Local Officer Helps Nab 2 Jail Breakers

Bart Thomas Made City Marshal Here

Bart Thomas was named City Marshal by the City Council in special session Thursday afternoon. He has succeeded Cranz Nichols, Jr., who resigned after almost a year as a local peace officer.

Salary of the marshal remains at \$200 monthly, however, plans are to make adjustments if installation of a city court justifies. Thomas was chosen from 10 applicants for the place.

Local Watermelons To Be Top Quality

A check with watermelon growers of the Cross Plains area yesterday revealed that acreage planted to that crop is smaller than normal. Melons are reported maturing well, though, and quality is expected to be high. It will be the latter part of July before most melons begin to ripen.

Cantaloupes are also reported doing well in this area.

Water Consumption Below Normal Level

Water consumption in Cross Plains for the week ending Sunday remained below the normal level. Reduced usage is said to have resulted from recent rains eliminating the need for lawn irrigation.

Whereas normal consumption at this time of the year is about a million gallons weekly, only 547,000 was used last week.

Total pumpings by days were: June 11, 84,000 gallons; June 12, 61,000 gallons; June 13, 72,000 gallons; June 14, 85,000 gallons; June 15, 85,000; June 16, 89,000 and June 17, 71,000.

Summer Busy Season For School Maintenance Crew

Although no classes are being held on Cross Plains school campus during the summer months, work of preparing for opening of the new term in September is moving at a rapid pace.

Scheduled repair and maintenance work during the summer includes repainting the outside of the gymnasium, some retouching inside the building, repainting and reconditioning 11 rest rooms, refinishing stage in the auditorium, repainting halls and walls in the high school and elementary school buildings, repairing all damaged desks and maintaining nearly five acres of lawn, including the football field. This

work is being done by E. H. Oliver and Eddie Champion. O. B. Switzer, school mechanic, is being kept busy reconditioning school vehicles, which includes 12 buses. One has been completely repainted and reupholstered and others are scheduled for similar projects.

In addition to overseeing maintenance work, Supt. Paul Whitton is at his desk early each day, arranging for meetings of the equalization board, making computations for a new budget, filing reports to state and federal agencies pertaining to the school lunchroom and next year's agenda.

No faculty resignations have been received by the board of trustees and none is expected.

\$6,115 Contract Closed For New Band Uniforms

Although a financial campaign stalled \$700 short of a goal set by the Band Boosters Club, 80 new uniforms have been ordered for Cross Plains High School band.

Delivery of the suits is scheduled for Sept. 1. Order was placed this week with a San Antonio concern. Contract calls for the Sept. 1

delivery date or the manufacturer to pay the local school \$25 for each day of delay thereafter.

Rumor Wrong; No Ape Caught Here

Reports that a large chimpanzee was recently caught in a trap near Burkett are unconfirmed. Persons in position to know there say the report is completely erroneous.

A Review writer visited Burkett over the week end and talked with 20 residents of that area. Only reports heard there were of a monkey or ape being caught in a trap near Cross Plains.

"Nothing like that happened around here," said several veteran citizens sitting around Evans Garage Friday afternoon.

Reports of the chimpanzee being trapped at various places spread after local citizens, including peace officers, saw what appeared to be ape tracks at the Leo Smith place, one mile north of Cross Plains, last week. Smith said that something had frightened his dogs from home the night before the tracks were found the following morning.

Reports were also heard here that an ape had been killed at Coleman. This, too, was unconfirmed. Police there knew nothing of such a happening. Neither did newsmen.

Publishers Will Learn Saturday How Review Fared In Contests

Publishers of the Review have been advised by the Texas Press Association that the Cross Plains newspaper is a prize winner in statewide contests, the results of which are to be announced at an awards breakfast in Corpus Christi Saturday morning.

No information has yet been received here telling in which of the five divisions the Review scored high. Complete results are never divulged until final day of the press association's annual convention. The publication was entered, however, in general excellence, appearance, news pictures and three writing events: news stories, column writing and editorials. The general excellence winner is determined by the paper scoring the greatest number of points in the other five divisions. By taking first in col-

umn writing and second in editorial writing last year, the Review finished runner-up in general excellence to the State Line Tribune at Farwell.

The Review competes in a class composed of newspapers published in towns of less than 2,000 population.

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Soil Conservationist Explains Values Of Replanting Grasses

By D. C. Cox

"Increasing numbers of farmers and ranchmen are becoming interested in planting or re-seeding their lands to grass," says D. C. Cox, Work Unit Conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service Work Unit. Recent plantings that have been made with adapted seed of good quality and put out with the right kind of equipment have been successful in about all instances.

Many are interested in planting old fields that have been turned out of cultivation. Most of these are being planted to a mixture of native grasses on prepared seedbeds. Some are trying a new method for this area, seeding in a thin stand of small grain where blowing is a problem in establishing grass seedlings. "This promises to be one of the better methods," Cox said. The grain is mowed or shredded in the boot or early head stage and not allowed to

mature seed or to compete excessively for shade and moisture.

