In choosing the all-star squad, no manager or coach was permitted to vote for a member of his team.

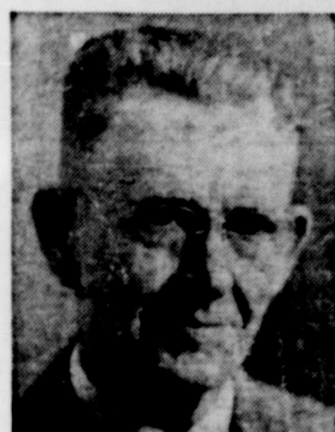

Funeral service for I. N. Riley, 75, prominent local merchant, was held from the First Methodist Church in Cross Plains last Thursday afternoon at 2:30, with Rev. Charles J. McAfee, pastor, officiating. Assisting was Rev. H. V. Falkner, local Baptist minister.

Burial was in the family plot at Millersview, southeast of Paint Rock in Concho County. Interment services were under direction of Higginbotham Funeral Home of this city.

Mr. Riley died about 3:30 Wednesday morning of last week in the Reagan County Hospital at Big Lake. He suffered a stroke here April 8 and was for a time hospitalized at Shandon Memorial in San Angelo. He was never able to return to his home in Cross Plains after suffering the initial stroke.

Born Aug. 13, 1886, in Guadalupe County, he married Chloa Cronkright Sept. 19, 1917, at McAllen. They moved from Brownwood to Cross Plains nine years ago. Mr. Riley had owned the Piggly Wiggly Store here since that time.

## Raymond DeBusk Meets Man For Whom He Spent \$ Million

Raymond DeBusk, local rancher and cattle buyer, has bought more than a million dollars worth of calves for a Kentucky man in the past nine years. The two had never met, however, until last week. All business had been handled by telephone and mail.

"You can't do that much business with a man and not wonder what he looks like and things like that," DeBusk says, "so you can imagine my delight when my telephone rang and he asked that I meet him at the Abilene airport the following day at 8:30 a.m."

Although neither man resembled the other's conception of him, recognition was rapid and they set out for a busy day.

The Kentuckian had plane reservations to leave from the same airport at 4:50 that afternoon. Before departure time, however, the two journeyed to Jim Nail's ranch near Albany and closed a deal for 1,000 weaning calves at a total consideration of about \$125,000.

"My purchases have been only a part of the cattle this man buys every year," DeBusk says, "and it was nice to hear him say that calves from this

## DENTON VALLEY AREA GETS SHALLOW OILER

L. A. Warren, et al, of Abilene completed No. 2 Scott-Barton as a regular field producer eight miles southwest of Baird. It is in Section 9, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 23 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil, pumping from 20 perforations at 1,157-1,161 feet. Casing was set at 1,208 feet, with the hole bottomed at 1,209.

Fire which broke out in rear of the Phillips 66 Station on Highway 36, in the west part of town, shortly before 10 o'clock Monday night destroyed the building and did damage estimated in excess of \$44,000.

Bill Dillard, manager of the business was servicing a customer when the blaze was detected. It is believed to have originated from gasoline which had spilled from bulk pumps. Fire spread rapidly to oil and grease storage and a conflagration quickly developed. Dillard was unable to combat the blaze and while he was alerting the fire department, a pick-up truck, parked nearby, was also ignited.

### 3 Units Utilized.

Both units from Cross Plains fire department answered the alarm as did one from Rising Star. In what observers generally agreed was a spectacular demonstration of fire-fighting efficiency, they contained the blaze, preventing its spreading to the Sister's Truck Stop Cafe, operated by Harry Dodds, and to the Joe H. Higgins home. Both places, the cafe on the east and the dwelling to the west, were temporarily imperiled.

Flames roared more than 50 feet high and caused interruption of electric power. Traffic moving along Highway 36 was detoured for nearly an hour.

The station building was owned by Harlowe Oil Company of Brownwood. Contents, fixtures and equipment were owned by

N. M. Dillard. Howard Harlowe said Tuesday only a portion of his firm's capital outlay of \$32,000 was covered by insurance. Dillard's inventory of approximately \$12,000 was also only partially covered.

### Vehicles Damaged.

Two vehicles, parked near the station, also suffered damage. Both owners are oil field workers, who had gone on tour in other conveyances. Lewis Fortune's pick-up was badly scorched, two tires ruined and upholstery burned. Slightly further away from the blaze, an automobile owned by Pat Erwin was also damaged, however, less seriously.

Observers described the fire as one of the hottest seen here in many years.

Imperiling firemen as they combated the blaze were high tension electric wires leading to West Texas Utilities sub-station across the street, a butane tank in one of the vehicles and numerous containers of petroleum products.

The unit from Rising Star arrived on the scene in less than 18 minutes after receiving the call and fought alongside vehicles and men of the local volunteer company.

A tourist traveling along Highway 36, who stopped to watch efforts to extinguish the blaze, expressed what appeared to be consensus of viewers when he said of local firemen: "A big city company couldn't have done a better job."

## Rabies Outbreak Being Watched In Oplin Area

An outbreak of rabies in western Callahan County, said to be approaching epidemic proportions, is being closely watched by veterinarians.

