Commissioners Court Faces Difficult Problems At Jail

Callahan County Commissioners' Court has been wrestling with a tough problem and as yet no solution has been reached.

Last July voters approved a \$15,000 bond issue to repair the old Callahan County Jail. The issue was voted at the same time as was a courthouse repair bond of \$35,000.

Clamor Heard

Even before the bonds were sold a public clamor arose in some parts of the county for an entirely new jail instead of repairing the old. In Baird sentiment was strongest for a completely new jail building. In other sections of the county a greater division of opinion was heard.

The court advertised for bids on both types of construction, new and repair. In each instance the proposals exceeded available funds. The most recent bid opening was Monday morning when Fred Williams Construction Company of Abilene tendered a \$21,600 proposal to remodel the present jail structure. The bid was temporarily rejected, however, the Williams firm will re-study figures and tender another offer Friday. All other bidders were above that of the Williams Company.

The plan now being studied

by members of the commissioners court calls for re-working the top floor and construction of a cell block for juveniles and one for women prisoners, installing new plumbing throughout, reworking the entire bottom floor—sheriff's living quarters—and putting in new doors, windows and necessary hardware, replastering walls and new floors. The court will meet again Friday morning to consider the resubmittal.

After much talk was heard on the jail question—"new" or "repair the old"—this question was included in a 13-point questionnaire which appeared in last week's issue of the Cross Plains Review. Readers of the newspaper were asked to give their preference on this question. The first 30 questionnaires returned to the newspaper office revealed 19 favoring "fix the old," nine advocating a "new building" and two failing to vote on this particular question.

Each mail brings additional replies, however, and another questionnaire is published in today's issue of the Review. Readers will be informed of opinions on the jail question and other 12 submittals as soon as a more representative number of replies are received.

DOG POISONERS BEING SOUGHT BY OFFICERS

Local law enforcement officers are engaged in a concentrated effort here to apprehend dog poisoners before some innocent child falls victim to poisoning.

Several residents have reported their family pets poisoned by an unknown person or persons and several weiners found in yards of residences have been turned over to local officers for analyzing to determine the type of poison being used.

Local authorities point out that the placing of poison in the city is a violation of the law and state that guilty persons will be prosecuted to the limit of the law. Deputy Sheriff Byron Richardson pointed out that using weiners as bait for poison is inviting an innocent child to die, and charges of murder could be filed against the guilty.

Officers are asking for full cooperation of all in ending this dangerous situation and ask that cases where dogs are a nuisance be reported to authorities for proper action.

Peanutmen Given A Last Reminder

J. C. Earp, office manager for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee in Callahan County, yesterday issued final reminder that farmers who do not plant their full peanut allotments have until 5 p.m. April 4, to release the allotments and protect history acreage.

Acresage released will be re-apportioned to other Callahan County farmers who desire to plant more peanut acreage.

"In releasing allotments to other local farmers, the grantors not only protect their own history acreage, but render a valuable service to other planters of the county," Earp said.

A year ago as of this date 1,300 allotted peanut acres had been released, whereas only 300 has been temporarily surrendered thus far in 1962.