Planting grass on rangeland following brush control is a popular practice. Most of it is done following tree dozing, root raking or rootplowing.

Seeding in the holes and disturbed areas following tree dozing has been successful when done thoroughly and seed are placed in the disturbed areas. This is one of the least expensive methods for adding better grasses to existing stands. Planting the seed immediately after the ground is disturbed and before a rain is essential. The first rain melts the colds to cover the seed and the plant starts growth when soil warms.

When the existing grass stand is poor and it is desirable to seed the entire area, a root-rake or roller chopper is used to disturb the soil and prepare the seedbed. Regular farm equipment such as a chisel type plow or tandem disc may be used where rocks, brush or stumps do not prohibit. Seeding rangeland without some type of soil disturbance has not been successful.

Rootplowing creates a seedbed that in most instances must be modified on anchor chains, pipe drags and rolling packers or choppers. Some ranchmen prefer to use the root rake and pile the brush in order to leave the area smooth enough to spray or mow for weed control later if necessary. In this case, seed are planted at time root taking is done.

Resting the grass on the seeded area during the first growing season is a must for early establishment. After light grazing during the winter, a second rest the next growing season is often desirable. The young grass seedlings need a chance to establish a deep and vigorous root system and to produce viable seed as soon as possible. Practicing proper range use by removing no more than half of each year's growth will insure a vigorous plant with a long productive life.

Weed control is frequently needed and the planting can be sprayed when weeds offer damaging competition for moisture and sunlight. Care should be exercised to spray a recommended rate, according to local and State laws, and after the grass plants have developed three to five leaves. Some plantings can be successfully mowed or shredded for weed control. In all cases grass plantings need to have good management and each planting generally presents need for special treatment, based upon existing conditions.

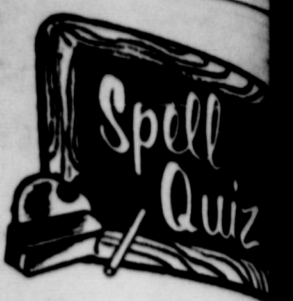

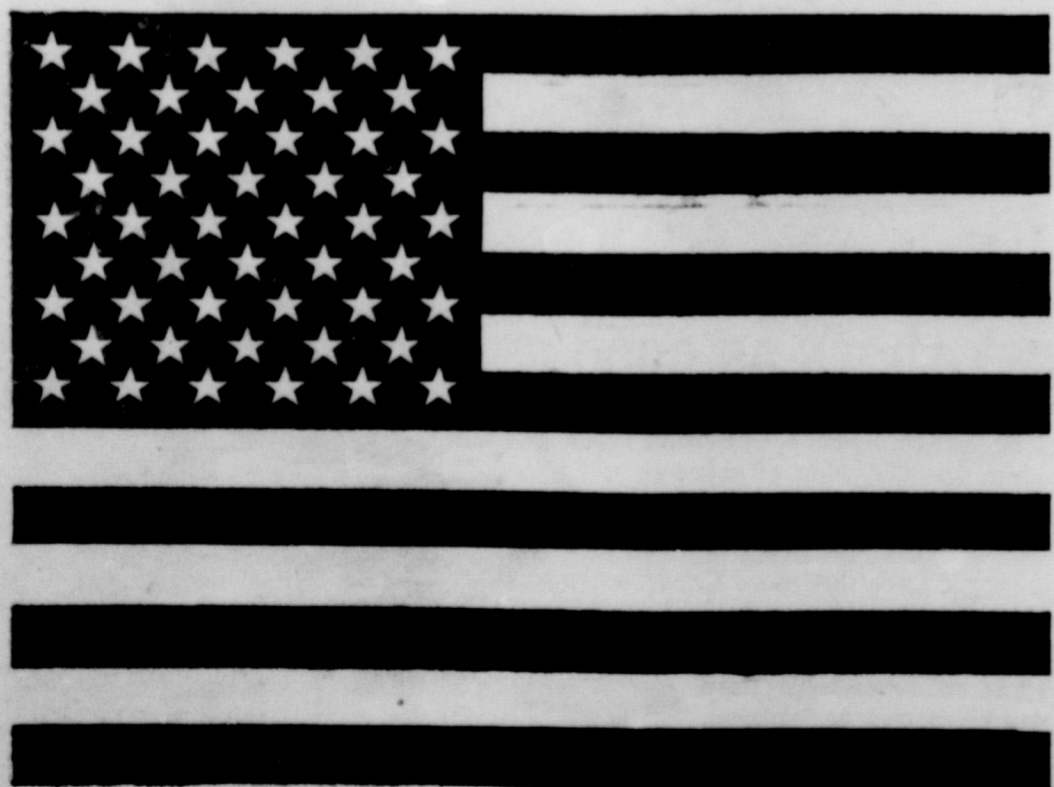