Dr. B. C. Roberson, Abilene veterinarian at whose office a rabid dog died, said: "The rabies situation is the worst I have seen in 18 years here."

Unconfirmed reports say that a rabid cow or horse at Oplin caused 10 persons to undergo inoculations for the disease.

Although there is a difference of opinion as to whether the current situation constitutes an epidemic, authorities agree that rabies is extremely dangerous and proves fatal to humans if left untreated.

## Harris Cautions Wheat Producers

Farmers themselves are responsible for making sure they receive the sedimentation premium to which they are entitled under the price-support program for 1962-crop hard wheat, Tommie Harris, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, cautions.

Sedimentation instead of premium for premium purposes is being adopted for 1962 under the price-support program for the hard wheats as a part of the Department of Agriculture's effort to upgrade the overall quality of hard wheat produced in this country.

Where wheat is delivered for a warehouse-storage loan, the farmer himself must request that the test be made and, if he thinks he has premium wheat, he should make sure that his warehouse receipt or other documents show the proper sedimentation value, Harris emphasized.

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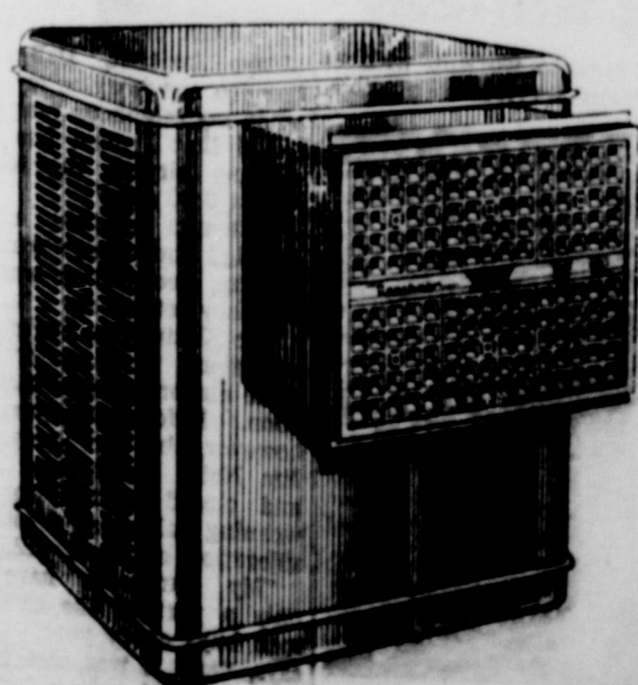
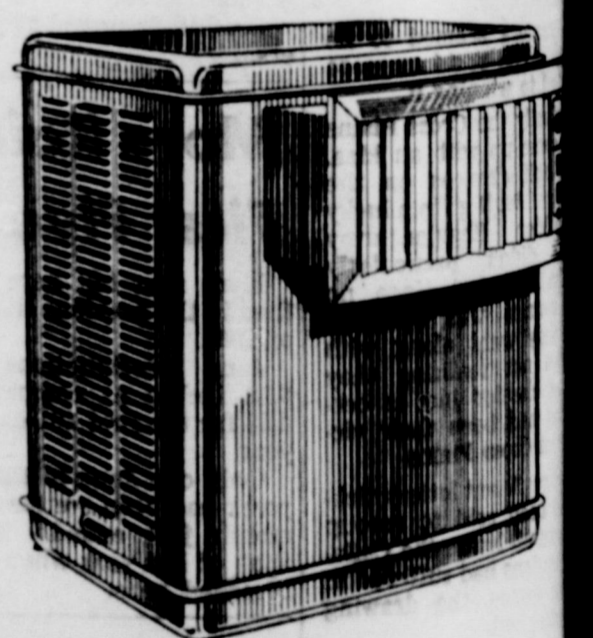
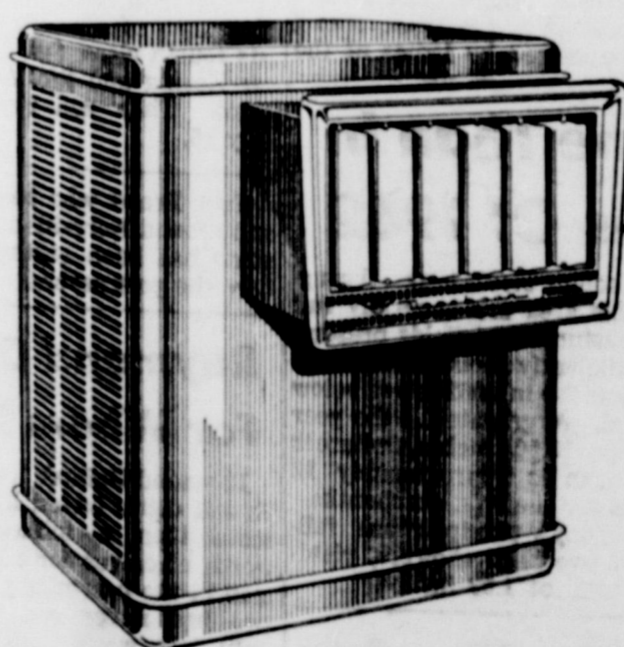

Best of all, though, was your eulogy to the women of the town. Of course, I knew that women helpers were numerous over town but had never thought of them being as prevalent as you pointed out.

