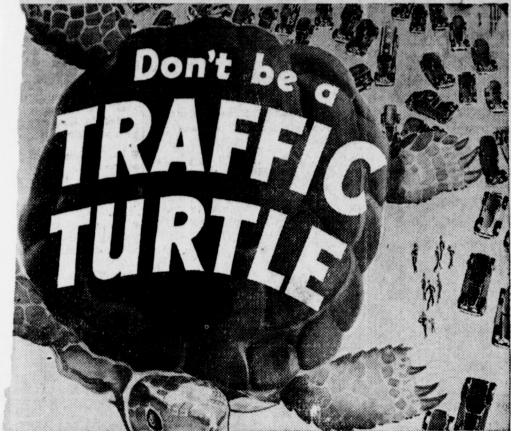

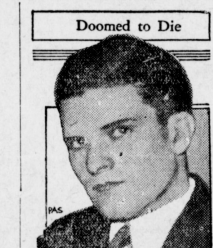

Rabies Prevalent In Winter Gives Danger To Humans

Austin, Jan. 8.—Rabies is commonly supposed to prevail only during the hot months, but it is in fact more prevalent in cold weather, declared Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. More dog bites occur from April to September, than from October to March in this climate, because dogs run abroad more freely at this season of the year, and many dogs are killed needlessly. However, the heads examined at the State Laboratory during the cool months show a higher number as having rabies.

Rabies is primarily a disease of dogs and in this way is transmitted to man. It is kept alive in Nature mainly by the dog and the dog family. Rabies in cats and skunks is comparatively rare and is but occasionally transmitted to man.

A basket dinner was served at noon. Rev. J. W. Hendrix, Methodist pastor at Littlefield, preached in the afternoon on Christian Education.

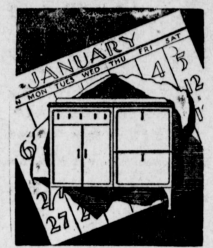

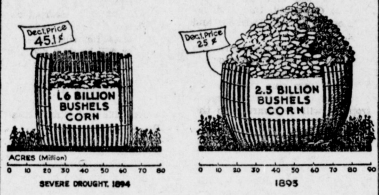
Strike "Black Gold" in Poor House Grounds

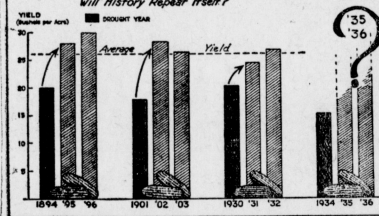

WILL HISTORY REPEAT ITSELF IN 1935?



EXCESSIVE production of corn may be expected in the fall of 1935 unless a large percentage of farmers agree to hold plantings for the year within reasonable limits. It is pointed out by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration. The normal response to severe, though temporary feed shortages and high feed prices occasioned by severe drought is a planting of a larger than average acreage to corn the following year. At the same time, yields per acre usually return to normal and a record crop with low feed prices results.

CORN YIELDS HAVE INCREASED FOLLOWING DROUGHT YEARS



A STUDY of the past reveals that corn yields have a pronounced tendency to return to normal or better following seasons of abnormally dry weather. As indicated by the shaded columns in the above graph, the production per acre after the three severe drought years of 1894, 1901, and 1930 rose from a low average of about 19.5 bushels to approximately the normal United States annual average of about 35 bushels per acre.

ELECTRIC LIGHT CHEAPER THAN CANDLELIGHT

An Electrical Experiment

A COMMUNITY seeking lower electric rates had a "Dime by Candlelight" campaign. This led to an experiment to determine the relative cost of candlelight and electric light. Several 10 inch candles were purchased at a price ranging from 5 to 13 cents each. These candles burned, on the average, 5 1/2 hours each at an average cost per candle of about 2 cents.

One Mazda Equals 50 Candles

Fifty of these candles would have been necessary to give the same illumination as a 50 watt Mazda lamp. At 10 cents per kilowatt hour for a 50 watt lamp for 5 1/2 hours would have cost about 2 1/2 cents. Fifty candles burning at a cost of 2 cents per hour, per candle, would mean a cost of \$1.00 per hour, or \$5.75 for 5 1/2 hours. This means that in this case Electric Light service was more than 200 times cheaper than candlelight service.

**Tuberculosis Test Of Cattle In This County Is Begun**

A campaign of tuberculosis testing of cattle in Bailey county was begun this week under supervision of Federal authority, with Dr. I. E. Barr, Lubbock, in charge.

Herds in all parts of the county will be tested, special attention being given to dairy breeds, including such bulls, all registered cattle of any breed, and some range cattle under certain conditions.

Where herds number 40 or less animals must be given the virus, from 40 to 100 head herds not less than 10 percent will be tested for the reaction, also, a certain percentage of herds numbering 100 head or more will be tested.

The work is being carried on without any cost to the stock owners, other than requests for their co-operation. Each owner will be duly notified when his stock will be inspected and his co-operation in having them in the pens on the named date is being urged. Work of this type is now being carried on all over this and other states in the Union.

Dr. Barr will have working under his direction eight veterinarians, each having a helper appointed from this county, and expects to be able to complete the work in about three weeks time.

It is stated this area of Texas is more free, generally speaking, of tuberculosis, than any other known section of the United States.
