## 750 May Vote Saturday In Primary Election Here

A total vote of 750 has been predicted for Cross Plains in the Democratic primary Saturday.

This forecast was issued yesterday by Alton E. Hornsby, local party chairman, who said: "I realize this would be one of the largest totals ever polled at a Callahan County voting box, however, interest is keen this year and such a turn-out is highly likely."

If such a large vote should be tallied by Democrats in Cross Plains, political observers declare it would be even rarer because of the fact that Repub-

licans are holding their own primary here for the first time in many years.

A total of 624 votes was polled here two years ago. There are currently 535 poll tax holders here now as compared with 439 then.

Over the entire county 2,500 votes are predicted for Saturday's Democrat primary.

In Cross Plains the Democrat polling place will be the City Hall. Doors will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Hornsby will be presiding judge at the Cross Plains box. His other judges will be: Fred W. Stacy, Cranz Nichols, Jr., and Mrs. H. P. Moon. Clerks will be: Mrs. Mary Wagner, Mrs. Bill Kilgore, Mrs. Harry Copping, Mrs. Chester Glover, Mrs. Franz Odum, Mrs. L. F. Foster, Mrs. H. C. Freeman, Jr., Mrs. Paul Lutzenberger.

Voters are being asked to use only the south door in entering and leaving the polls. Reason for this change, Hornsby explained, is that a team of counters will be working in the front portion of the City Hall as well as the rear section. Heretofore, tallymen have worked only in the back part of the building.

Incomplete returns are expected to be available for announcement by Hornsby shortly after the polls close.

Hornsby asks that voters bring poll tax receipts with them to the polls to hasten voting. In the absence of the receipt officials must execute an affidavit which slows polling.

Harold Garrett of Cross Plains will be a write-in candidate for County Superintendent of Public Instruction of Callahan County on the Republican ticket.

"If nominated in the primary and elected in November, I will dissolve the office of County Superintendent as soon as possible and turn functions over to the County Judge," Garrett said, "resulting in a saving of possibly \$15,000 annually."

### Lions Minstrel Promises To Be Best Comedy Seen Here

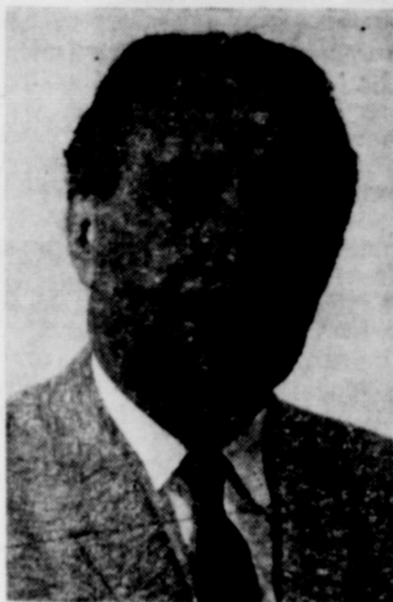

## 12-Year-Old Band Suits About Gone; Booster Club Ponders Replacements

Shall Cross Plains High School Buffalo Band appear next year in faded, threadbare uniforms?

That question is being pondered by members of the Band Boosters Club, school officials and interested individuals.

Present uniforms are 12 years old. They have reportedly been altered and mended so many times that continued use looms impossible.

A meeting of all parents of band students and civic-minded citizens has been called for Tuesday night, May 15, in the school auditorium. Reports from committees presently gathering information will be heard at that time and a decision made.

"Eighty new uniforms are needed," said Director Wayne McDonald Tuesday, "they would cost in the neighborhood of \$75 each."

The Band Booster Club now has \$1,000 in a fund earmarked for the purchase of new suits. At least \$2,000 more is expected to be required to make a 50 per cent down payment on the \$6,000, which it is believed the uniforms will cost.

The band parents organization has operated concessions

at football games here each season and it is mainly from this source that the \$1,000 now on hand was acquired. Proponents of the plan to buy new suits believe that the portion not paid for the uniforms at the time of purchase could be retired by profits from future concession sales.

