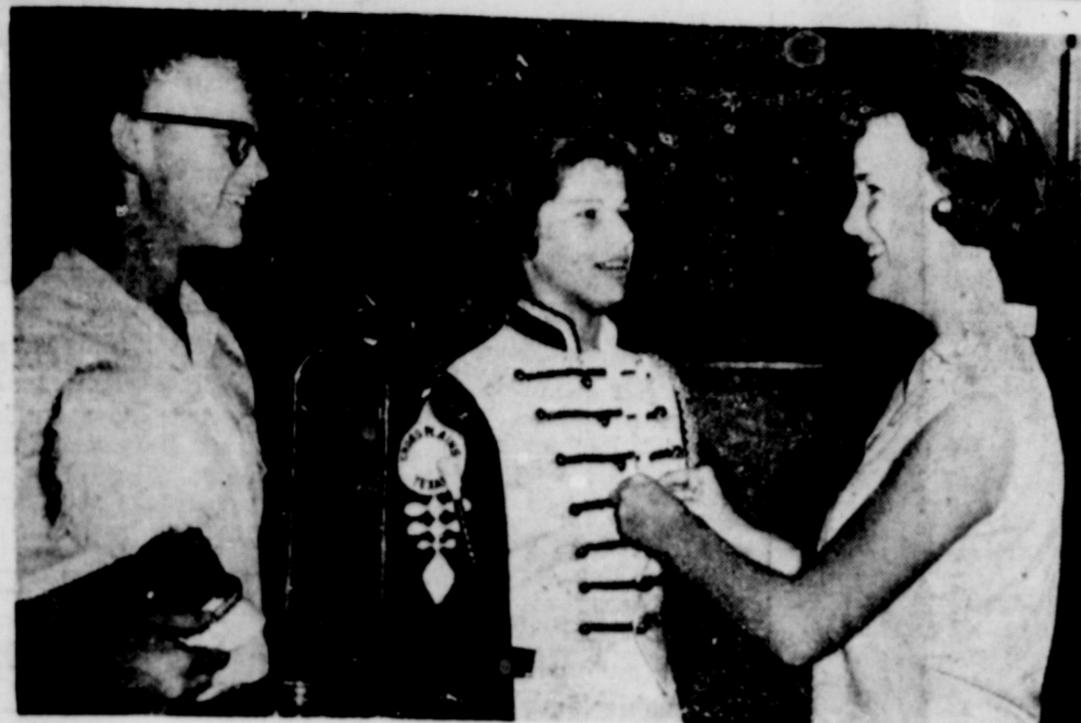

Eula, Putnam, Baird And Cross Plains To Serve Anti-Polio Drinks Sept. 16

Eula, Putnam, Cross Plains and Baird will undertake programs of mass immunization against polio Sunday, Sept. 16. The school cafeteria in each community will be scene of

vaccinations, using Sabin oral type medicine.

Mrs. W. P. Stephenson is chairman for the project at Eula, Mrs. Grady Pruet will serve in the same role at Put-

nam, as will Byron Richardson in Cross Plains and E. Elton Ables at Baird.

Physicians, nurses and pharmacists of the county have volunteered their services.

Sabin Oral vaccinations consists of merely drinking a small cup of water to which the preventive drug has been added. It is said to be tasteless.

"Feeding stations" in the four Callahan County communities will be open from one until six p.m. the afternoon of Sept. 16, with the exception of at Putnam. The hours there will be from two until five.

No charge for the vaccination will be made, however, contribution boxes will be available for those who wish to help bear the expense. Donations of 25 cents per dose have been suggested.

Persons of all ages except infants under six weeks, are being encouraged to take the vaccine.

2 Die In 7 Wrecks Of Holiday Period

Two persons are dead, another is in a serious condition and five others received lesser injuries in seven traffic accidents in this area over the long Labor Day week end.

Two died following a head-on collision in the eastern edge of Rising Star at 1:20 p.m. Saturday. They were John M. Alford of Route 1, May, and Donald Leonard Carlisle, a 24-year-old Fort Hood soldier.

Highway Patrolman Jerry Mathews of Cross Plains, who investigated the crash, said that

Alford, who was driving a pickup truck, entered Highway 36 from the north and collided with the Carlisle car, which was traveling west. With Alford were his wife, Mrs. Wanda Hutchinson and her three-year-old daughter. With Carlisle were his wife and 10-month-old daughter.

