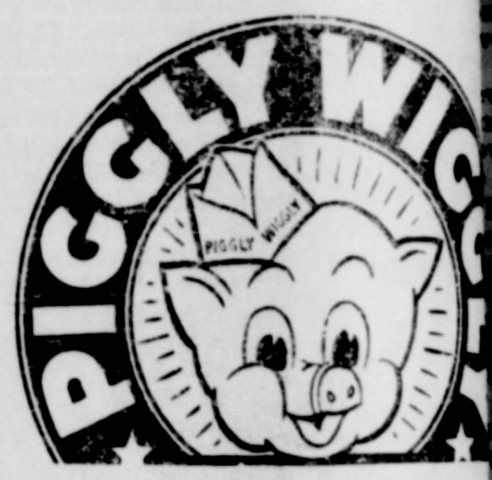

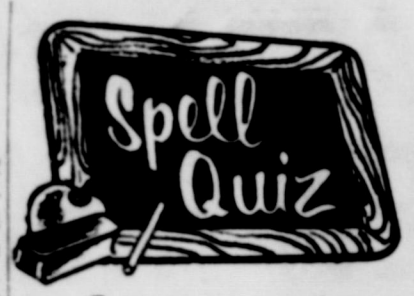
The program will be opened with a general assembly, at which time brief talks are to be presented by outstanding business and professional leaders of the Southwest.
