## Bryan Bennett In Race For County Job As Republican

Bryan Bennett, long-time resident of the Cross Plains and Cottonwood areas has entered the race for county commissioner of precinct four on the Republican ticket. Hereunder he makes a formal appeal for support of the electorate at the general election to be held Nov. 3. Bennett was nominated by members of his party here in May in the first GOP primary ever held in Cross Plains. His formal statement follows: "After long and studious consideration and following my nomination as a candidate for County Commissioner on the Republican ticket, I have decided to wage an active campaign for this office and beg serious consideration of my qualifications and general fitness for this post of great responsibility. "I am a life-long resident of the Cross Plains-Cottonwood area, with the exception of a few short periods of employment elsewhere and a tenure of three years with the United States Navy during World War I. "I have had six years experience operating maintainers, dozers, graders and other types of machinery on the roads of Precinct 4, serving under three different commissioners. I helped to build and maintain many bridges in the precinct and feel completely competent to operate or supervise any type of equipment now being utilized on roads of our area. I have also had experience with construction equipment on military projects and in the Putnam precinct. "I am completely aware of the fact that Callahan County Com-

missioners Court is charged with responsibility of overseeing and administering various phases of county government, serving much as a board of directors. Actually, total monies received and dispersed by the county each year, make it one of the major business enterprises within the boundaries of Callahan County. ## .61 Inch Rain Falls Here As Deluge Hits Nearby

Torrential showers fell over the Cross Plains area Monday morning, flooding some streams and dropping temperature 17 degrees in 20 minutes. In Cross Plains the precipitation measured only .61. Other areas, however, reported much

more. Cottonwood got 2.32, Putnam 1.41, Cross Cut 1.40, Atwell 2.30, Pioneer 2.20, Sabanno 1.00, Rowden 2.06 and Rising Star 3.00. Between Cross Cut and Brownwood Lake even heavier fall was reported. Some placed it as high as four inches.

Farmers and ranchers welcomed the moisture as a boon to growing crops. Peanuts were particularly helped. Pasture grass, which was suffering for need of moisture was revived. In the Cross Cut area, where some stock tanks were not fill-

ed during June rains, most all ponds were reported running around spillways. Various thermometers revealed a quick drop in temperature here Monday morning as the rain and moisture laden wind, estimated at 30 miles an hour, blew in.

Water consumption dropped drastically in Cross Plains Tuesday, indicating that air-conditioning was not being widely used and that lawn watering had temporarily stopped. Water pumpings had been running consistently more than 125,000 gallons daily until the rain came. Total pumpings Tuesday were reported at only 78,000 gallons.

Just ahead of the rain Cross Plains had experienced two days of 100 degree temperature. These readings were taken from a large thermometer at the C. F. Newton Service Station at the corner of Main and 8th Street. Cross Plains has yet to experience 100 plus temperature this year, according to that gauge, believed to be accurate and installed near Weather Bureau specifications.

Total rainfall received in Cross Plains thus far this year, according to S. F. Bond, official observer, has been 11.61 inches. June, which brought 6.22 inches, has been the wettest month this far.

## Bill Bounds Dies In Coleman Friday

W. F. (Bill) Bounds, retired Cross Plains barber, died in the Overall-Morris Memorial Hospital at Coleman Friday night at 10:30, following an illness of several days.

Mr. Bounds, 76, who had lived in a Coleman rest home three months, became seriously ill last week.

Born March 16, 1886, in Mississippi, he married Bertha Hale in 1924, in Cisco. They moved to Cross Plains that year. She survives and is a patient in a Big Spring hospital.

Services were at 3 p.m. Sunday from the First Baptist Church in Cross Plains with the Rev. Don Turner, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Cross Plains Cemetery, directed by Higginbotham Funeral Home.

Other survivors are a son, Willard of Lovington, N. M.; a daughter, Mrs. Euel Jones of Fort Stockton; a brother, A. H. of Memphis, Tenn., and seven grandchildren.

Immediate plans for the store include additional fixtures and an enlarged stock of merchandise, the Review was told.

Personnel at the store will remain unchanged, all present employees remaining, however, Buddy McCorkle of Bangs will be transferred here as manager. He, his wife and small daughter are expected in Cross Plains next week.

## 105 Screwworm Cases In County Cattle Herds

Although 105 cases of screwworms among Callahan County cattle herds have been definitely confirmed by scientists at Mission, engaged in a project to eradicate the expensive pest, County Agent Travis Allen reports less than the normal number of infections.

Sterile flies, bred to mate with females and thus prevent propagation of screwworm carriers, have been released in Comanche and Brown Counties. If sufficient cases of screwworms are known to exist in Callahan

County a quantity of sterile flies will be released here soon, Allen says.

"It is important that every livestockman who finds a case of worms, believe to be screwworms, bottle a small quantity of the parasite and mail them to scientists at Mission," Allen stated.

Containers for mailing the worms are available at the following places in this county: Odom's Restaurant and Neal Drug in Cross Plains, both grocery stores in Oplin, Gary's Store at Rowden, Farmers Co-Op in Clyde, White's Food Store in Putnam, and the county agent's office, ASC headquarters and county judge's office in the courthouse at Baird.

"The statewide screwworm eradication program is already helping," Allen said, "and will become more effective as time passes. Usually by this time of year there are many times as many cases among livestock herds of the county as now exist."

# City Dads Up Tax Renditions \$18,650

Cross Plains City Council sat as a board of equalization Tuesday night and made a number of changes in existing renditions on tax rolls.

Persons with property involved in the alterations will be notified and given an opportunity to appear before the council to give evidence why the raise should not be made.

New construction within the corporate limits, placed on the tax rolls Tuesday night, totaled \$14,850. This was mainly on dwellings built prior to Jan. 1.

Thirty eight hundred dollars was added to old renditions in what the council described as equitable equalizations.

Total tax renditions for the city before the Tuesday night meeting were \$705,058.83. With \$18,650 added in the equalization session, the total assessment for the municipality is now \$723,708.83. Of this amount, \$210,038.83 is on personal property, \$512,620 is on real estate and \$1,050 on the supplementary roll.

The city levies \$1.50 taxes on the \$100 valuation. One hundred per cent collections from present assessments would run \$10,578.67 annually.