I am by no means the first individual to employ lady help in a business enterprise but I carry the distinction of being the only man who was ever fired from management of a business by a board of directors for hiring a lady bookkeeper.

There is no essential difference between the mental power of men and women, given equal opportunities and encouragement. This may yet be a woman's world, and I have no hesitancy in worshipping at their shrine.



## News of Former Citizens

Claude Brown of McCamey, former Cross Plains area oil man, is 25th District Committeeman of the Democratic Party in Texas.

Former Cross Plains pastor, Rev. David L. Rauppius recently filled the pulpit at Great Neck Methodist Church, Great Neck, Long Island, N. Y. His parents are members of that congregation. The Rev. Mr. Rauppius was enroute to conference at University Park, Iowa.

R. B. McGowen, who formerly attended school at Cross Plains and Dressy, is now district attorney at Monahans. In this capacity he was focused into national attention last week as the prosecutor of Billie Sol Estes.

Regarding his role, the Dallas News published the following: Dist. Atty. R. B. McGowen, thrust suddenly into the national limelight by the Billie Sol Estes trial, is a friendly, soft-spoken young prosecutor who was graduated from law school only six years ago.

He became district attorney for Ward, Reeves and Loving Counties a year ago last January.

At the age of 33, he is pitted against one of the shrewdest, most respected and experienced lawyers in the state, John D. Cofer, who represents Estes.

But McGowen apparently was stunned less than anyone else by Cofer's decision to put Estes on trial immediately for felony theft involving a mortgage on anhydrous ammonia (liquid fertilizer) tanks.

The conviction of Estes would result in a 2-to-10 year prison term for him—and national prominence for McGowen.

"I was surprised," McGowen admitted when questioned about Cofer's move for a speedy trial. "But I was not caught unprepared. My best guess, of course, was that Cofer would ask for a delay—but I believe the state should be ready when an indictment is returned. When a case is on the docket, we take care of both alternatives."

Cofer obviously feels the case is the weakest filed against Estes thus far and recognizes the psychological impact an acquittal would have in favor of his client.

"We feel we have a case," said McGowen, "or we wouldn't have indicted him."

McGowen's lean face is topped by closely-cut brown hair. His light blue eyes sparkle when he jumps up to challenge the validity of a question being asked by Estes' attorneys.

He looks more like a rancher than an attorney, but he already has proved himself in one highly publicized case.

Several months ago at Waxahachie, he secured the conviction of Oscar Kernohan for a triple murder in Pecos after a change of venue was granted. Kernohan, who was represented by Ellis County Judge Melvin Hartsfield and Billy Colvin of Ennis, was sentenced to three separate 99-year terms.

McGowen was born in Santa Anna and reared in Monahans, where his late father was in the real estate and insurance business. His mother teaches school in Monahans now.

McGowen spent five years in the insurance business there after earning a business administration degree and an Army Reserve commission from Texas A&M in 1949.

He was married the same year and he and his wife now have two sons, ages 11 and 9.

"I had to work for five years to save up enough money to go to law school," said McGowen.

He received his law degree from the University of Texas in 1956. His successful race for district attorney in 1960 was his first venture into politics. Although unwilling to concede that the current case against Estes is weak, McGowen indicated he feels the federal cases against him probably are stronger—partly because federal law "is more streamlined".

Cofer challenged McGowen's right to try Estes, at the start of the trial Monday, on the grounds that his law firm represents Pacific Finance Co. in a civil suit against Estes. The chattel mortgage involved in this trial was assigned to Pacific but Dist. Judge J. H. Starley overruled Cofer on that point.

McGowen has a law firm partnership with Holt Magee of Monahans.

(McGowen's role as an attorney for Pacific Finance was

also brought up in Washington Tuesday by Dallas lawyer Frank Cain, in appearance before Rep. L. H. Fountain's House subcommittee. Rep. Fountain expressed surprise to Cain that "this man now engaged in the criminal prosecution of Estes was the same one hired by you in civil practice."

(But Cain answered that it was common practice in small Texas towns for district attorneys to be retained in outside matters. McGowen was hired, in his legal capacity, to check on Estes' financial situation and furnish information to Pacific Finance, Cain said.

(Cain said he figured McGowen was still on the payroll since "I was the one who hired him and I never told him to quit.")

Atty. Gen. Will Wilson, surprised by the sudden decision to try Estes, said Monday he had not been asked for assistance by the district attorney. McGowen is being assisted only by Reeves County Atty. Darrell Glover.

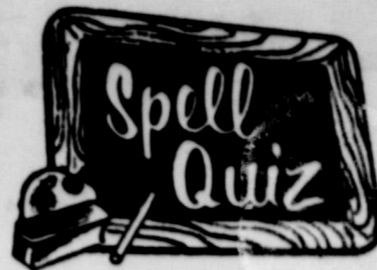
"We feel that this is strictly a Reeves County matter," McGowen said when asked about Wilson's comment.