"Attractive, well-fitting uniforms not only improve the appearance of a band but inspire boys and girls to greater efficiency," McDonald said, "and

build an esprit de corps."

McDonald urges that all band boosters pass along word of the meeting to be held the night of May 15 and particularly emphasizes the importance of parents of fifth and sixth graders being present.

An attending physician said that Mr. Sims died of heart trouble for which he had been receiving treatment for more than 12 years.

Mr. Sims was born June 5, 1897, at Troy in McLennan County, and came to Cross Plains from Santa Anna 35 years ago. He married Ethel Starnater here Jan. 12, 1929. He formerly owned Sims Drug Co. and later operated a grocery store.

A veteran of World War I, he was commander last year of the Tommie Aiken American Legion Post here. He was a past president of the Cross Plains Chamber of Commerce and was active in civic affairs until illness forced his retirement. He was an elder in the local Presbyterian Church.

Funeral was held at 10 a. m. Friday at the First United Presbyterian Church with the Rev. Harold G. Wise, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Bill Nicks, pastor of the local Church of Christ. Burial was in Coleman City Cemetery, directed by Higginbotham Funeral Home of Cross Plains.

Surviving are his wife; his mother, Mrs. Dora M. Sims of Cross Plains; two brothers, G. M. of Dallas and W. B. of Minneapolis, Minn.; and one sister, Mrs. Walker Richardson of Coleman.

2 Cases Fines and Costs	\$50.50
28 Cases Fines and Costs	\$40.50
6 Cases Fines and Costs	\$30.50
50 Cases Fines and Costs	\$25.50
68 Cases Fines and Costs	\$20.50
4 Cases Fines and Costs	\$16.50

None of these cases was contested. All pleaded guilty. Who sets the fines? I do. When a defendant pleads guilty and has no money to pay fine and costs, a commitment is placed in the hands of the officer in charge to collect the amount due or place the defendant in jail until paid or served out at the rate of \$3 per day, as the law directs.

No plaintiff sets the fines in my court. No officer with whom I work even tries to set fines. They work under oath the same as do I. They are doing a good job. Give them your cooperation and give me your vote, so I can continue to help them.

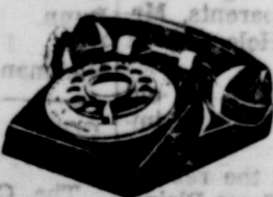

## Candidate Charges Smear By Outsiders

"The smear campaign out of Austin, of which I had been warned apparently is beginning here in the final days of this race," State Representative Wayne Gibbens said Monday as he blasted tactics of his opposition being waged by sources from outside this district. Gibbens is a candidate for reelection to the House from the 63rd Legislative District.

A piece of literature bearing an Austin postmark has been received over the district. Ministers of all denominations were apparently the main target of what Gibbens termed "the beginning of a vicious attempt to misrepresent and falsify my voting record by distributing misleading, scurrilous propaganda filled with half-truths and innuendo."

The return address on the envelope containing this piece of literature was Legislative Service, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas, and the information purports to show how Representative Gibbens voted on two issues.

The Texas Legislative Service by telegram has denied mailing any such voting records. Walter Long, head of this reputable legislative service in Austin, when contacted by telephone said, "the compiling and distributing of voting records is not a function of our service. We certainly had nothing to do with this." In answer to another question Long stated that no one is authorized to use the name of his legislative service on an envelope.

Representative Gibbens said, "The professional Austin lobbyists, who are posing to my candidacy are attempting to hide behind the name of this responsible and respected legislative service in order to cloak this vicious and malicious propoganda with a false veil of truth."

Gibbens termed as "fraudulent" the use of the name "Legislative Service" as a return address on this envelope and has called for an investigation to ascertain if state or federal mail statutes have been violated.

District Attorney Jack Neal of Graham and Federal Postal Inspector L. H. Stephens of Fort Worth have been contacted and asked to investigate this matter.

Representative Gibbens said, "I am now getting this information together and will forward it all to the District Attorney and the postal authorities for their action if federal or state statutes have been violated."

