Yankee Imperialism means a country which has gone into two world wars with enormous sacrifice of lives and money and which hasn't taken a single inch of land from the beaten countries. It means a nation which devoted hundreds of millions of dollars to the reconstruction of battle-torn countries after World War II through the Marshall Plan. Yankee Imperialism savs a man has a right to happiness through a worthy life. Perhaps the Soviets could tell us how this compares with Russian Imperialism. The Soviets hold all the countries defeated by them under their yoke without any freedom at all."
