## 30 New Lakes Advocated For Area From Burkett To Clyde

Long range plans for soil conservation and possible water reservoirs for Clyde and Burkett were discussed at a meeting in the City Hall in Cross Plains Monday afternoon, attended by 30 persons from five nearby cities.

Weldon Edwards, secretary of Central Colorado Soil Conservation District, presided and introduced E. J. Hughes of Brownwood, area soil conservationist, who explained purpose of the gathering was to familiarize political subdivisions with potentials of a plan now under consideration which would include the building of 30 dams along the watershed of Pecan Bayou.

**Clyde Reservoir**  
Members of the Clyde city council and interested individuals of that city were present and questioned Hughes regarding ways and means of securing a municipal water supply for that Callahan County town.

It was pointed out that when a retention dam is built by the Soil Conservation Service, regulations permit a municipality joining in the project and raising and broadening dams as a means of holding more water. Paul Kenner, Brownwood SCS engineer, roughly estimated that on a normal \$100,000 retention dam, a municipality could serve its purpose by bearing the additional expense of about \$20,000 to \$25,000.

"Many things would enter into it," he said "and that estimate is merely an educated guess, not an accurate figure."

Mayor Ted Souder and four members of Cross Plains city council were in attendance and sought information similar to that of Clyde.

**Utilize Retention Dam**  
Souder asked SCS men whether they believed it would be more economical for Cross Plains to seek a new site and

start from the beginning to build a lake, or to negotiate for raising the dam on one of the 12 structures now going up.

The answer to this was that it is doubtful if another suitable site exists on the watershed of Turkey Creek near enough to Cross Plains to be practical.

"My quick opinion," said Hughes, "is that raising an existing dam would be less expensive."

He pointed out, however, that additional easements would be required for land to be inundated. That would be an obligation of the municipality.

"Our experience, though, is that most land owners are willing to swap land for water and this might not pose a difficult problem," he said.

Mark Adair, chairman of the Turkey Creek Water Control District told of progress on 12 retention dams being built in this area and expressed gratifi-

cation of results thus far.

**Damsite 12 Possibility**

Charley Coats, director of the Turkey Creek district, said he felt if the city of Cross Plains wished to utilize one of the lakes south of town as a reservoir that it might be arranged.

Hughes pointed out that 253 acre feet of water will be retained at site 12, south of town. This on land owned by Mrs. Porter J. Davis of Brownwood.

**30 Dams Proposed**

Most talk at the meeting Monday afternoon centered on the 30 proposed damsites to be built northwest of Burkett to a point just northwest of Clyde.

Eldon M. Knox and A. J. Young, ranchers in that area, expressed interest in seeing a work plan started.

Knox is a former chairman of Central Colorado Soil Conservation District and explained that it would be necessary for that organization to join with Brown-

Mills Soil Conservation District to get actual work started.

**Tour Local Project**

Following the meeting in the City Hall, D. C. Cox of the Baird office of the Soil Conservation Service and Coats led the group to a damsite being built on the Oliver D. Worthy place, two miles north of Cross Plains.

Members of the Clyde city council viewed the project and quizzed SCS men on the possibilities of an even larger reservoir being located near their city as a possible municipal water supply.

## Former Local Man Killed As Cars Hit

William Albert Elliott, 79, a former Cross Plains resident and kinsman of a number of persons in this area, was killed Thursday in a two-car automobile accident near Sweetwater.

Mrs. J. R. Woodfin of Winters, about 57, was critically injured. Driver of the car she was in was Mrs. W. F. Phelps, Jr., of Winters. Her daughter, Carolyn Jean, 13, was a passenger. Mr. Elliott was alone in his car.

The injured were taken to a Sweetwater hospital.

Mrs. Woodfin was listed in critical condition with compound wrist and leg fractures, a possible skull fracture and multiple bruises and contusions.

Mrs. Phelps and her daughter were described by hospital attendants as being in "moderate" condition. Both are suffering from abrasions and lacerations.