"This propoganda makes it look as if I had voted to legalize gambling in Texas. Nothing is farther from the truth," Gibbens said. The material reproduced contains only a vote to postpone this issue and fails to accurately reflect my strong stand and votes against legalizing gambling in Texas. As is stated in the official records of the House of Representatives, I voted to postpone the measure only in order to secure more votes against the bill to insure its final defeat. This scurrilous propoganda also mis-

A Justice of the Peace is a person elected, or appointed, to keep peace and dignity in the State, and not simply a collection agent of fines to fill the Coffers of the State or the county of Callahan.

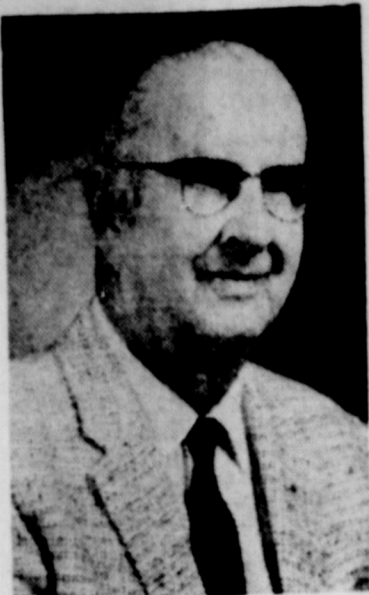

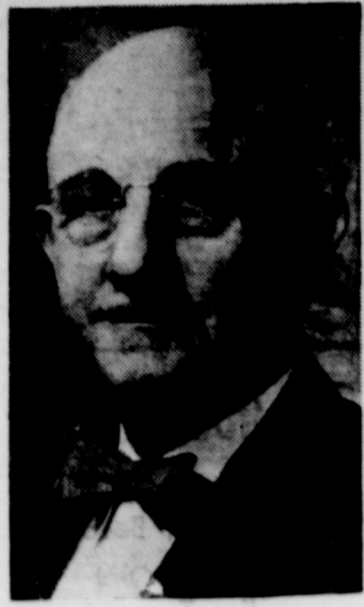

Returned to Tulla and served as County Attorney, Swisher County, 1919-1920. Served as Mayor of the City of Tulla in 1919.

Moved to Plainview, in 1920 and practiced law with Kinder and Russell until 1923. Served two terms as County Judge, Hale County, 1923-1926. Served as District Attorney, 64th Judicial District of Texas, 1927-1934. Returned to private practice of law in 1935 with the firm of Griffin and Morehead, Plainview, with which firm he was associated at the time of his appointment as Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of Texas April 1, 1949, except for the time spent in service in World War II.

Entered the service in World War II on July 27, 1942, as Lieutenant Colonel of Infantry; served as Chief of the Training Division, Camp Shanks, N. Y., a staging area for the New York Port of Embarkation. In May, 1945, he was detailed to the Judge Advocate General's Department and helped establish the Trial Section of the War Crimes Branch, U. S. Army, and became Chief of the Prosecution Subsection thereof at Wiesbaden, Germany. He was discharged as Colonel of Infantry Dec. 9, 1945; holds Reserve Commission in Judge Advocate General's Department.

Served as member of Board of Directors of Texas Bar Association from 1939 to 1942. Has been chairman of various committees since that time.

Served as member of the Advisory Hospital Council of the State of Texas from July, 1947 to April 1, 1949.

Member of American Legion. Helped organize the Tulla Post and was a charter member thereof before moving to Plainview. Charter member of the Plainview American Legion Post and was its first Post Commander.

Episcopalian. Member of Plainview Rotary Club. Married and has two children.

Was appointed to the Supreme Court by the late Governor Jester in March 1949 and took seat on the Court April 1, 1949. He was elected to a first full term in 1950, and has served on that Court since that time.

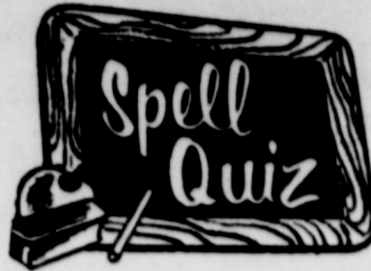