All of the seven people were rushed to the Rising Star Hospital, however, Alford and Mrs. Hutchinson were transferred to ambulances and taken to Abilene. The Carlises were later

moved to an Eastland hospital. Carlisle died at 8:35 Monday morning and Alford at 10:30 Monday night.

Mrs. Carlisle reportedly sustained broken bones as also did Mrs. Hutchinson. Others in the crash vehicles received only minor hurts.

Crash At Intersection

The intersection of Highway 36 and Main Street in Cross Plains was the scene of a smash-up Monday morning at 6:15. A truck driven by Early B. Denison, son of the contractor on two retention dams being built near here, was involved in an accident with a car driven by Airman Second Class James F. Jonas of Bridge City.

The truck had been going west and was about to turn north on Main Street when hit from behind by the Jonas car. The airman and his wife were both hurt, however their small child was uninjured. Jonas was rushed to Dyess Air Force Base Hospital and his wife was taken to Hendricks. She was classed as critical until Tuesday, when attendants reported her condition as "noticeably improved."

Denison was not hurt.

Downtown Mishap

Sunday morning at 7:45 an accident occurred at the intersection of Main and 8th Streets. Local automobiles were involved.

A car driven by Robert N. Brashear collided with a boat being pulled behind a vehicle driven by J. T. Hewes. Brashear was alone in his car. Accompanying Hewes were his wife and four friends from Roswell, N. M. None was injured.

New Car Mangled

Saturday night at nine o'clock a second accident occurred near Rising Star. It was five miles north of that city and involved a new automobile — with only 10 miles on the speedometer — and a truck. The truck, driven by Kenneth Totter of Compton, Calif., is said to have just crossed a narrow bridge and side-swiped the approaching passenger car, driven by Chester N. Ballard, Jr. The car hit the bridge and suffered an estimated \$1,500 damage. No one was hurt.

At least two unreported one-vehicle accidents are known to have happened at a highway detour one mile south of town. Damage is believed to have been slight, however, with no injuries.

A cow owned by John D. Montgomery was killed Sunday on a lateral road west of town. Officers opined that she had been hit by a vehicle. No accident report was filed.

Jake Childers Sells First 1962 Peanuts

Peanuts are moving.

First load from the 1962 crop was sold in Cross Plains Friday by Jake Childers. Damon Jones was not for behind with the second local load.

Childers reported averaging 20 bushels to the acre on his crop of 20 acres. They tested 54 and brought \$2.80 per bushel, for a gross of \$56 per acre. Jones had 15 acres which

averaged 27 and one-third bushels. His yield graded 59 and brought \$3.10 per bushel, for a gross of \$83.70.

B. D. Montgomery bought both loads.

Harvesting equipment was busy throughout the Cross Plains area Wednesday morning and the crop will be moving briskly by the week end, Montgomery said.

530 Heed School Bells Here Tuesday Morning

Start Work At Sabanno For \$283,489 Road Job

Work began Tuesday morning on the \$283,489 road construction project, which calls for building 6.4 miles of State Highway 206, northward from Cross Plains.

Cage Bros. of San Antonio began unloading machinery on the north end of the job Friday morning. First work will be done there and proceed toward the city limits here.

This segment of 206, which intersects FM Road 569 in Eastland County just south of the Sabanno Cemetery, is not expected to be ready for use until next May.

Representatives of the State Highway Department explained to Mayor Ted Souder and other

civic leaders at a meeting in the City Hall Wednesday morning how construction would proceed and practices to be observed during the construction period.

When the Cross Plains-to-Sabanno gap is finished, 206 will be paved from Cisco to Coleman. Ultimate plans, however, call for widening and straightening the northmost section, ending the presently a part that which is presently a part of the FM Road. The new highway will intersect Interstate 20 — Highway 80 — at a point two miles west of Cisco.

Injuries Take Toll

Jimmy Hargrove, a senior back, has been sidelined indefinitely with torn ligaments in his leg. He was counted on to offer a strong offensive punch to the young, inexperienced Buffs this season. Donnie Rhodes, promising freshman lineman, sustained a broken nose last week and is temporarily out of action. Both players will miss Friday's game.