Mr. Elliott, who lived in Sweetwater, had a farm near Nolan.

The Winters residents were headed for Hale Center and Elliott was enroute to his farm when they collided head on. Sgt. P. J. Butler, and Patrolman Ernest Humberson of the highway patrol investigated the

accident. Mr. Elliott was born in Cross Plains Dec. 1, 1882, and had lived in Nolan County 54 years. He was married in Cross Plains Sept. 16, 1903, to Myrtle Harlow.

Funeral was held Friday at 4 p.m. in the Lamar Street Church of Christ at Sweetwater. Paul Rogers and Abe Lincoln officiated. Burial was in the Slater's Chapel Cemetery at Nolan.

Survivors include the wife; a son, Glynn Elliott of Sweetwater; a daughter, Mrs. J. R. Richardson of Sweetwater; three grandchildren, four great-grandchildren; three sisters, Mrs. Luther Finch of Nolan, Mrs. Cora Robbins of Bakersfield, Calif., and Mrs. Lillian Ensminger of Houston; and two brothers, Edgar of Hico and Lloyd of Austin.

## Stores Of County Selling \$ Seven Million Annually

With final figures now in, it appears that Callahan County was a stronger market than most in the past year.

Despite the fact that the year was somewhat less than a record-breaker in the United States as a whole, the local area was able to turn in a good performance.

Personal incomes per family and gross volume in the county's retail stores were at a high level.

The facts and figures are revealed in a new, copyrighted "Survey of Buying Power," compiled by Sales Management. It analyzes markets in all sections of the country.

It shows that residents of Callahan County had net earnings in the year, after taking care of their taxes, in the amount of \$10,938,000, topping the 1960 figure of \$10,265,000.

In terms of the family unit, this was equal to \$4,051 per household, found by dividing the dollar total by the number of households.

With that much money available for discretionary spending, they were in a position to give retail business a good boost. Not until the latter part of the year,

however, after throwing off the effects of the 1960-61 recession, did the buying surge reach its full stride.

Vigorous spending in the last quarter was more than enough to compensate for the hesitancy shown in the previous months.

As a result, Callahan County's retail merchants were able to report a sales volume for the year of \$7,131,000, as against their 1960 total of \$7,057,000. The rise, which amounted to 1.0 per cent, compares with an 0.3 per cent drop in the United States and an 0.2 per cent rise in the West South Central States.

With incomes continuing to improve throughout most of the country, and with the cost of living remaining steady, a vigorous upsurge in the national economy is bound to take place, say the experts.

"When?" is the big question and that is something only the consumer can answer. To an extent, he is showing tendencies in that direction right now. He is buying more autos, more appliances and more new homes and he has in some time. And that he is doing so without going to the bottom of his sock.

The fortune was left by a Houston woman, who died June 18. She was a first cousin of the Wilcoxens.

Attorneys have advised that before the fortune is distributed inheritance taxes to federal and state governments will have to be settled. It is believed

here, however, that all claims against the estate will be disposed of by early next year and that bequests will follow shortly thereafter.

He was recently given life imprisonment in 29th District Court at Stephenville upon conviction as a habitual criminal. He was given 12 years in 42nd District Court on one of five break-ins at Baird.

Leggett admitted burglarizing these firms in the Callahan County seat town: Rocky Motor

Co., Jones-Franke Pontiac, the Chevrolet dealership there, Callahan County Farmers Cooperative and a Baird lumber company.

Leggett told newsmen that his first crime was committed at the age of 10. He said that he was taught the safe-cracking profession by men older and wiser in the trade.

"If I had my life to live over, I'd stick to the straight and narrow," Leggett said.

"The kitchen is a country in which there are always discoveries to be made," said a famous French chef. And, bride or matron, you've probably found that out!



Want to dress up that whipped cream pie? Run your potato peeler over a chocolate bar (almonds and all) and make fancy chocolate curls over the whipped cream topping.
