## Schools Set Rapid Start

Superintendent of Schools Paul Whitton will alert 25 members of his faculty in a work session Thursday night to expect an enlarged enrollment Tuesday morning, as the local educational system opens its doors for the beginning of a new term.

"It's too early to be certain," he said, "but we could have as many as 550."

Total enrollment at the close of school in May was 520.

### Grade School Swells

Greatest increase in foreseen in elementary grades, where as many as 20 more may be accommodated. The first grade will be slightly smaller, school officials believe, with a class of about 40. Largest grade in the entire system will probably be the second with approximately 58.

An increase of possibly 10 is predicted in high school.

Members of the faculty and trustees will meet in the school cafeteria Thursday night at 7:30. Roy Grogan, prominent Weatherford attorney, will speak to the group. Following his address, teachers will repair to their respective buildings, where principals will explain schedules and opening day procedure.

### Fast Start

Plans are to begin Tuesday morning with full momentum, as though there had been no summer vacation. Pre-registration makes the first day of school a full instructional time with buses, lunchroom and all facilities geared to regular schedule. Opening time Tuesday morning is 8:10.

"Never have we approached the beginning of a term with more prior planning," Whitton said. "We solicit the cooperation of patrons and friends in making the 1962-63 school year the most profitable in history of this community."

### SCHOOL ENROLLMENT VARIES LITTLE HERE

Figures for the past 10 years indicate that school enrollment in Cross Plains fluctuates little.

Opening day enrollment next Tuesday is expected to be about 530.

## Putnam To Have It's Own 'Cocktail Party'

Putnam was this week added to the list of Callahan County communities scheduled to hold "cocktail parties" Sunday afternoon, Sept. 16, as people are urged to drink Sabin oral vaccine as a safeguard against polio.

The "feeding station" there will be under sponsorship of the Community Club with Mrs. Grady Pruet serving as chairman-coordinator. The Putnam station plans to be open from two until five p.m.

Cross Plains and Baird will be open from one until six.

Arrangements are also being made to possibly have "feeding stations" in Eula and Clyde.

Details, however, are not yet complete.

County Judge-Elect Byron Richardson met with Putnam civic leaders Tuesday morning and helped to work out arrangements for the station there.

Richardson, who is to serve as general chairman in Cross Plains, points out that the "feeding station" here will be available to all residents of this school district, which embraces parts of Coleman, Brown, Eastland and Callahan Counties.

"It's not just a county affair in Cross Plains," he said, "we're setting up to accommodate every resident of the school district."

## Band Suits Arrive But Money To Pay Needed

Cross Plains Band Boosters Club has a problem.

New uniforms to outfit members of the school musical organization arrived this week and with them came a bill for \$6,237.

The problem is this: there are not enough funds on hand to pay the charge, due Oct. 1.

Members of the booster club

met Monday night and prepared a financial statement dealing with the uniform project. It is summarized here, together with an appeal for payment of pledges and gifts from those who have not yet contributed to the undertaking.

Total cost of uniforms and protective covers: \$6,237; pledges made by band parents and members \$1,702.50; pledges by others \$775; pledges paid by band parents and members \$961.50; pledges paid by others \$525; pledges due \$991.

When all pledges are paid the club will need \$759.50 more to meet the Oct. 1 obligation. \$3,000 was placed in the uniform fund by the board of trustees as a part of the school budget, leaving \$3,237.50 to be raised by the booster organization. Collection of outstanding pledges and raising the additional \$759.50 is all that remains to successfully completing the project.

The public will get a first look at the smartly-clad Buffalo Band in new uniforms at the football game with Bangs here the night of Sept. 7.

Persons who have not contributed to the uniform fund are being asked to leave gifts at the Citizens State Bank.

### SAFETY STICKERS ON SALE AT TWO PLACES

Vehicle safety stickers go on sale Saturday. Two places in Cross Plains are authorized inspection stations. They are Johnston Truck & Supply and Cross Plains Motor Co.

Deadline for procurement of stickers is April 15.

A \$283,489 contract was let last week by the Texas Highway Department for construction of 6.4 miles of pavement from Cross Plains north to FM Road 569 near Sabanno. Low bidder on the project, a segment of State Highway 206, which runs from Coleman to Cisco, was Cagle Bros. of San Antonio.

Contract calls for building of grades, structures and two courses of surface treatment.

