President of the association is H. H. Harrellson of Cisco. Other officers are Clarence B. Dill, also of Cisco, vice-president, and Mrs. Buck Maples of Rising Star, secretary.

## 6,929 Cattle Tested; Odd Mishaps Hit Men

6,929 head of cattle have been tested in the program now underway in this county to eliminate brucellosis.

County Agent Travis Allen reported last night that the project is moving with exception rapidity because of efficient work being done by line-up men and enthusiastic cooperation of herd owners.

Livestockmen who have not yet made arrangements for examination of their cattle are being urged to contact the line-up man in their area, in order that dates can be set and no delay occasioned.

Two unfortunate accidents slowed the testing program temporarily. Two bleeders fell victims of odd encounters. Buddy Henderson, who was working in the Putnam locality contracted blood poisoning and was hospitalized. Then Herman Cassidy, who was working in the Dudley sector, was required to take hydrophobia shots after coming in contact with a rabid calf.

## 814 Vote In 2 Primaries

Largest vote ever polled at a Callahan County voting box was rolled up in Cross Plains Saturday.

Eight hundred and fourteen votes were tabulated in two primaries here.

Local Democrats polled 787 of which 26 were absentee ballots.

Republicans had 35 local votes and one absentee ticket.

Until Saturday the greatest vote ever recorded in Cross Plains was at the general election in 1960 when 667 ballots were cast. In the entire county 2,650 votes were polled Saturday in the Democrat primary and 42 in Republican elections, held only here and at Clyde. Slightly more than 30 per cent of the entire Callahan County vote was polled in Cross Plains.

Results Come Late

Final tabulation of the Cross Plains box was three hours later than remainder of the county. Complete results were not announced until 2 a.m. Sunday. Several hundred people gathered at an election party on the streets of Cross Plains and viewed results as they were posted on a large, lighted board. Most all had gone home, however, long before complete returns from the local box were made known.

Largest single vote polled in this county went to Hazel Reynolds, who ran unopposed for County Treasurer. She received 2,601. Votes of other unopposed candidates were: Nelson Quinn for District Attorney 2,593, L. C. Cash for County Superintendent 2,512 and A. E. Dyer, Jr., for County Democratic Chairman 2,590.

For Democratic Precinct Chairman Alton E. Hornsby received 762 of the 787 votes tallied at Cross Plains.

In the first Republican primary election held in Callahan County in many years, Jack Cox received 34 for governor and Roy Whittenburg four.

In the race for Lieutenant Governor, Cross Plains Republicans gave Kellis Dibrell 25 and O. W. (Bill) Hayes 10. For Congressman at large: Desmond A. Barry 19, Giles Miller four and Joe B. Phillips 12.

Write-In Votes

Twenty-five Callahan County Republicans wrote in the name of Harold Garrett for County Superintendent of Public Instruction and he will be a candidate for that office in the November general election.

Three proposed amendments to the state constitution, which appeared on the G.O.P. ballot, were rejected in this county.

Names of a number of local persons were written on the Republican ballot for various offices. For County Commissioner, Bryan Bennett received seven, Zed Bright one, Nathan S. Foster two, Doyle Cowan one, Duke Mitchell three. For County Judge Byron Richardson received 18 write-ins and C. R. Myrick one. In the County Clerk's race Sarah McCowan garnered 11, Royce White two and Beatrice Deal one.

## Lady Hurt When Lightning Strikes

Mrs. J. L. Ingram of Coleman, mother of Mrs. Joe Hanke, Jr., of Cross Plains, was seriously injured Saturday afternoon.

A bolt of lightning hit wires leading to her electric refrigerator just as she opened the door. Mrs. Ingram suffered extreme shock and was thrown backward, breaking a hip in the fall. Mr. Ingram was sitting nearby and felt the electrical force but was not injured.

Mrs. Ingram was taken to Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene where she is presently a patient. Mrs. Hanke has been at her mother's bedside all this week.

## Man, 26, Killed In 2-Car Accident Tuesday Night

David C. Christensen, 26-year-old Cross Plains oil field worker, was dead on arrival at the Rising Star Hospital Tuesday night of injuries sustained in a two-car accident, two miles east of Cross Plains on State Highway 36.

Christensen's 1951 model Cadillac was involved in a collision with a 1961 Chevrolet, driven by D. W. (Bud) Ingram, also of Cross Plains. Three daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Looney Johnson, Barbara Ann, Doris Jean and Dorothy Mae, and Kathryn Jean Harris, all of Cross Plains, were in the car with Christensen. One of the Johnson girls received a broken collar bone. Others sustained only scratches and bruises.

Ingram was alone in his car. State Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews reported the accident occurred at 7:35. Both vehicles were traveling east and Ingram was said to have been preparing to turn off on a gravel road.

Ingram received cuts about the hand and body bruises.

Both automobiles were extensively damaged.

Funeral service for Christensen, who had lived here three years, has been tentatively set for Friday afternoon at three o'clock from Higginsbotham Chapel in Cross Plains with Rev. C. R. Myrick, Baptist minister, officiating. Burial will be in Cottonwood Cemetery.

Christensen is survived by his mother of Glendale, Calif., his father of Duluth, Minn., two brothers and two sisters, all of California.

Mrs. Charley Barr, 83, long-time resident of the Cross Plains area, died early Tuesday night in Overall-Morris Hospital at Coleman, following a lengthy illness.

Funeral service will be held from the First Baptist Church here Thursday afternoon at two o'clock, with the Rev. V. D. Walters, pastor of the North Park Baptist Church in Abilene, officiating. He will be assisted by the Rev. Don Turner, local Baptist pastor, and the Rev. Harold G. Wise, Cross Plains Presbyterian pastor.

Burial will be in Cross Plains Cemetery, beside the grave of Mr. Barr, who died in May, 1945. He was buried on Mother's Day, 17 years ago.

Mrs. Barr was born Effie D. Hargrove in Burnet County, April 21, 1879. She came to this area as a girl, settling with her parents in the Deer Plains Community. She was married Sept. 22, 1897. She had been a member of the Baptist Church more than 65 years and moved her letter to the local church with her husband from Board Flat in 1904.

### All Amendments Fail In Callahan

Three proposed amendments to Texas constitution were rejected by Callahan County Democrats Saturday.

Proposition number one — to legalize betting on horse races — lost 1,205 to 831. In Cross Plains the vote on this proposition was 274 for and 286 against.

Proposition number two — asking the legislature for enabling legislation to make horse racing legal and allocating the taxes to be derived therefrom — lost in Callahan County 1,171 to 798. In Cross Plains the vote was 262 for and 302 against.

Proposition number three — favoring abolition of the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting — lost in the county 1,053 to 924. In Cross Plains the vote was 216 for and 358 against. Over the state both horse racing measures failed, whereas Texans went on record as favoring abolition of the poll tax.
