Everything was in readiness yesterday for the annual homecoming of former students and teachers of Pioneer schools scheduled Thursday. The event

is always held the day preceding the gathering of early-day Callahan Countians.

Officers of Pioneer Ex-Students Association are: Rev. Tom Flippin, president; W. T. McClure, vice-president and Mrs. Sam Eakin - nee Grace Curry - secretary and treasurer. They announce arrangements are being made to accommodate 300 people at this year's gathering.

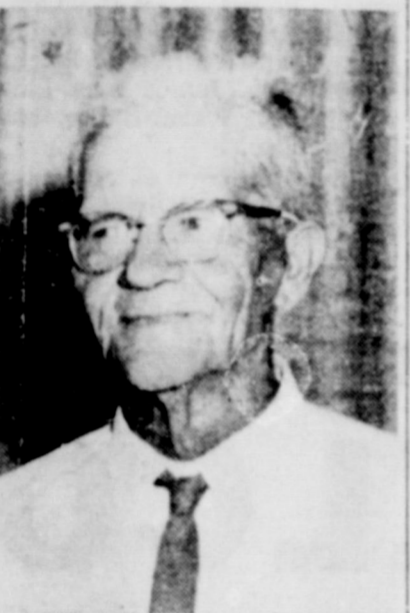
"We had over 200 last year and interest is currently much keener," Mrs. Eakin said.

A Brownwood catering concern will serve food at noon. The mid-day meal and day-long program will be under the Union Tabernacle at Pioneer. Arrangements have been made for the comfort and convenience of homecomers.

Formal program will begin Thursday morning at 9:30 and continue until about mid-afternoon.

Three doctors, all former Pioneer students, have announced they will be among this year's returnees. They are: Dr. Groom Sheppard of Lufkin, Dr. Charles Ballew of Cisco and Dr. Guy Lawton of San Antonio.

"We invite all friends and former citizens, whether they ever attended school at Pioneer or not, to come and spend the day with us," Mrs. Eakin said.

Street Parade To Open Pioneers Reunion Here

"When you and I were young, Maggie," might be the theme of a happy gathering in Cross Plains Friday.

It will be the 24th annual reunion of old settlers of Callahan County, which is expected to attract 2,000 people to the City Park, on the banks of Turkey Creek. The celebration will be launched with a street parade at 9 a.m. beginning on North Main and proceeding southward. Riding Clubs from Cross Plains, Baird, Rising Star and May will be in the procession.

There will be a well-arranged formal program, for which J. R. Black, Abilene attorney, will be the principal speaker, however, highlight of the day for most will be reunions with friends and schoolmates of long ago.

In contrast with other years when the event was held in Cross Plains, local stores will remain open this year. Visitors have complained of business establishments being shut and the inability to make necessary purchases. Most proprietors, however, will arrange for personnel to alternate in visiting the reunion grounds. Some business people will take picnic baskets and spread luncheon during the noon hour.

The reunion of Callahan County pioneers has become one of the best attended affairs of its kind in this section of Texas. Each year former residents return from distant points and Mrs. B. L. Boydston, secretary of the old settlers organization, reports correspondence indicates this year's celebration is attracting more than normal advance interest.

"There have been many communications inquiring about the date," she said, "I look for an unusually large crowd."

The principal speaker Friday was born at Abilene, son of District Judge J. R. Black of Abilene. He is one of West Texas' leading attorneys and a descendant of one of the early settling families in Callahan County.

"It is gratifying to have men of Mr. Black's calibre on our program, especially when they are native sons of this county," said W. Clyde White, a member of the program committee.

President of Callahan County Pioneers Association is Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Meade F. Griffin of Austin, a former Cottonwood resident.

Ottie Knight told the Review that there would also be square dancing at the reunion grounds Friday night, beginning at eight o'clock. A string band will play.

County And Community ASC Men Up For Election

An election to select county and community committeemen for the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee will be conducted by mail among farmers and ranchers. All ballots must be postmarked not later than Sept. 10.

To nominate a candidate for a county or community post, petitions of nomination must be presented at the ASC office on the second floor of the courthouse in Baird no later than Aug. 21. Persons so nominated will be included on the slate of candidates, if they express a willing-

ness to serve. The county committee may make such additional provisions as it deems advisable. Eligible voters who do not receive ballots may secure them by calling at the county office.