The Highway 206 extension from Coleman to join Highway 80 (Interstate 20) at Cisco was started some two years with the active sponsorship of Chambers of Commerce in Cisco, Cross Plains and Coleman. The road is now being finished from Coleman to Cross Plains.

Final step in the project will be paving from Sabanno to Cisco. Plans call for the highway to follow closely the route of FM Road 569 that runs from Sabanno to Highway 80 at the Cisco west city limits.

The State Highway Department is expected to widen and re-build Highway 80 from the west Cisco city limits to the Eastland-Callahan county line this fiscal year. The work would bring that stretch of the road up to Interstate 20 specifications. Much of the engineering work has been completed and right-of-way buying is underway for this project.

## August Dry; Water Use Hits New High

Unless the final two days of August are rainy, the month will go into the record books as the second driest month of the year thus far and the driest August in six years.

Only 30 has been recorded here. That fell in one hard shower Friday.

Water consumption in Cross Plains exceeded three-quarters of a million gallons this week. Total pumpings were recorded at the City Hall at 758,000 gallons, a new seven-day high for the current summer.

## Questions Answered About Sabin Oral Vaccine Against Polio

Many questions have arisen regarding the mass immunization against polio through use of Sabin Oral vaccine to be administered here Sept. 16. In response to inquiries the following set of questions and answers has been obtained by the Review and is published hereunder as a public service.

A. What are the advantages of oral polio vaccine over other types?

A. The ease with which the vaccine can be given — by mouth, instead of by an injection needle, is a big advantage.

Another advantage is that this oral polio vaccine provides what doctors call "intestinal immunity" against polio. Thus, unlike some other polio vaccines, the individual is not only immunized against polio by being provided with antibodies in his blood, but he is also made immune from being a carrier

of the disease, and therefore cannot transmit it to other unimmunized people.

Q. How is the vaccine administered?

A. The vaccine will be given from a paper cup.

Q. Are there any harmful after-effects, such as fever or slight illness, as a result of taking the vaccine?

A. Oral polio vaccines have been administered to millions of persons, with little or no after-effects directly attributed to the vaccine.

Q. How does the vaccine work?

A. After it is swallowed, the vaccine particles multiply in the digestive tract to work building up what doctors call "antibodies". These are what provide protection against polio.

Q. How long does immunization from polio last after a person takes the vaccine?

A. While the vaccine is still

relatively new, and we can't be sure, experts believe it will give you long-term immunity against polio, similar to that provided by smallpox vaccine, which needs a booster dose only every three or four years.

Q. How long after a person takes the vaccine does it become effective in providing immunity?

A. From two to three weeks.

Q. Can a person contract polio as a result of taking the vaccine?

A. No. Even though the vaccine includes live polio virus (in a very weakened form), there have been no confirmed cases of polio resulting from the vaccine.

Q. Who is eligible to receive the vaccine?

A. Everyone — including infants.

Q. What about those who have received previous Salk polio shots?

A. A complete series of all three types of oral vaccine is recommended irrespective of any previous polio shots.

Q. Suppose all members of a family but one get the vaccine, is there a possibility that the person may become immunized from the others?

A. The person who did not take the vaccine might achieve a partial immunity through transmission from other members of the family — and this would of course be a beneficial effect.

Q. Does this vaccine provide protection against all types of polio?

A. Yes. There are three types of polio known to medical science, and there is a separate feeding for each type.

Q. How many doses of the vaccine are needed?

A. Three — spaced a minimum of six weeks apart, and given in a certain order.

Q. Where will this vaccine be obtained during the mass immunization program?

A. Primarily through your family doctor. Others may receive the vaccine at certain community centers or through special mobil units which will be placed at strategic points throughout the county. Watch your newspaper for further announcements on this.

Q. Who should receive the vaccine?

A. The answer to this question is emphatically, everyone. The Surgeon General's Advisory Committee of Poliomyelitis Control has specifically recommended that certain conditions "previously of concern" not be considered contraindications to vaccination with live, oral polio vaccine.

Q. Can the vaccine be purchased anywhere and taken by individuals?

A. No. It is available only

through doctors and recognized institutions like the County Health Department and hospitals.