Doctor's orders have forced two local gridders to hang up their pads. Jerry Payne, senior letterman, received a concussion while working during the summer, and recurring aggravations forced him to resign. Team physician, Dr. Carl J. Sohns, also directed junior Tommy Ramey to leave the club this week. One letterman, senior Johnny Rouse, took leave of the Buffs this season, and two more candidates, Tommy Purvis and Scott Odom, turned in equipment cutting the thundering herd's strength to 27.

Defensive specialists tapped for possible starting assignments, as well as the aforementioned offensive eleven, are: defensive halfbacks: 140 pound junior Mike Montgomery and 165 pound junior Eddy Edmondson.

Old Road Crossing May Get Monument

A historical marker may be erected in Cross Plains City Park.

More than 85 years ago two important roads crossed there and ultimately contributed to the establishment of a settlement along the banks of Turkey Creek. One of the roads ran from Brownwood to Belle Plain. The other was a route used by cattle drovers in starting herds to the Chisholm trail for marketing at Kansas railheads.

The Cross Plains site has been nominated but not yet approved.

Callahan County's first jail, located to the northwest of the courthouse at Baird has already been approved and a marker will be erected there by Texas Historical Building Medallions Committee.

The jail was built at Belle Plain in 1878, then moved to the present county seat in 1883. Each rock was hauled the 10 miles and utilized in second construction of the structure.

Historical sites are now being marked throughout Texas. Gray aluminum medallions, 14 inches in diameter, bearing the words "State Historical Survey", are being installed.

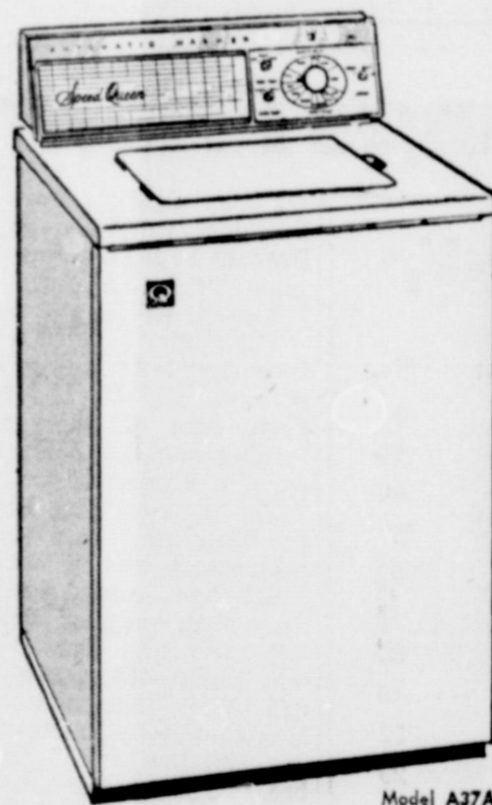

County Sheep Raisers Balloting On Controls

Producers eligible to vote in the referendum are all those who have owned sheep or lambs, six months of age or older, for any one period of at least 30 days since Jan. 1, 1962. Each producer will report the number of sheep and lambs on his ballot. Approval by producers having at least two-thirds of the volume of production represented by votes in the referendum will be required if the agreement is to be extended.

Rules Reiterated About Passing School Buses

Motorists are reminded by Dan Nowlin, district officer for the Department of Public Safety, that the passing of school buses means strict observance of the law governing motorists passing parked school buses. Under Texas state law, motorists passing or overtaking a school bus stopped to receive or discharge students are required to stop immediately before passing the bus. They may proceed at a speed which does not exceed 10 miles per hour. Nowlin pointed out that on a two-lane highway or a four-lane highway which is not di-

vided, motorists are required to stop whether meeting or passing the halted bus. Motorists meeting a parked school bus need not stop if they are driving on a divided multilane road and the bus is on the opposite roadway, he added. The motorist is responsible for the safety of all students at any time he is passing a parked school bus. Nowlin emphasized. Motorists are not required to stop where buses are loading or unloading in a marked loading zone upon a limited access roadway on which pedestrians are not allowed to cross the roadway, the law specifies.

50 People Summoned For Jury Duty Monday

Fifty persons have been summoned for petit jury duty in 42nd District Court at Baird Monday morning.

Of those summoned: 21 are from Baird, 13 from Cross Plains, nine from Clyde, two each from Putnam, Atwell and Moran route and one from Cottonwood. Twenty are women.
