AN OPEN LETTER FROM THE

Medical Doctors of Callahan County

Socialized Medicine and YOU!

THE TIME HAS COME for us all to stand and be counted on the question of Socialized Medicine. It's no longer an academic question, no longer "something to discuss" or "put off till next year."

The time is now—time to decide whether we want the relationship of patient and physician to continue free . . . or whether we want to trade this freedom for control by the Federal Government.

Congress is considering legislation at this moment which would establish a system of compulsory medical care for the aged, with health care costs to be financed through higher Social Security taxes.

No matter how you sugar-coat the pill — we call it simply "a method of financing" — the proposal adds up to Socialized Medicine. Let's face it, if a bureau of the Federal Government is to administer health-care financing, then that bureau must also supervise the service — for "he who pays the piper calls the tune." And the calling of the tune won't stop with the aged. For, once the principal has been established, it is bound to be expanded until it covers us all.

LET'S HELP THOSE WHO NEED HELP. We all agree to this. And, as for the medical profession, our profession, service to those in need has always been its keystone.

Moreover, when it comes to medical aid for the aged, the concept of helping those who need help has already become law. A federal grant-in-aid program has been established for the needy and the near-needy — a program designed to be administered locally by locally determined beneficiaries. The benefits reach out to all of the aged who are in need — not merely to people who are covered by Social Security. And because

this program is voluntary, based on need alone, all of the aged who don't need help can stay independent.

So, what's at stake if we should choose compulsory health care (Socialized Medicine) for this or any other segment of our population?

YOUR FREEDOM IS AT STAKE. Freedom is what we all stand to lose. Your freedom to choose the doctor you believe is best for you. And your doctor's freedom — his freedom to treat you in an individual way, adapting his knowledge and skills to your particular problems.

These freedoms are bound to be lost when the Federal Government enters the privacy of the examination room — controlling both standards of practice and the choice of practitioner.

And lost with these freedoms will be one of the basic principles of our responsibility to you. A principle expressed in the physician's pledge — "I will hold in confidence all that my patient confides in me."

There can be no confidence with impersonal third-party control replacing a voluntary relationship. When the doctor is socialized, his patient is socialized as well.

THE CRITICAL DECISION on the question of Socialized Medicine will be made in Congress. If you agree with us that preserving the freedoms of medical service is vital, then write to your Senators and Congressmen. Join us in telling them that Socialized Medicine is not for Americans — that free men and free institutions are competent to solve tomorrow's problems as yesterday's were solved . . . that medical aid for the aged can be supplied without resorting to Federal control.

City Marshal Quits; New Court Planned

Cranz Nichols, Jr., who has served as city marshal here since last August, has resigned the place effective June 15.

Members of the City Council in accepting the resignation Tuesday night voted to hold a called meeting next Monday night to consider naming a successor to Nichols.

The marshal's job pays \$200 monthly. No car expense has been included with the salary.

Councilmen also went on record Tuesday night as favoring the establishing of a corporation court to handle infractions within the municipality. Alderman L. F. Foster was appointed to confer with Gaston Swafford, Clyde attorney, in regard to the necessary legal procedure to setting up the tribunal.

It was not immediately decided whether or not the judge to preside over a city court would be elected or appointed.

"This is only one of the many problems now being pondered," said Mayor Ted Souder. Nichols, a retired Air Force

officer, has not announced his plans for the future, however, he has said to friends that he does not plan to leave Cross Plains.

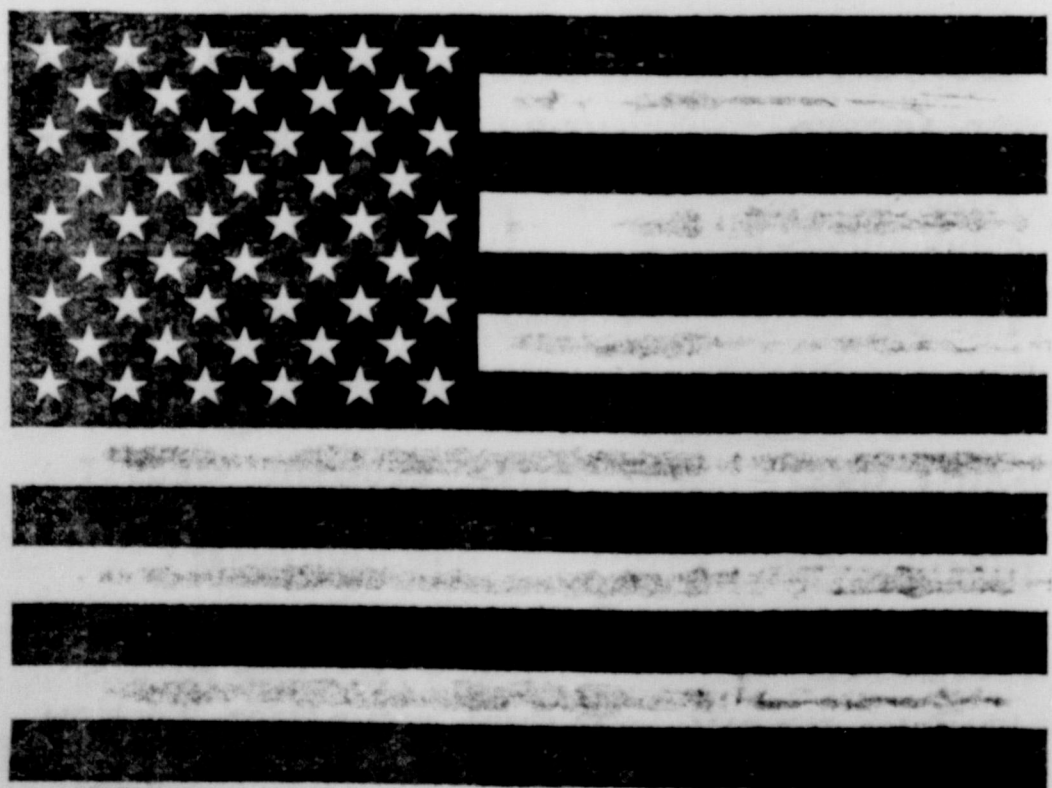

Remodeling work on Callahan County jail is reported moving forward with exceptional rapidity and the building is expected to be restored to use by possibly August 1.

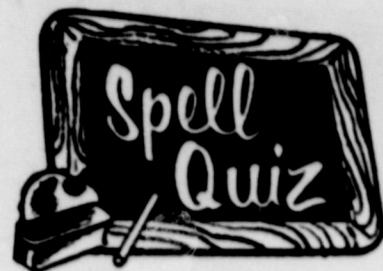
Prisoners are currently boarded in the Taylor County jail at Abilene at a cost of \$1.25 per day to this county.