Q. Why is it necessary to take the vaccine now, when we do not have any incidence of polio in this area?

A. The nation is enjoying relative freedom from polio right now, but it is well known that this disease comes and goes in waves. There is, therefore, no assurance that the present situation will continue. By the same token, we do not have any cases of smallpox, yet we continue to be vaccinated against this disease. The principal is the same, and through this new oral vaccine, we hope to make polio as rare tomorrow as smallpox is today. Experts feel that it is better to conduct a program like this before an epidemic strikes rather than wait until it is here.

Thirty-four Buffaloes have been meeting twice daily drills for the last week and a half, readying themselves for the football season opener here Sept. 7.

The Bison will continue to practice two times a day for the remainder of the week with the exception of the week end. Another letterman returned to the squad this week, bringing the experienced number to nine. The late returnee is Johnny Rouse, a senior tackle. Heading the returning letter earners are two two-year lettermen. They are senior halfback Darrell Wyatt, a second team All-District choice in 1961, and junior quarterback Charles Barr. The other single season lettermen other than Rouse who are returning are senior tackle Terry Dewbre, senior guard-end Jerry Payne, junior tackle Kenneth Sowell, junior guard Jay Hutchins, junior end-tackle Eddy Edmondson and junior end Mike Montgomery.

The offense never got started, and blocking deficiencies showed up as the team's primary weakness. Injuries have thus far beset only the expected number of local gridlers. Promising full back Jim Hargrove re-injured a leg aggravation. Gunn opined that he had ligaments pulled in the hurt limb. Sophomore back Regie Stover was sidelined last Friday "for a few days" with a pulled hip muscle, and freshman tackle Donnie Rhodes sustained a broken nose in Saturday's workout. Both the latter

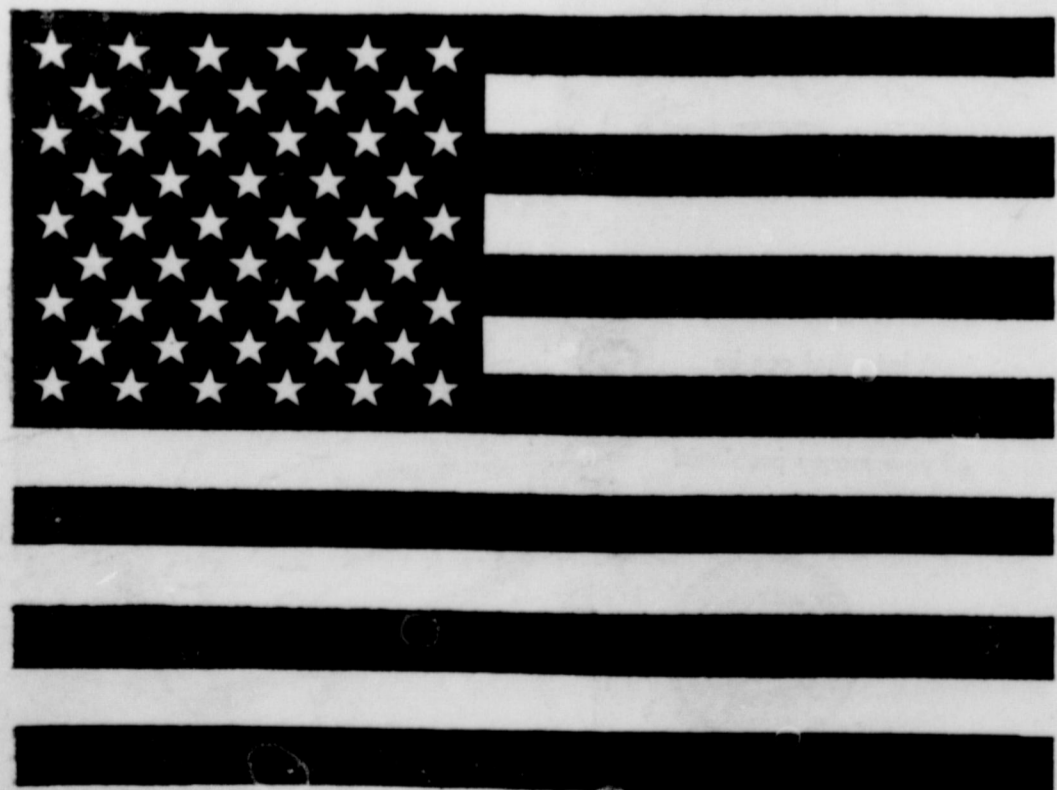