Questions on eligibility of both voters and candidates be settled by the county committee, subject to action of the state committee.

Community committees will serve areas identical to those of the county committee in Callahan County.

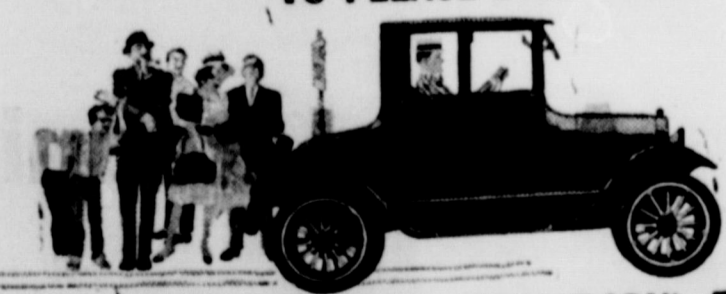

Review Staff Researches Answers To Questions Sent By Subscribers

In recent months the Cross Plains Review has received numerous pieces of mail, in which readers asked various and sundry questions of local nature.

After no little research answers to some of the questions are supplied hereunder.

Q. What has become of Cross Plains City Council's recent decision to establish a municipal court here?

A. The Council never definitely said that such a court would be set up, only that such a plan was being studied. Mayor Ted Souder explains that no official action has been taken. Chances appear about even that the status quo will be maintained.

Q. The Review recently published the amount of water contained in Brownwood Lake when full. Could you tell what the lake cost when built?

A. N. E. Trostle of Brown County Water District No. 1 supplies this data: "The lake

completed in 1932 cost \$2,241,268. Of this amount \$435,440 was paid for reservoir land, \$951,190 for the dam and clearing and \$329,720 for the main canal and \$524,918 for Irving canal. The dam is 1,580 feet long and water is 85 feet deep at its base."

Q. Could the City of Cross Plains sell additional bonds if voted by the people, to improve the local water and gas system?

A. Yes. The present indebtedness of the municipality is less than \$40,000 and the total taxable rendition is nearly three-quarters of a million dollars.

Q. When the treasurer of Callahan County publishes the regular quarterly financial statement, there is always shown an item "Callahan County Permanent School Fund" of about \$93,000. What is this fund, how did it come about and for what is it used?

A. This is money which has been earmarked for benefit of schools of this county since it's public lands were sold. The money cannot be spent, only the interest therefrom. It is an obligation of the commissioners court to keep the money invested in securities and apportion the earnings pro rata to school districts of the county. Every county was given public lands at the time of organization. Callahan County's grant was near where the city of Plainview is now located.

Q. In about 1946 an abnormal number of shooting stars were seen. Do you know the date and cause?

A. For an accurate answer to this question the Review contacted Oscar E. Monning of Fort Worth, one of the nation's best known amateur astronomers. His answer is published hereunder in full.

"On the night of Oct. 9, 1946, the earth passed through or near the orbit of Giacobini's Comet. Comets are named after their original discoverers and this one had been known for some years, at least since 1908 as I now recall. It was a periodic comet, returning to the vicinity of the sun and earth every 6½ years.

"It began to be noticed that when the earth passed near the orbit of this comet we ran into a group of meteors. This occurred only every other return, at 13-year intervals. I believe some meteors were noted in 1920, and I know there was a fair shower, seen especially in Greece, I think, in 1933.

"Computations showed that the orbit of the comet was being slowly changed by perturbations (the pulls of planets) and that in 1946 the earth would pass exceedingly close to its path near the time when the comet was there. I do not recall whether we were a little ahead of the comet or a little behind it. On the basis of the calculations, a meteor shower was predicted for the night of Oct. 9. Except for the interference of a full moon, it was one of the most gorgeous of such showers ever seen.

"The meteors are obviously

connected with the comet, and presumably represent disintegrated fragments thereof. They are probably more or less fluffy and composed of ices of simple substances with perhaps a few grains of solid materials like iron, nickel or silicates. You may think of it as 'dirty ice' or 'icy dust'. The meteors were called 'Giacobinids' or 'Draconids' (they seemed to radiate from the constellation Draco) and ended somewhat higher than normal, at about 100 miles. None fell to the ground, but all were evaporated in the upper atmosphere."
